Reading Teacher Addresses H&S

KENSINGTON — Mrs. Robert Carruthers, Remedial Reading teacher at the Kensington Elementary School addressed the Home and School Association at the regular meeting held last week in the Elementary School Auditorium.

Mrs. Carruthers emphasized the importance of children becoming interested independent readers in this ever changing society. "Comprehensive reading," she said, "is the foundation for study in all subjects". When people are not reading at a level commensurate with their ability, individual remedial instruction is advantageous.

She named a number of causes of reading disability, and described the methods of diagnosis and instruction by displaying helpful charts and books. Mrs. Carruthers appealed to the parents to give their children appreciative, sympathetic encouragement in working towards success rather than by promising rewards to which the pupil may not be able to attain — thus causing a further hindrance through disappointment.

Mrs. Carruthers' clear presentation of the facts surrounding the need for remedial instruction was listened to with close attention by the audience of parents and teachers.

Mrs. L.K. Zielinski introduced the speaker and she was thanked by Boyd Baird. The president, Robert Carruthers, presided and the secretary, Mrs. Claude Hogg read the minutes. Mrs. Andrew MacLean gave a report and showed samples of material for drapes to darken the windows for school films. Mrs. Raymond Lavers gave the financial report. The attendance trophy was won by Mrs. Hill's room.

The music Festival fee of \$6.00 was voted to be paid, and voting members were named. Mrs. John McNay, Mrs. Lym a n Moose, Mrs. L.K. Zielinski, Mrs. Gordon Cousins and Mrs. Claude Hogg. Mrs. McNay and Mrs. Fenner Stewart spoke on behalf of a Girl Guide group being organized and a sum of money was voted for part of their expenses. Mrs. Keith Boswell was organizer.

SMU Huskies Almost Cage 125

St. Mary's University, displaying a strong running attack and defense, romped to an impressive 121-65 triumph over Ed Hillons Trinity Saints in a regular Maritime intercollegiate basketball game at the SDU gym Saturday afternoon.

Jim Daniels came up with a big spree for the Huskies while he was on the floor as he pumped 36 points through the twines. Second high for the visitors was Mills who hit for 20. Ed Lawlor came up with another big game as he caged 20 points for the Saints while team captain Posie Connelly accounted for another 11.

The game opened at a fast pace but SDU was able to keep the Huskies to a 6-6 draw in the initial stages of the match. Then the visitors full press began to take its toll on the smaller and less experienced and the core began to run up until the Huskies enjoyed a 32 point lead at the half, 65-33.

From then on in the Huskies poured it on with the exception of a few minutes in the second when their attack appeared to stall in the opening minutes. Midway through the half they switched to a three man zone with two men pressing the ball carrier but their attack proved just as potent out of this line-up as out of their full zone press.

Casper Takes Tourney

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Hometown favorite Billy Casper fired a last-round 64 for a 16-under par 288 and won the \$40,000 San Diego Open golf tournament by four strokes Sunday.

Tommy Aaron, who with Don January held the lead after three rounds, tied with Tom Weiskopf for second with a 72-hole total of 272.

The 34-year-old Casper shot rounds of 70-69-64 to win his 30th PGA tournament and it was his first triumph here although he lost in a playoff last year.

Casper had seven birdies, the longest on a 30-foot putt on the 14th hole, and could do no worse than par the other hole as he came to within one stroke of the tournament record—a 267 fired by Casper and Wes Ellis last year. Ellis went on to win on the first hole of a playoff.

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Slightly Injured

SUMMERSIDE — Saturday near Borden a 1961 Chevrolet driven by Harry Lee Ellis, RCAF Station Summerside, collided with a truck driven by Cyril Smith, Truro, Nova Scotia, injuring two of the Ellis children slightly. According to a city police report, the Archer vehicle was travelling east on Allan Street while the other car was going west.

Damage to the Archer car involved the left front fender, left rear door and left rear fender. The Vail automobile sustained about \$35 damage which involved the left rear fender and tail light. There were no injuries reported.

Businesses Change Hours

ALBERTON — Practically all places of business in Western Prince County will be changing their hours of business effective the week of Jan. 24-29. In Alberton, O'Leary, Bloomfield, Elmsdale and St. Louis business establishments will remain open Wednesday afternoon, Friday night and close Saturday at noon.

In Tignish and O'Leary the new plan has been partially in effect for some time. Although the actual number of hours open for business is the same the new system will give both management and staff the benefit of a more leisurely weekend. Under the old system stores closed Wednesday afternoon but were often open as late as eleven o'clock on Saturday night. Retail vendors in Tignish and Alberton are expected to adopt the new hours. A list of over 30 firms adopting the plan will appear in tomorrow's paper.

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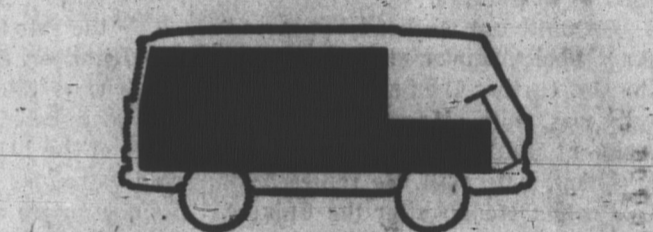
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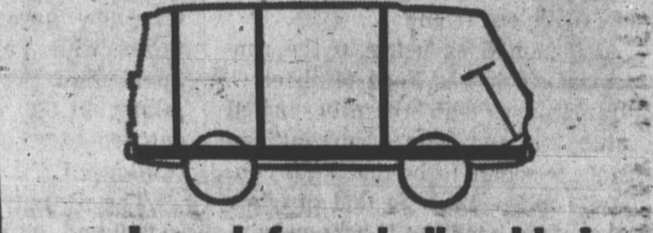
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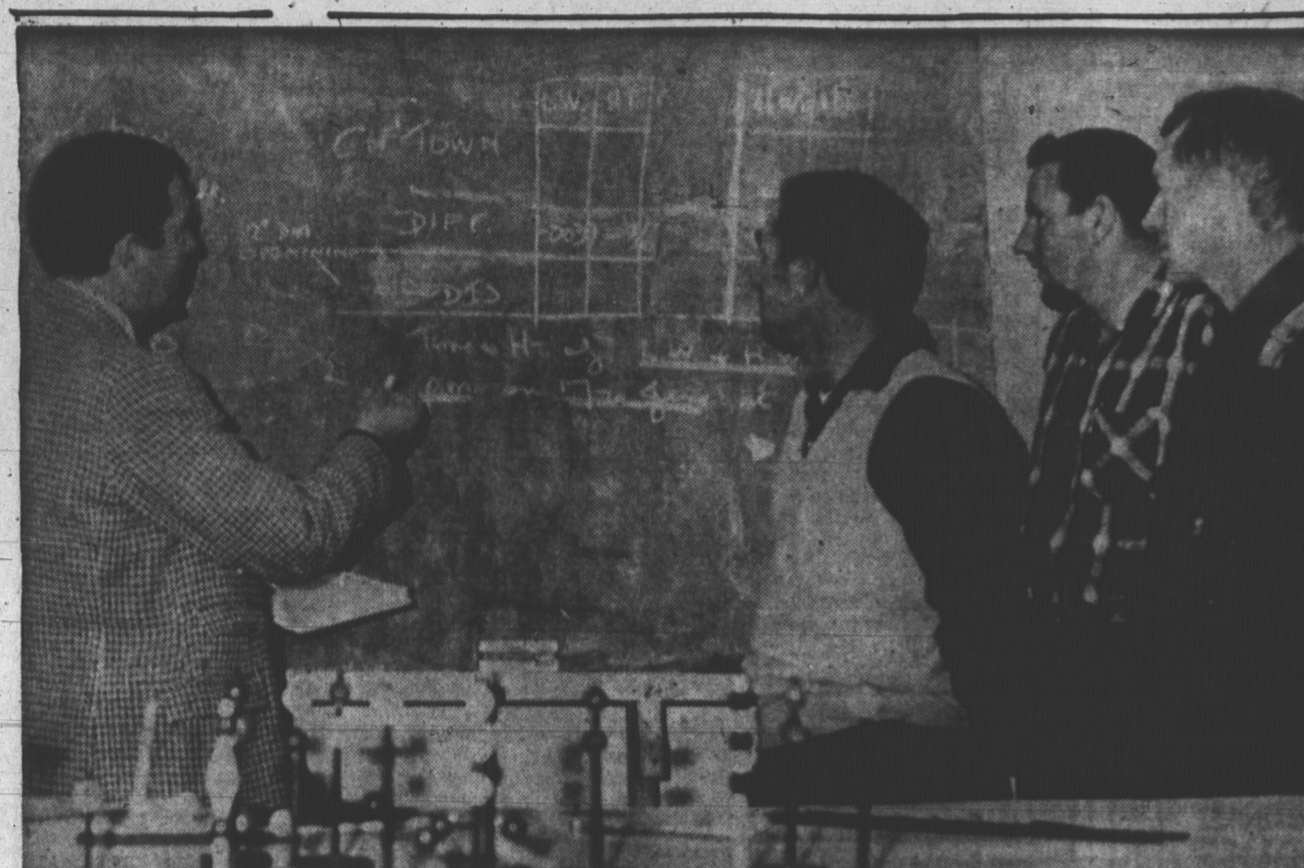


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A LARGE CLASS of 38 fishermen from Western Prince County are currently taking a junior navigation course in vocational school classrooms built in Alberton last fall by J.

W. Prince Trade Courses Get Heavy Attendance

ALBERTON — An intensive vocational extension program is presently underway in the Western Prince County centres of O'Leary and Alberton. Arranged by the department of education the program is under the direction of Cameron MacDonald, principal of the Vocational High School in Summerside.

In O'Leary two classes in motor mechanics, two in carpentry and one in plumbing are being held in the recently renovated Masonic Hall. Both practical and theory are taught in the building which was remodelled for the purpose.

In Alberton there are four classes in welding, two in motor mechanics one in plumbing and a class in navigation which has an enrollment of 38.

The classes in Alberton, both theory and practical work are taught in each trade, and are held in the new classrooms constructed for the purpose by J. Erskine Clark.

OFFICIALS PLEASED Officials of the department of education expressed pleasure with the splendid premises in both Alberton and O'Leary and also with the high attendance and enthusiasm shown by those taking the various courses. The extension program was started in West Prince in the school year 64-65 with meagre facilities for trade classes which consisted of two classes, one in

welding and one in motor mechanics. Theory only was given in the motor mechanics class which was held in Tignish, Alberton and O'Leary Regional High Schools. Welding was somewhat different as these classes, both theory and practical, were held in spacious shop rooms made available by Erskine Clark.

INSTRUCTORS Local instructors are employed this year if available.

The motor mechanics course in O'Leary is instructed by Percy Senter. In Alberton the instructors are J.C. Profit, motor mechanics, Robert MacWilliams

welding, J.A. Richard, assistant instructor in welding.

Captain John Palmer of Charlottetown is the instructor for the navigation course.

Plumbing, carpentry classes are instructed by William MacDonald and Ed Cooke.

Reigh Sudbury of Charlottetown is the senior instructor in motor mechanics and also supervisor of the extension program with Malcolm MacDonald of Charlottetown as supervisor. Other trade classes will be organized when enough applications are received. Registrations are accepted by Erskine Clark, Alberton or by phoning Alberton 25 or 201 and a personal contact will be made.

University Liberals Meet In Fredericton

Six delegates from the Saint Dunstan's University Liberal Club attended the annual convention of the Maritime University Liberal Federation in Fredericton, N.B. this past weekend. The delegation, headed by newly-elected president Mary Cullen, consisted of Leo Brodick, vice-president of the SDU Club, Bill Morse, treasurer, Paul Hickley, Liz Lawlor and Lloyd Solomon.

The theme of the conference was "The Future Role of the Liberal Party in the Atlantic Provinces". Discussion revolved around the current accusations that university political clubs are breeding grounds for party hacks. It was felt that steps must be taken and would be taken to make the clubs what they really claimed to be — the conscience of the Liberal party. It was resolved that each club be encouraged to criticize objectively and publicly the expedient political decisions taken by the national and provincial Liberal parties.

The Maritime Student Liberals also proposed that high schools and technical schools be admitted as part of their organization. This program has been carried out for two years by the New Democratic Party. The SDU club, in an immediate follow up on this resolution, is meeting with representatives of Charlottetown high schools Tuesday to discuss the establishment of new Liberal Clubs. The meeting will be attended by Gary Smith, executive director of the Canadian University Liberal Federation, who is arriving on the Island tonight. Mr. Smith has done a considerable amount of research on this project and is convinced that high school clubs have a definite part in producing more politically responsible people in Canada today.

In addition, the convention went on record as proposing a National Department of Education and abolishing all but the steering committee of the Company of Young Canadians which would serve as a submission board for the applications of already existing volunteer organizations in Canada. Major speakers for the weekend were Louis Robichaud, Premier of New Brunswick and Hon. Paul Hellyer, Minister of National Defence.

could hear the search plane flying overhead.

"I kept cranking with no success. No one came back. There was no emission from the transmitter."

"We were hanging on the edge of a table top shaped like one half of a saucer. The plane had about 10 feet to go before it would slip over the edge of the 3,000-foot ravine."

"So I took a compass and a parachute and started down. After descending for about a mile... I got clear of the fog. I stood on the ridge and let the red parachute go.

SEES SIGNAL A C-130 rescue plane circling the mountain soon spotted the signal.

"The pilot saw the parachute. I pointed out to him the site of the fuselage. I got back to the bird."

"The way back took me about 2 1/2 hours. The power of prayer got me back."

"I was frozen stiff when I reached the fuselage... They worked for three hours on me until I was warm again."

Then the blizzard died and on Saturday morning, the climbing party reached the site.

Smith was the only one able to walk. A helicopter from the U.S. carrier Forrestal flew him to Athens from where he was evacuated to Libya for a medical checkup.

Then he flew to Frankfurt, where he was embraced by his attractive blonde wife, Lee, mother of their five children.

Air force officers said doctors pronounced Smith in good condition. He had suffered a facial cut and a few bruises. The snow had softened the impact.
