Features of the Markets.

BOSTON PRICES.

April 17.

Eggs.—Receipts have been liberal this week, but there has been considerable improvement in the demand, and the market has been gradually gaining in strength. Choice western have been in good demand for the past day or two at 13c, and this morning some extra marks are held at 13 1/2 c. Eastern extras firm and in moderate demand at 13 1/2 and 14c.

POTATOES.—There has been a large increase in the arrivals this week and no improvement in the demand. Trade has been dull at the roads and stocks there have accumulated considerably. Prices have been ruling more in buyers favor and on domestic sorts have fallen off about 5c per bush. It takes a fancy lot of Houlton Hebrons to bring over 95c. Choice rose in moderate demand at 90 and 95c. Dakota Red, Burbanks, Stars, etc., sell slowly at 80 and 85 cts. Magnums have been steadily declining under the heavy receipts and close dull at \$1.90 to \$2 per sack. Island Chenangoes are selling at 70 cts.

FISH.—Trade continues light and there are very few changes to report in the condition of the market. Nothing doing in hbl. herring. Mackerel moving off in small lots at steady prices. We quote:—

FRESH MEATS.—Demand for all kinds of fresh meats has been rather slack this week. Beef has been selling slowly with prices ruling in buyer's favor. The supply of mutton and yearlings is fully equal to the wants of the trade, but prices hold fairly steady. Spring lambs are coming in quite freely and have only a moderate sale at prices ranging from 15 to 25c, according to size and quality. There has been a great over-supply of common veals, and the market for such has been extremely dull at 3 to 6c. Good to choice calves sell fairly at 7 to 9c, with a few extra at 10c, but there are few of the latter kind coming. We quote:

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 21.

In the House of Commons to-day, Hon. Mr. Chapleau announced that the Government intended to fulfil the promise made in the speech from the throne to introduce legislation in the interest of the laboring classes.

After recess, a long discussion took place on the Walker divorce bill, Sir John Thompson opposing it, holding that the only real grounds on which the women asked for a divorce was that her husband was not earning as much as he represented before marriage. No divorce would be granted except for adultery. He moved the 6 months hoist.

Messrs. Tisdale and Mitchell supported the bill.

Sir John Macdonald opposed it on the ground that it would establish a precedent calculated to promote demoralization and disintegration of society. He looked with horror upon anything tending to promote laxity in regard to the marriage relation.

Messrs. Davies and Weldon held that the evidence did not justify the granting of divorce.

This x months hoist was carried by 70 to 35.

Mr. Percell's bill to secure payment of wages of laborers employed upon railways subsidized by the Government was read a second time and referred to the Railway Committee.

Mr. Dickey moved the second reading of the bill to declare the Canada Temperance Act in force in several counties in Nova Scotia, notwithstanding doubts as to the validity of the proceedings of the law in force. The bill was read a third time and passed. The House adjourned at 11 15.

A Fire Raging.

LOUISVILLE, April 21.

A telephone message was received last night from Harrodsburg saying that a fire was raging which threatened to destroy the business portion of the town. It is supposed to have been set on fire by small boys. Total loss will reach \$100,000 or \$150,000.

A Vessel Seized.

NEW YORK, May 21.

The Inman Line steamship City of Berlin un-laded part of her cargo at the company's dock this morning, without having entered at the custom house. In consequence, the custom house authorities stopped the work and seized the vessel.

Prisoners Discharged.

NEW YORK, April 21.

Oliver E. Friend, Emily Howard, George Halstead and Orion A. Halstead, prisoners in the Tombs the past 16 months, in connection with the electric sugar frauds, were to-day discharged on their own recognizance.

An Islander Lost.

PORTLAND, Me., April 21.

The fishing schooner Hustler, of Gloucester, Mass., arrived to-day from L'Anse-au-Loup, P. E. Island, who was washed overboard.

The Indictments Dismissed.

NEW YORK, Feb 21.

Indictments against ex-Aldermen Wm. P. Kirk and Thomas Shield, of the Board of 1884, have been dismissed by the consent of the District Attorney.

STEAMERS' MOVEMENTS.—The steamer Princess Beatrice left Halifax last night, at ten o'clock, for this port, and is expected to arrive on Thursday morning.

The s'te'r Mer Carroll will leave Boston on Wednesday, the 30th April for her first trip to this port.

The St. Lawrence left Summerside for Shediac at ten o'clock this forenoon. Capt. Cameron reports the ice still in Summerside harbor.

The Princess of Wales left here at 6 o'clock this morning. She left Picton on return at 12 40 p. m., and will arrive here at about six o'clock this evening.

The M. A. Starr will be due in Summerside from Point du Chene sometime this evening.

The ferry steamer Elfin was launched to-day, and is now moored to Peake's Wharf No. 3.

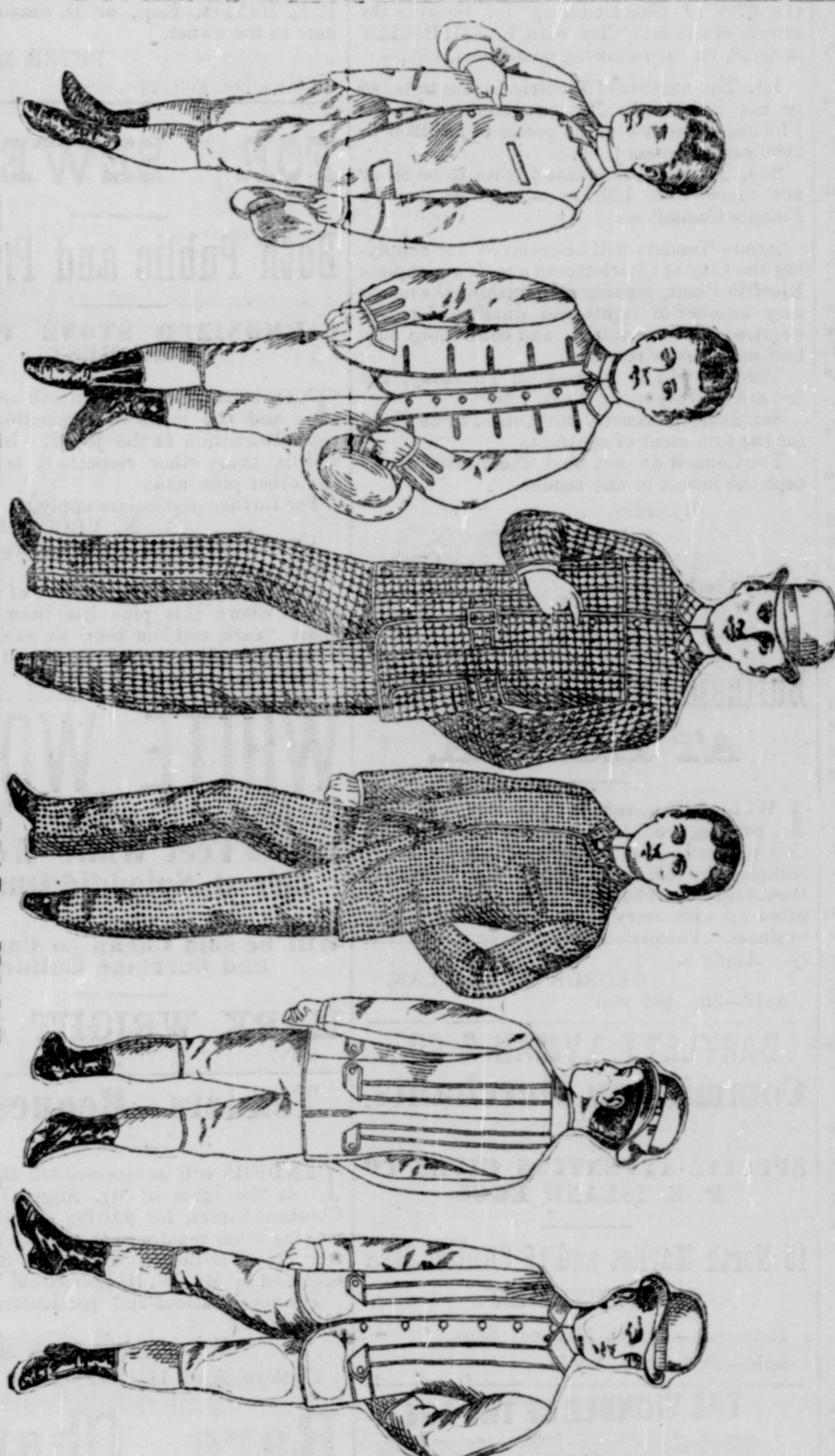
