#### OTTAWA NOTES

#### Change in the Cabinet.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17. Hon. Thos. Mayne Daly has been sworn in a Privy Councillor and Minister of the Interior, vice Hon. Mr. Dewdney, who has resigned to accept the governorship of British Columbia. It has been quite definitely settled that Parliament will meet about the middle of January, probably the 12th or 13th.

#### Dishonesty Disclosed.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 17. A. A. Dodge, chief clerk and cashier of the Intercolonial freight office in this city, is in gaol. He handled the money paid in for freight, and is charged with embezzlement. The reports says that his shortage amounts to \$5,000.

#### Marshall Punished.

LONDON, Oct. 17. Private Marshall of the First Life Guards, who figured in the recent mutiny at Windsor has been sentenced to 18 months imprisonment and to be dismissed from the regiment.

#### Lacrosse.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17. The Lacrosse championship match between the Shamrocks of this city and the Capitals of Ottawa, on Saturday was won by the Shamrocks—3 games to 2.

#### Football.

HALIFAX, Oct. 17. The football match between the Wanderers and Dalhousie was a very exciting game. Dalhousie has entered a protest and there has yet been no award.

#### Damage by Floods.

LONDON, Oct. 17. Reports of the damage by the floods continue to come from different parts of Great Britain and Ireland.

#### Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, Oct. 17.—10 a. m. Northerly to westerly winds; clearing weather; a little lower temperature, preceded by some light local rain.

#### General Telegraphic News.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 14.—Calgary advices state that prairie fires have done immense damage in that neighborhood during the past few days. The country has been swept from the Bow River to Red Deer in the north, and from Dry Pond in the west, to the Calgary and Edmonton railway in the east. Thousands of tons of hay, many buildings, cattle, and more than probable, several lives, have been snuffed out by the flames, which, owing to the high winds, spread with fearful rapidity. Men hauling hay to stack it had to unhitch their horses and ride for their lives. The best hay districts in the Northwest have been burned over. The conflagration is supposed to have originated in a hunter's camp fire.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—R. G. Dunn & Co's Weekly Review of Trade says: Once more it must be said that the trade conditions are entirely favorable. Trade throughout the country is somewhat larger than a year ago, although the situation was then exceptionally favorable, and in all great branches of manufacturing there is extraordinary activity. Business failures occurring throughout the country during the last 7 days for the United States is 189, for Canada 26; total, 215 as compared with 220 last week and 208 the week before.

TORONTO, Oct. 14.—Beer, wine and temperance drinks are at a premium in Toronto just now and the cold water man is out of the race. This is because of the official report on impurities of the city's water. The report submitted to the mayor shows that pumping station water contains 580 bacteria per cubic centimetre. A cubic centimetre is equal to about 15 drops of water. Thus the water is literally saturated with bacteria. There is undoubtedly a leak in the pipe laid across the bay by which the filthy water enters the conduit before the pumping well is reached.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—Very heavy gales prevailed last night over the northeastern part of England, Durham, Yorkshire, Lincoln and Norfolk being the worst sufferers by the storm. Reports from all along the coast bring tidings of wrecks and it is supposed a number of lives were lost.

At Rustico, on the 16th inst., Howard M. Churchill, aged 59 years.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, Henry Patterson, umbrella mender, was arraigned before Acting Magistrate Warburton, charged with committing an unmentionable crime. He was remanded for eight days.

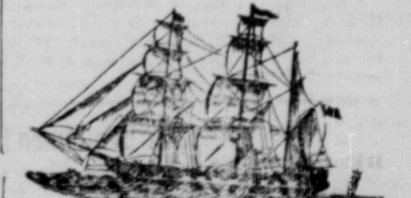
