The Government and Reciprocity.

The Grit organs are never weary of declaring that the present Government are hostile to Reciprocity with the United States. Nothing can be more untrue. What the Government is opposed to, and what all patriotic, loyal Canadians are opposed to, is what is called "Unrestricted Reciprocity."

Alarm of the Grits.
