THE LAND ACT AGAIN.

The PATRIOT, last evening, attempts to divert public attention from the real purport of the confiscation act passed by the Peters administration in the last days of the session.

Before the Land Commissioner's court in 1875 it was strongly urged by the Government of this Province that proprietors whose lands were being compulsorily taken under the provisions of the Land Purchase Act did not own the number of acres shown by their deeds and claimed by them.

Mr. Wilson, of Lennox, introduced a bill to amend the weights and measures act, in answer to a question it appears that the Governor General's warrants issued on account of Sir John Thompson's funeral amount to \$25,000.

He said that was the course pursued by the Conservative party. If the minority in the House of Commons were to be preserved, whether that minority be Roman Catholic or Protestant, it will have to look to the Conservative body which has controlled Canada since Confederation.
