

Berra And Turley Lead Yankees To 6-2 Win Over Nats.; Cubs Defeat Cardinals

(By The Canadian Press)

Yogi Berra, ousted from the cleanup spot Wednesday, took it out on Washington Senators by blasting a home run with two mates aboard the first time he came to bat and led New York Yankees to a 6-2 triumph in the only day baseball game in the American League.

In the National League, Chicago Cubs swept a doubleheader from St. Louis Cardinals behind two brilliant pitching jobs, a four-hit 1-0 triumph by Paul Minner in the opener and a two-hit 3-1 decision by Bob Rush in the second. Rush's shutout was ruined by Rip Repulski's home run in the ninth.

Berra's blow, the slugging catcher's ninth homer of the season, was all Bob Turley needed to register his eighth victory against a lone defeat. The right-handed fireballer permitted only three hits and struck out six, to boost his season's total to a league-leading 78 strikeouts, one more than Cleveland's Herb Score.

Eddie Fitzgerald hit a low liner to centre in the sixth and when Mickey Mantle missed a shoestring catch, Fitzgerald scored an inside-the-park homer.

At Chicago, Rush gained his third win of the year as Brooks Lawrence, kayped before striking a single batter, suffered his third setback.

The victories were Chicago's fifth and sixth in the last seven games. St. Louis dropped its fourth and fifth decisions in six games.

Chicago gave Rush a 2-0 lead in the first inning when Eddie Miksis poked a lead-off homer, his second of the year. The second run was the result of Gene Baker's triple and rookie Bob Speake's double.

Minner, inactive since May 6 and without a hit since April 22, gained his third win in beating rookie Larry Jackson.

Speake walloped his sixth homer in the opener.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Robin Roberts, Murry Dickson and Johnny Meyer tossed New York Giants out of second place in the National League Wednesday night as Philadelphia Phillies won both ends of a two-night twin bill, 8-3 and 4-2.

Roberts won his sixth of the year against three losses by limiting the Giants to five hits in the opener while Dickson and Meyer turned in a combined eight hits in the nightcap.

The double loss put the Giants a full game behind Chicago Cubs. The Phils bunched four of their second game runs in the first inning to drive starter Johnny Antonelli to the showers. Richie Ashburn and Peanuts Lowry singled.

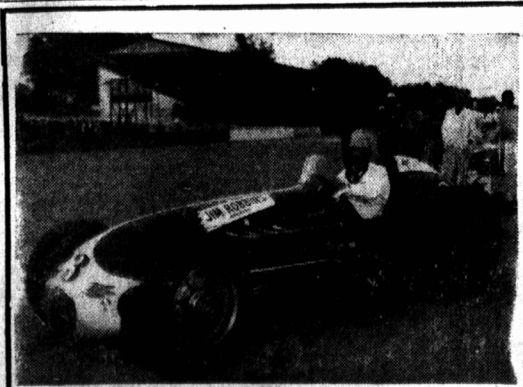
Dairy Defeat Lions 18-3

Hoyt Wins Pole Position In Monday's Big Auto Race

26-year-old Jerry Hoyt wrote a home-town-boy makes good story by braving high gusty winds to win the pole position in the 500-mile at the Indianapolis Speedway. Hoyt qualified at 140.045 miles per hour to become one of the two drivers who earned their way into the speed classic as the winds made high speed driving extremely dangerous in the first day of the qualifying rounds. Driving a Jerry Robbins Special—the car that was second fastest in last year's qualifications—Hoyt drove two of the required four laps around the 2 1/2 mile track, in the 130 bracket while his first and last were in the 140 bracket to average 140.045, the second highest qualifying run in speedway history.

Delock coasted to his fourth victory as the Sox took off on Don Johnson and Lou Kretlow to build up a 5-0 lead in the first four innings.

The Orioles broke loose for both their runs in the bottom of the fourth, when they bunched three singles, but Delock had no serious difficulties after that as he helped the Red Sox break a five-game losing streak.

Frank Sullivan, an old Baltimore nemesis, lasted only 4 2/3 innings in the first game as the Birds rang up four runs on seven hits.

Billy Cox, with three safeties and Gene Wodling and Hal Smith with two each, provided the punch to help Harry Byrd gain his third victory.

Hockey Owners Agree On TV

TORONTO (CP)—A spokesman for National Hockey League owners meeting here announced Wednesday an agreement has been reached among the four professional hockey leagues in Canada and the United States on what restrictions should apply in the telecasting of games.

The agreement provides that no telecasts of a game will be beamed into a 50-mile area around any other city where a pro game is being played at the same time.

The spokesman said the restrictions apply only on regularly-scheduled NHL games and would not apply for the all-star game and the Stanley Cup playoffs. It also does not affect radio broadcasts of NHL games.

The agreement was reached by the NHL, QHL, the American Hockey League and the Western Hockey League.

French Horse Springs Upset Win In Derby

EPSOM, England (CP)—The French horse Phil Drake dropped from the clouds Wednesday to win the Derby and spoil the reputation of England's wonder horse, Acropolis.

Second to last of 23 runners approaching the homestretch in the 176th Derby, Phil Drake threaded his way through the field, switched to the inside in the last 200 yards and streaked away from the pace-setting Panaslipper to win by 1 1/2 lengths. It was the first Derby victory for Madame Suzy Volterra, former Parisian showgirl.

Panaslipper, flying the silks of millionaire Joe McGrath, managing director of the Irish Hospitals Trust, which runs the big sweepstake on the Derby, was three lengths ahead of the 11-to-4 favorite Acropolis with another 100-yard shot, W. Rawlins' Cardington King, fourth.

The 38-year-old Mme. Volterra is the widow of the French show-

man Leon Volterra, whose horses Royal Drake and Amour Drake finished second in the 1948 and 1949 Derbys, respectively, chatting happily in French, the tall, chic Parisienne told a reporter this was the "happiest day" of her life.

SIXTH TIME
Phil Drake, a 100-to-8 chance, is the sixth French horse to win the Derby, starting with Gladateur in 1865.

It was a sad day for hundreds of thousands of English bettors. Acropolis, winner of his last four races, had been a hot favorite all through the winter. Some critics never wavered in their belief that he would prove the horse of the century.

But the golden opinions changed to disappointment as the chestnut son of Alycidon, well placed all the way, failed to respond when champion jockey Douglas Smith drew his whip.

Sunshine flooded Epsom Downs on the election eve Derby day drawing some 200,000 fans to this Surrey racecourse to watch the 1 1/2-mile classic race for three-year-olds. In the race before the Derby, Royal Ferry, owned by E. P. Taylor of Toronto, finished sixth of eight runners in the Catberham stakes, a two-year-old event.

Taylor has five two-year-olds in training in England but has yet to win a race.

Will Consider Player Ruling

TORONTO (CP)—A recommendation to allow American Hockey League teams more freedom in buying players on the National Hockey League reserve list will be considered at the three-day annual meeting of the NHL next week in Montreal.

Him Henry, general manager of the Cleveland Barons of the AHL, said at a meeting of the relations committee of the NHL and AHL here Wednesday, that under the present agreement there have been cases where a player in the Quebec or Western league was prevented from being drafted into the AHL because he was on the NHL reserve list.

He said: "This is legal, but we'd like to see a change so that AHL clubs can pick up players in either the QHL or the WHL who are not NHL calibre but would fit into the AHL."

Don Cockell Sails For Home

NEW YORK (AP)—Don Cockell, British heavyweight boxing champ who recently lost a world title bout to American champ Rocky Marciano, sailed for home Wednesday saying he'd fight Marciano again anytime.

But neither Cockell nor his manager, John Simpson, would comment on the possibility of a return fight.

The 26-year-old boxer had little else to say but his wife, when asked what she thought of the Marciano fight, told reporters: "Repeating an American phrase, 'We wuz robbed.'"

Simpson was asked if he thought his man could beat Marciano in a second engagement.

He replied with an enthusiastic "sure." He added: "With all due respect to Marciano, I don't consider him a great fighter."

U. S. Stars Win Tennis Matches

PARIS (AP) — America's "big three" of Tony Trabert, Vic Seixas and Hamilton Richardson swept through their second-round matches without loss of a set Wednesday in the French international tennis tournament.

Trabert, defending champion from Cincinnati, used his tremendous power to blast out a 6-2, 6-1, 6-3 victory over 20-year-old Stockholm, junior member of the Swedish Davis Cup team.

Seixas, the sharp-volleying U.S. champion from Philadelphia was more impressive in expelling Jacques Malosse of France aside 6-2, 6-2, 6-0. Richardson made few mistakes in eliminating Xavier Perreau-Saussine of France 6-2, 6-0, 6-0.

Big Decrease Forced In CAHA Spending Program

REGINA (CP) — Disappointing gate receipts from Memorial and Allan Cup playoffs have forced the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to cut its annual spending program to nearly half what it was in 1954-55.

The annual CAHA meeting here Wednesday approved a total budget for next season of \$44,200, a drop of \$28,125 from last year.

Missing from the budget were a \$3,500 appropriation for printing rule books and the allowance for sending a team to the winter Olympics in Italy next year.

The meeting had accepted the offer of Crown Life Insurance Co. to print the rule books.

The association which earlier this year lost upwards of \$5,000 on Pentleton VS' tour through Germany in the world hockey championships, also refused to tap its operating funds to send another team overseas.

However, the CAHA trust fund could provide the necessary money for another such trip.

The CAHA reduced to \$13,500 from \$8,000 its grants to provincial CAHA branches for minor hockey development.

All association branch officials will be polled July 1 on whether they want to reduce senior team registrations as another move for greater economy.

Will Curtail Television Of Major League Hockey

TORONTO (CP) — Professional hockey leagues in Canada and the United States took a good look Wednesday at the effect of television on attendance figures and came up with a plan to protect themselves.

NHL owners also agreed that in order to protect themselves from forfeited games such as brought on by the mob violence at an NHL game between Detroit Red Wings and Canadiens at Montreal March 17, a completed game will be ruled if 30 minutes of the contest has been played. If less than 30 minutes is played before a forfeiture, it will be a suspended game.

After the four-hour closed-door meeting of owners, president Clarence Campbell said the officials had decided that no telecasts of a scheduled league game would be beamed into a 50-mile area around any other city where a pro game is being played. The agreement, between the NHL, AHL, Quebec and Western Leagues, will come into effect next season.

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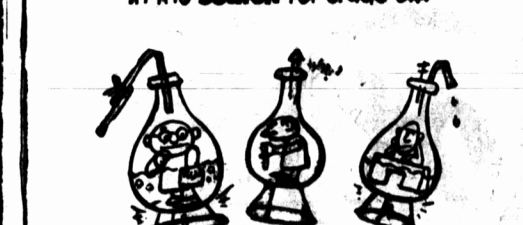


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
