

Fatal Affray Among Negroes.

WILLIAM KENT MURDERED NEAR FIGBY WHILE DRUNK—SUSPECTED BY AN OLD WOMAN.

On Saturday evening last, a colored man named Wm. Kent, while under the influence of liquor, entered the house of Howard Jordan, also a colored man, living at Digby N. S. The house was at the time occupied by Jordan and his wife, while her grandmother, Elsie Williams, and her grandson, a boy about 14 years old, were there visiting.

On entering the house, as the conflicting evidence shows, Kent behaved in an indecent manner to the woman, refused to leave the house, and in a tussle with Howard Jordan fell to the floor, Jordan being low and Kent on top. While in this position he probably received

THE BLOWS FROM THE AXE,

which caused his death, six of which were found on his body, the one on the head penetrating the skull, and all evidently done with an axe. While Jordan and Kent were scuffling, his wife started to the nearest house, that of Thos. Francis, for assistance. On their return they found the family outdoors and Kent lying inside

DELEGED IN BLOOD

and though faint, was still able to speak. He charged Howard Jordan with the murder. He was carried to Francis' house, when medical aid was summoned, but he died about midnight, on Sunday. An inquest was held by Coroner Stephens, at which was gathered a motley crowd of all the people of color. The parties living in the house were all determined not to convict themselves, and nobody seemed know who committed the deed. The four were committed to the County Jail at Digby, where an examination was held on the 18th, when the boy, James Edward Jones, testified that his grandmother, Elsie Williams, alias Ruddick, took the axe from behind the door, when Kent and Howard were struggling on the floor, and, thinking she was going to kill Kent, ran out of the house. The boy will be released on bail, but the others are committed to the Supreme Court in June. The old woman has a wicked look although she quiet in her manner, and considerable doubt exists whether she is the real murderess or not. The coroner at the inquest brought in the following verdict: That the deceased came to his death by blows from an axe in the house of Howard Jordan.

A Truce Between Bolivia and Chili.

A late Paris despatch says that an arrangement has been perfected between Chili and Bolivia by which a truce is established for three years, but with the strange condition that Chili will allow no hostile demonstrations on the part of Bolivia toward Peru. This not only means a decisive denial to the desires of Bolivia regarding Tacna and Arica, but also is a veto to any attempt that might be made by the former ally of Peru towards gaining an outlet to the sea by way of Arequipa and Mollendo. Chili in return will build the railways from the coast, at Antofagasta or Iquique, up to the Bolivian cities, control the Bolivian trade and accomplish possibly her prime object in going to war with Peru.

The Chilean government has determined to unite the postal and telegraph services.
