Inspiring Address

By Rev. Dr. Aitken At Dedication

A memorable evening service was held in Cavendish United Church on August 17th. Despite a downpour of rain the Kirk was filled to capacity with an expectant and eager audience of worshippers.

The minister presided and conducted a solemn and beautiful dedication service of a handsome Pulpit Bible and beautiful pulpit drape, which were presented by the family of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Simpson of Bayview, in loving memory of their parents who had been faithful and humble workers of this church, Mr. Simpson, a life-long elder.

Dr. Melville Aitken spoke a few words in recalling this beloved couple and their loyalty to God and His church and concluded with an appropriate prayer.

Special music was provided in a well rendered duet by Mrs. John MacNeill and Mr. Olaf Stevenson, as well as a choir selection. The minister, in introducing the guest speaker of the evening said that Dr. Aitken was well known to the audience and although this was the first time in 26 years that he had been in Cavendish Church pulpit his successful career had been followed with a great interest. Dr. Aitken is at present senior minister of First United Church at Hamilton.

Before announcing his text, Dr. Aitken said he was pleased indeed to be present and to meet the friends of former days and recall some blessed memories. His text was in Deut. Chapter 6: "When thou shalt have eaten and be full: Then beware lest thou forget the Lord."

Man's enemy number one—the consensus of opinion, according to Dr. Aitken is that Communism is that enemy. To be sure, it is no weak enemy and how to overcome it is the question. He suggested prayer for the Russians and he quoted a few incidents of the power of prayer and declared that was more powerful than atomic bombs. The speaker then on to say while he did not belittle the power of evil in the three millions of Russians, yet they are not the number one enemy, but rather materialism and the worship of it. It is a case of Baal and not God, and they are doing that in private and in business which undermines democracy and destroys the influence for good. He said in essence, while the three million Communists in Russia come out boldly and say there is no God, there are those on the other hand who say there is a God but many while making the confession refuse to do His will and confuse the Christian church.

It was an inspiring and challenging sermon that could not fail to make a strong appeal to all who listened.

Strange But True

The Dead Sea or rather lake—is the lowest point on the surface of the earth. Fed by the Jordan River it has no outlet. Why? Because the water would have to flow uphill 1300 feet to reach the ocean. Then why, you ask, doesn't this lake fill up and overflow? I'll explain. The depression is so hot that 6,000,000,000 tons of Dead Sea water evaporate every day. If you tried to float in the Dead Sea you'd have difficulty in keeping your head above water. Why? Well, the head being the heaviest part of your body, it would topple over leaving you in an upside down position, a position which could cause you to drown with the greatest ease. To prevent toppling over bathers tie a rock to one ankle, then they can relax in the water and read a book, eat lunch, or take an afternoon nap.

Hard by the Dead Sea rises a mountain wall which the Arabians call El Mashnaka which means the Hanging place. From this vantage point the Holy Land spreads out in all directions; the glittering spires of Jerusalem, the River Jordan, the sea of Galilee, and the great depression itself. On the summit of the mountain stands the ruins of Herod's Antipater's Citadel, beneath whose dungeon John the Baptist gave up his head to please Salome, the beautiful woman who stole the heart of Herod and asked the king that "the head of John the Baptist be given her on a silver tray."

"Back in the banquet hall Herod troubled and silent slumped in his chair. Salome, unhappy too, and trembling, waits by his side. "Then the swordman returns and hands to Salome the present she had asked for." The blind bard, Homer, was accused by his critics of wide plagiarism. Horace, in his turn, has been blamed for the free use he made of the Greek minor poets, while most critics regard Pliny's Natural History as a heap of fables. The Jewish historian, Josephus, is accused of not having written his history for his own people so much as for the Greeks and Romans, whom he takes the utmost care never to offend. It's like the modern author refusing to describe the car in his story as a lemon because the magazine he aimed it at carried several thousand dollars worth of auto manufacturers' advertising.

Writers have always been extolled by one editor, and degraded by another. So men are valued! Their labors vilified by their fellowmen some of whom understand too little, and some too much. Only in rare instances has fortune condescended to be the companion of genius. While a hundred paths lead to her palace; there is but one open and that a very thorny one, for the pen jugglers. It is a sad commentary on the citizens of the world that in all too many instances men of genius were left to starve while their work was enriching the rest of mankind.

Of such persons modern literature abounds. Xylander sold his notes on Dion Cassius for a dinner; Comcoens of Portugal, deprived of the necessities of life, perished in a hospital in Lisbon; the illustrious Cardinal Bentivoglio of Italy died in his old age in dire poverty; Dryden for less than 300 pounds sold 10,000 verses; Spencer, the child of fancy, lived a life of misery. Anton Romatka, poet and critic of New York, struggled on in spite of partial blindness and other physical handicaps.

When writing please give your name, address and date disconnection is required.

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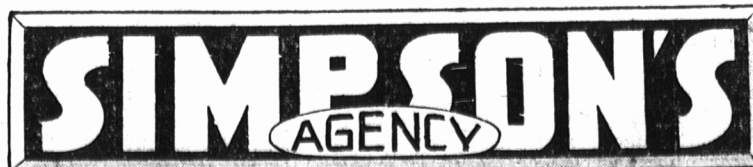
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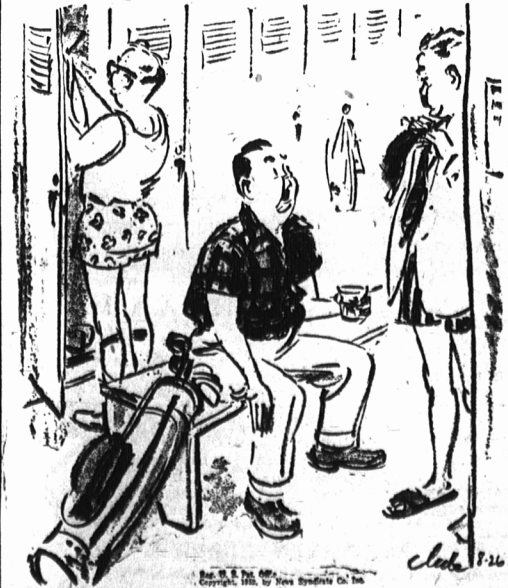
