Blue Cross Costs In Ontario Up

TORONTO, (OP)—An over-all rate increase in Ontario of about 26 per cent beginning April 1 was announced Monday by blue cross officials.

T. W. Ogilvie, director of the hospital plan which covers more than 1,750,000 people in Ontario, said the rate increase was caused by a rise of 15 per cent in the average cost of hospital care coupled with a 15 per cent increase in the incidence of admission.

The increase at the group rate are: 30 cents a month, for single ward, 45 cents a month for single ward-private, 75 cents for family ward, and \$1.05 for family semi-private.

Mr. Ogilvie said the last Blue Cross increase was in October, 1951.
