# Governor Recalls How He Won Success The Hard Way

The onerous and exacting duties of office do not deter Lieutenant Governor J.J. Bowlen of Alberta from maintaining adequate oversight of his 3000 acres of farm land near Calgary.

In an interview last night at the Charlottetown Hospital where His Honour is the guest of his niece, Sister Mary of Good Counsel, Governor Bowlen referred with regret to the situation which has developed in the world market for grain. "I grew and harvested 40,000 bushels this year and along with hundreds of others I would like to see an adequate outlet for the sale of our product" he said.

His Honour, who was appointed Lieutenant Governor of Alberta in 1950 is now filling a second term on an indefinite extension. Governor Bowlen, who has not had a holiday since assuming office, expressed himself as being delighted with his visit to his native province and the kindly manner in which he has been received on every hand.

Following his visit to his lieutenant. Governor Prowse and Mrs. Prowse at Government House he called on Premier A.W. Matheson, His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart and His Excellency Bishop MacEachern.

Yesterday he visited St. Dunstan's University where his son, Dr. J.J. Bowlen, now practicing law in Toronto, received his academic education.

Governor Bowlen has had a colorful career without losing that innate culture which makes him a conspicuous figure in any group. A strict adherence to his creed "Do unto others as you would have others do to you" has gained for him the confidence and respect of the people of Alberta in all walks of life.

In a reminiscent mood, His Honour recalled his boyhood days in Cardigan where he was born, and his departure for Boston in 1892 in search of work that would lead to ultimate business success. His final five years in that city as a street car conductor convinced him that another field of endeavour was indicated.

Leaving Boston in 1900, he returned to Souris where he purchased a farm but cropped it only once. He went to Boston for a short time again only to return to Cardigan in 1901 where he purchased a farm which centred on the present location of the C. N. R. station. As agent for the International Harvester Company, he sold

machinery and dealt in cattle and horses there until 1906. WORKED AS FARM HAND

The West beckoned that year and here the Governor-to-be got his first good break from a Methodist Minister with whom he engaged as a farm hand. "I had my first view of a bunk-house where I had scarcely settled for my first night when a son of my employer called me to the house to see his father. The reverend gentleman had sized me up for a job with a friend of his at Elba, Man., where I was elated to be able to take over a going concern."

Governor Bowlen was first elected as a Liberal member in the Provincial Parliament representing Calgary in 1930. He was re-elected repeatedly until 1944, being House Leader for two years.

In 1947 he was appointed to the Board of Governors of the C.B.C., a position which he held for three years until his present appointment.

His Honour will be the guest of Lieut. Governor Prowse and Mrs. Prowse for several days before leaving for Calgary on Dec. 3.

TREATMENT SAME

OTTAWA (CP)—Trade department officials said Tuesday that all non-confidential inquiries from abroad about industrial prospects in Canada are sent out simultaneously to every province. The officials were commenting on an Edmonton report that Alberta government officials charged the federal trade department discriminating against the provinces in forwarding "feelers" by foreign industry wanting to build plants in Canada.

# Good Showing At Royal By PEI Jersey Breeders

Prince Edward Island Jersey breeders are happy over the showing they made this year at the Royal Winter Fair. They took twelve head of cattle to the Royal and placed in the money with all but one of them.

Top placing was the first prize in a class of some fifty junior bull calves won by Douglas Matheson of Albion Cross, St. Peters, R.E. This youngster was making his first appearance in a senior fair and he made it a winning one in the biggest show in Canada.

Fredrick Klison of Hampshire placed second in another big class with his senior yearling bull that was reserve junior male champion at Charlottetown earlier this year. Edison B. Mutch of North River placed third in the senior bull class with his sire Edgeale Beacon Jersey's Standard. This animal was grand champion at the Royal for Mr. Mutch two years ago and he

was the top Canadian bull at the show again this year. Both animals that beat him in the class were from large American herds. One of them was the grand champion owned by four American breeders and shown by Charles Folck and Son of Springfield, Ohio. This bull has shown five times against River-north Jesters Standard Dreamer, the bull that Mr. Mutch bred and took to the grand champion's circle at the Royal three years ago. The Dreamer beat the Folck bull three times and lost to him two occasions. The Dreamer was reserve grand champion at the famous Jersey Jug show in Ohio this year.

Reg Clark of New Wilshire placed fourth and fifth in a big class of senior yearlings in milk. Junior Boswell was just outside the money with a very fine young Jersey bull. He placed in the money with another entrant, Mr. Mutch was in the money in several strong classes of females.

In a show that was rated one of the largest and stiffest seen at the Royal for many years, the Island showmen were well pleased with their showing. Classes numbering fifty or more were not uncommon in the big Coliseum where the cattle show is held.
