

Local and Other Items.

His LORDSHIP Bishop McINTYRE is at present visiting the various parishes in the eastern part of Kings County. Some changes in the location of clergymen, we understand, are contemplated. The Rev. D. Gillis, of St. Andrews', it is said, is to be located at St. Columba, East River. The Rev. Gregory McDonald will reside at St. Margaret's, while the Rev. P. Walker will be placed at Little Pond.

F. N. GIBBORNE, Esq., is now busily engaged making arrangements preparatory to the laying of a Submarine Cable between the Magdalen Islands and East Point in this Island. The cable will be laid, and the line extended from East Point to Souris, during the coming autumn. We hope that the Government coast telegraph scheme may prove abundantly successful. Mr. Gibborne is now at the Rankin.

We regret to learn that Dr. Strickland has resigned his position in the Fire Department as Captain of the Silsby Steam Fire Engine Co. Dr. Strickland is a man of large experience, having been connected with the Fire Department in this city for the past fourteen years—during which time he made many good suggestions and did most excellent service. Mr. Michael Mickey, 1st Lieutenant of the Company, has been appointed to the position vacated by Dr. Strickland.

PEDESTRIANISM.—Mr. Eph Clow has returned to the Island for a few weeks, and has issued a challenge to any pedestrian in the Maritime Provinces, which will be found in to-day's issue. Mr. Clow is a native of this place, and has a most brilliant record as a pedestrian. In September, 1879, he entered in his first walk, and since that time he has contested twenty walking matches, carrying off prizes on eighteen different occasions. We hope our "Canadian Champion" will have an opportunity of showing our people what he can really do before he goes back to Boston.

A CURIOUS specimen of humanity is at present "passing through" various parts of the Island, lecturing upon the Holy Land, River Jordan, etc. His presence creates considerable curiosity, especially among the juvenile population. His dress consists of a long black gown—"only that and nothing more,"—if we except a little red cap which gives him a well marked woodpeckerish appearance. His only companion is a Scotch setter—not a human setter but a dog—for which he says he paid \$1,500! and he doesn't appear to be much of a dog either. He and the dog live in a very unsophisticated kind of tent. He professes to be a Monk of the Greek Church, speaking 38 languages fluently, says he was a fellow student of Lord Dufferin's at Oxford, England, and guide to Mark Twain while he was writing his "Innocents Abroad." His lectures are quite interesting; and partly from the oddity of his appearance and partly from a desire to know something of the place where he came from, have been well patronized. Some say he is the missing link; others that he is Antichrist. Altogether, we may never look upon his like again.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.—This place of amusement, which has recently been so tastefully and creditably fitted up by Mr. Lindley, was last night unaccountably crowded by a fashionable and brilliant audience—including His Honor Lieut. Governor Haveland and suite— assembled to witness the production of "Ours" for the benefit of the Ottawa Team. The Band of the 82nd Batt. and detachments of the Artillery, Engineers and 82nd Batt. lent their assistance to produce the warlike effects necessary to the play. "Ours" is a military play, the scene being laid in the Crimea; but what the plot was is not so easy accurately to determine,—good deal—all in fact—being left to the imagination. As usual, Harry Lindley convulsed his audience, and owing to his untiring efforts it was, that the play did not drag more heavily. The necessity of "coming to the front" in order to make the play "go," however, placed him in positions which were apparently irreconcilable, as one scene presented him as the millionaire "bloated with wealth," whilst the next portrayed him as "chief cook and bottle washer" in a hut in the Crimea. Mr. Lindley is always sure of being successful in his efforts to please, and it is to be regretted that he has not a larger company to support him. The musical selections by the Quintette Club were very fine, whilst Professor Cayon's rendition of "Rhine Wine" and Mr. William's "Let me like a Soldier die," were both faultless and brought down the house—each gentleman receiving an *encore*, to which they were obliged to respond. To-night we have the first production of the most elegant modern comedy, entitled "Caste." Doubtless, many of our readers have seen the piece and will avail themselves of the opportunity of reviving their memories, and those who have not will find in its brilliant language, interesting plot, and good acting, a treat worthy of their acceptance.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.
CRAMAN CHOKI, Aug. 29.
 via LONDON, Aug. 30.
 Gen. Roberts marched from Kholati Gollzai for Candahar on the 25th. He took all the British garrison, and handed over the fort to the Ameer's officials. He is expected to reach Candahar on Monday and will attack Ayooob Khan on Tuesday. He has sent a plan for combined action with Gen. Phayre, if the latter can reach Takhti Pal on Monday. This however is impossible in consequence of the scarcity of food and forage and wholesales' desertion of the drivers. Takhti Pal is thirty-five miles south of Candahar.

SEMLA, Aug. 30.
 The retirement of Gen. Stewart's forces is practically completed without injury to the health of the troops and in perfect order.

CALCUTTA, Aug. 30.
 The more common impression is that Ayooob Khan will retreat towards Herat, and it is universally hoped that the Government will allow Gen. Roberts to follow him to Herat, if necessary.
 The cholera at Peshawar is dying out. Telegrams from Simla report that the Khyber valley is fairly quiet.

LONDON, Aug. 30.
 The *Standard* says the garrison of Kholati Gollzai and Candahar increase Gen. Roberts force to 15,000 men. Of these 1,000 will probably remain in the citadel of Candahar, leaving 14,000 for an attack on Ayooob Khan.

Gen. Roberts, in a message to Hartington, states that he arrived at Kholati Gollzai on the 23rd. He had abundant supplies, and could make his forage last until Sept. 1st. He would rest on the 24th and start on the 25th, and hoped to telegraph from Candahar by the 29th. Roberts left Ghuznee on the 6th and had marched 136 miles in eight days. His march had been unopposed. He had obtained plenty of supplies and forage, and cavalry and artillery horses were in good order.

PARIS, Aug. 30.
 The newspapers announce that the police will to-morrow visit Jesuit Schoolistic Institutions throughout France, to execute the decree against unauthorized congregations.

MADRID, Aug. 30.
 On the occasion of the expected birth of an heir to the throne, the Government will grant an amnesty to Cuban insurgent leaders now imprisoned in Spain.

PARIS, Aug. 30.
 The Government, as soon as the Chambers resume their sessions, will introduce a bill for the sale of that portion of the Crown jewels not considered of artistic value, but estimated to be worth seven and a half million francs—the proceeds to be devoted to the purchase of works of art.

Since the beginning of the year there have been one hundred and forty duels in France.
 Pere Hyacinthe, on Saturday, solemnized the marriage of Abbe Laine (until recently a priest of the diocese of Mans), with Madame Wochez. Hyacinthe warned them that they must be prepared to encounter persecution.

LONDON, Aug. 30.
 A Berlin despatch says that five Prussian officers of the general staff, comprising representatives of the infantry, cavalry, artillery and gend-armie, with the sanction of the German government and war office, have finally accepted appointments in the service of the Sultan, and leave soon for Constantinople. Some civil functionaries are expected to follow.

 The Treasury estimates that about \$4,000,000 of foreign gold will arrive at New York each week until the first of November.
