

St. Mary's Edge Beavers 3-2 In Penalty-Packed Game At Saint John

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Jan. 14 (CP) — Between numerous penalties which frustrated playing patterns and aroused the fans' ire, Halifax St. Mary's outscored Saint John Beavers 3-2 in a disappointing Maritime Major Hockey League fixture tonight.

Despite the loss, Beavers finished with a healthy 14-point lead over the second place Charlottetown Islanders while the Saints remained in a third spot tie with Glace Bay Miners.

The first period ended 2-2 after Bill Warwick and Johnny Morrow tallied for Halifax. In the second session, Warwick fired the winner. Ken Watson scored both Saint John goals, each assisted by Ron Hurst and Johnny Arundel.

Frank Elliott and Blair Peters called frequent penalties in the first and second frames. Most were minor, with the cause often unapparent to the crowd.

Maritime Major Hockey League Scoring Statistics

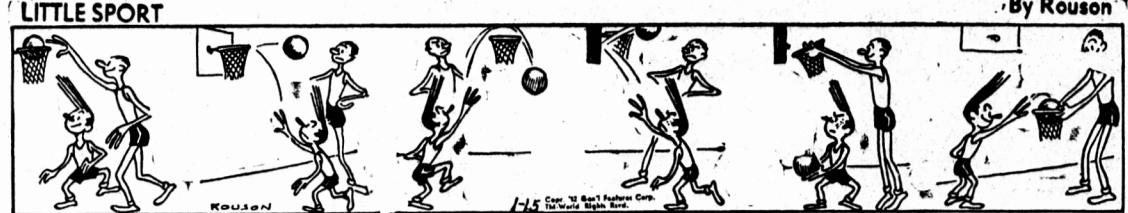
Johnny Ubriaco of the Saint John Beavers picked up only one assist last week but he lost no ground in the Maritime Major Hockey League point scoring race according to unofficial figures compiled by the Guardian. Ubriaco remained far in the lead with 32 goals and 35 assists for a total of 67 points.

Twelve points behind in second place is teammate Tom Smellie with 23 goals and 32 assists for a total of 55 points. Willie Marshall, idle during the past week, held down third place with 30 points.

Kenny Watson of the Beavers is in fourth place two points behind Marshall while "Buck" Whitlock of the Islanders and John Anderson of the Miners are tied for fifth place with 47 points.

The rest which Willie Marshall and Don Bellringer received in hospital during the past week was the best tonic which has been given to the Islanders for quite a while. Last night Marshall and Bellringer played with the dash and effectiveness which was their trademark in the first months of the season. In the dressing room following the game the boys commented about the benefit of the rest they got while recuperating from the 'flu' and how different they felt on the ice.

It would have been good to see Conny Bonhomme on Marshall's right wing but Bob Gray more than adequately filled the bill. Gray, a big fellow who pounds in proportion to the amount of work he gets, turned in one of his best performances of the season. He looked particularly good in the second period and at one interval it appeared that he had control of the puck all the time. His second goal was a brilliant piece of work as he caught the Hawks with their wings down and drilled one past Lockhart.

The Hawks without Tom Rockey on defense were something similar to a fish out of water. Lawrie May was the pick of the Hawks blueliners but he could not stem the tide of the Islanders' attack. At times it appeared that the Hawks were content to dump the puck anywhere as long as they got it out of their own end. Their forward line was considerably weakened as they played without the services of Ronnie Rowe and George Scholes.

We believe No. 5 comes closest to the real reason, with maybe a pinch of No. 6 for seasoning. We don't think the cagey Hurley is afraid Matthews might lose, although he undoubtedly has figured that possibility and what it would do to his future earnings.

Hurley is one of a dying breed — an independent fight manager who knows every phase of the game and won't be pushed around by anyone.

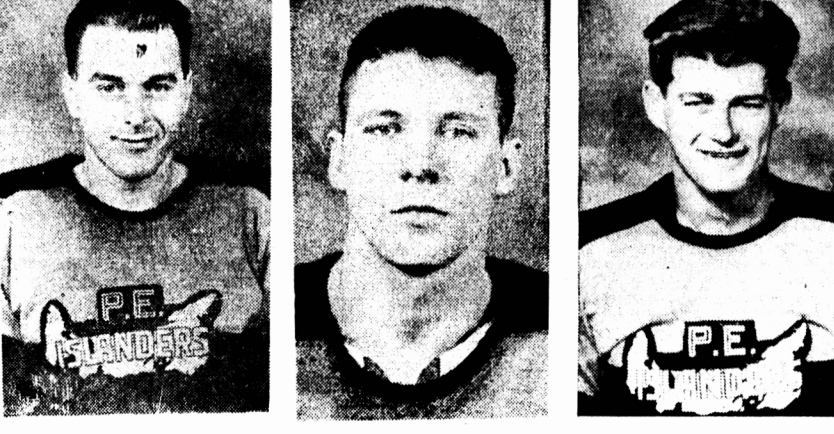

GLACE BAY, N.S., Jan. 14 (CP) — Glace Bay Miners hammered the hapless Sydney Millionaires 3-1 tonight in a Maritime Major Hockey League fixture that saw the visitors score their only goal before the game was two minutes old.

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Walter Lawlor Returns From Regina Meeting

Walter Lawlor, President of the M. A. H. A., returned over the week-end from Regina where he represented the Maritimes at a meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

The meeting was a two day affair commencing on Friday night January 4 and continuing until Sunday, January 6. The gathering was well attended and a wealth of hockey details were discussed.

One of the rulings established was that of reverting to the icing the puck rule which was in effect early this season. The rule states to the effect that the puck must be carried over the red line at the end of the rink otherwise the play is off-side. All amateur clubs except those in the Major Leagues must return to this ruling stated Mr. Lawlor.

Jan. 25 has been set as the last date on which a Club may register with the M. A. H. A. for participation in Maritime playdowns he stated. Anyone wanting cards may obtain them from Mr. Lawlor.

Mr. Lawlor was the Maritimes' lone representative at the meeting. Ken MacInnis of Southport in Montreal, MacInnis played junior hockey in Charlottetown about 1935.

Hawks Miss Chances

Despite the efforts of a tight Islanders defense the Hawks had their opportunities to score and with any reasonable resemblance to luck should have had two or three more goals. At least twice the net was open but the attackers either fell or missed the puck.

Both Lockhart and Frederick were brilliant at times, especially the overworked Lockhart. The big fellow had 49 drives and he handed 42 of them successfully. Many of his stops were from point blank range.

The Islanders defense (four of Dutchak, Vitale, Travis and McLagan) turned in strong games. Big Phil had one goal and two assists while Travis had two assists.

The game was a roughly played affair with 14 penalties being handed out by referees Larry Heffering and Pete Mill. Matters came to a head in the second period with George McLagan and Danny Horeck tangling in a free swinging duel. Travis and Marshall drew majors in the third period for fighting.

Both teams were short-handed. The Hawks defense definitely missed Tom Rockey while their forwards were without the services of George Scholes and Ronnie Rowe. Conrad Bonhomme and Jim MacKenzie were missing from the Islanders.

The Marshall line collected ten scoring points. Willie had four points, Gray and Bellringer three each. Walt Pawlyshyn had two points, a goal and an assist while "Bucko" Trainer had an assist.

Bob Gray started the scoring by knocking in Marshall's rebound at 12:25 of the first period. Less than two minutes later Walt Pawlyshyn made it 2-0 by tipping in Larry Travis' low slap shot.

The Islanders' third goal by Bellringer followed a sustained power attack around the Hawks net. Bob Gray intercepted a pass at the Hawks blueline and rushed in on Lockhart to score on a whistling 25 footer for goal number four. The Hawks were a man short at the time.

Marshall raced around "Red" Olson for a shot at Lockhart and Bellringer flicked in the rebound to make the score 3-0. Walt Pawlyshyn dropped a pass and Vitale blazed a partially screened shot into the corner for the sixth goal. Willie Marshall took a pass from Larry Travis and drew Lockhart for the Islanders last score.

Robinson, who took a beating from the Islanders fed Clements a pass for the Hawks first goal. Burman took advantage of a defensive lapse to score for the Hawks while Fillion scored on a rising fifteen footer from the left hand side.

Islanders Swamp Hawks 7-3 On The Strength Of Torrid Two Period Drive

Fresh from their hospital beds and with hockey sticks instead of scalpels Willie Marshall and Don Bellringer proceeded to show the way as the Islanders doctored Johnny Horeck's Moncton Hawks 7-3 last night in a wide open, fast moving game at the Forum.

For 150 periods the re-vitalized Islanders tore through the visitors at will and ran up a 7-0 score that was indicative of the play. In the last period they eased the pressure and the Hawks came through for three goals.

Stealing the spotlight along with Marshall and Bellringer was Bullet Bob Gray, last night playing on right wing in place of the injured Conny Bonhomme. Bob also played the point on the power attack and for his night's work collected two goals and an assist.

The win gives the second place Islanders 54 points, six more than the third place Halifax Saints and the Glace Bay Miners who also won their games last night.

For two periods the Islanders could do nothing wrong. In the middle period they were at their best form of the season as they swarmed around the over-worked Don Lockhart like bees around a hive. In the sandwich session they outshot the visitors 25-9.

Moncton Start Fast

The Hawks started away at a fast clip but within minutes they were rolled back on the defensive as the Islanders steamrolled to victory. With superb skating ability, passing and determination the Islanders beat the visitors into submission and then proceeded to give them Drs. Marshall's and Bellringer's treatment.

At the end of the first period the score stood 2-0 after Bob Gray and Pawlyshyn had scored. In the second period Bellringer twice, Gray, Phil Vitale and Marshall once made the scoreboard 7-0.

Former Islander Marcel Clements spoiled Ray Frederick's bid for a shutout at the 3:30 mark of the last period by scoring on a 20 footer. Geoff Burman and Denis Fillion were the other Moncton marksmen.

And although the Marshall-Bellringer-Gray line stood out for its scoring feats the Trainer and Whitlock line also carried the play over the Hawks. Both Trainer and Whitlock turned in great games but both of them were denied on their efforts to score.
