Three Teams To Boycott Browns On Night Games

NEW YORK, Jan. 30 — (AP) — New York, Boston and Cleveland today refused to budge from their plans to boycott St. Louis Browns on night games as American League owners discussed radio and television problems. Bill Veck, president of the Browns, has refused to permit telecasts of his team anywhere unless he shares in the receipts. New York, Boston and Cleveland have rejected Veck's suggestion and countered by removing the Browns from their night game schedules. "I figure that it will cost me something like \$30,000 if they don't let the Browns play in night games in those cities," Veck said. Veck hinted several weeks ago that he had worked out a plan which not only would force the three clubs to allow him two night games each, but also to make them pay him for television rights. He refused to elaborate then and would not talk of the plans today.
