2,000 Spectators Witness Lower Montague Regatta

Over 2,000 spectators attended the annual Lower Montague Regatta held yesterday afternoon on the waters of the mouth of the Montague River at Lower Montague.

Once again the event was blessed with near perfect weather and those attending were treated to some fine racing by lobster boats, snipes, and outboard motor boats. Spectators lined shore line and crowded the wharf near the starting line and were delivered from the heat by a cool, refreshing breeze.

The MacIntyre trophy, which has been donated for some years by John MacIntyre of Attleboro, Mass., a summer resident of Lower Montague, was won by Seven Sisters, a boat owned by the Nicolle Brothers of Murray River who raced to victory in the lobster boat free-for-all. Vince Turpel, who won the trophy last year, was a close second and Jack Irvin of Pt. Pleasant was third. Turpel is a resident of Pictou Island, N.S.

The Doug Coffin Trophy for the outboard motor boat free-for-all was captured by Avon Andrews of Charlottetown, Everett Platts of Charlottetown, second and Doug Coffin of Montague came in to show.

Civil Jury Case Heard

The case of Raymond Merrill McKeeman, Point Pleasant, plaintiff, vs. Traders General Insurance, defendant, action on an insurance policy, was heard before Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan and a civil jury at the regular July sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown yesterday.
