

New Time Clock, Score Board Arrives At Forum

The new time clock, score board and period indicator unit that will grace the north end of the Forum during the forthcoming hockey season arrived here yesterday from Oshawa, Ontario, it was announced last night by Forum manager Bill Brown.

The combined unit that fulfills all three purposes at once has an overall length and width of 21 feet by 11 feet, with the clock face itself measuring six feet in width and 11 feet in depth. It has a blue hand indicating the minutes of play and a red hand the seconds. Describing it last night Mr. Brown stated "It is a beautiful piece of equipment."

The clock mechanism takes up the centre area of the unit with the lower part comprising the scoreboard that indicates up to 19 goals, while the four corners of the unit carries the period indicators including overtime.

The board is being installed by the Imperial Tobacco Company, which will send its own special supervisor here early next week to take charge of the work while the actual installation will be carried out by a local electrical firm.

Rovers And Stars Clash Tonight

The Northeast Rovers and the East End Stars will clash at Memorial Field this evening in a regular City Baseball League fixture at 5:30.

It will be the third attempt by the two clubs to run the game off, having had two earlier postponements, once on August fifth and again last Sunday, and will be one of three games left to be played in the regular schedule.

The other two games, Rovers at Anchors and Stars at Anchors, will be played on Thursday and Friday of this week respectively.

At the present time Rovers are in third spot in the league standing one game down on the leading Anchors, while Stars are in the cellar three games below the leaders. Falcons are in second place.

Black Hawks Bid For Place In Hockey Sun

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP).—Chicago Black Hawks made a bid today to rid themselves of the National Hockey League last-place stigma by pulling off the largest cash deal in N. H. L. history—\$75,000 for six players.

The Hawks paid that sum to Detroit Red Wings for forwards Jim Peters, Jim McFadden, George Gee and Max McNab and defencemen Clare Martin and Clare Raglan. The Red Wings also are to acquire a young Black Hawk player to be named later.

It was the largest cash deal since Toronto paid Ottawa \$50,000 for six players, King Clancy in the 1930s.

The largest estimated deal was believed to be the one in which Toronto gave five players worth about \$100,000 to Chicago for centre Max Bentley in 1947.

To Plug Defence

Johnny Gottselig, Chicago's coach, said the deal was designed to plug up the Hawk's leaky defence, a weakness which has plagued them for more than a decade.

Since 1938, when Chicago won its last Stanley Cup, the Hawks have been known as a high-scoring aggregation, but one which couldn't back check or body check well enough to prevent the opposition from scoring too.

As a result, they have wound up in last place four of the last five seasons, and last year, after a promising start won only 13 games to land again in the cellar.

Black Jack Stewart plugged the Hawk defence well enough to help win nine of those games before Christmas, but he injured his spine and the Hawks sank to their former level. Stewart was acquired from the Wings just before the season started.

In addition to bolstering the Hawks, Gottselig thought that the Wings, among the league's best, would be weakened by the loss of Gee and Peters, stalwarts of the second line which relieved high scorers Gordy Howe, Sid Abel and Ted Lindsay so effectively.

Would Be Powerhouse

"We should be strengthened offensively by 60 or 70 goals which should make us a powerhouse," Gottselig said. "Martin and Raglan will bring our defensive line up to the rest of the league."

Of the newcomers, Peters with 38 points is the top scorer. That would put the Verdun, Que. boy second only to veteran Roy Conacher, who had 50, in the Hawk scoring parade.

Martin, a native of Waterloo, Ont., spent the last two seasons with the Red Wings after playing with Boston Bruins. He's 29, five feet 11, and weighs 185.

Raglan, 23, is six-one and weighs 180. Born in Pembroke, Ont., he was a rookie with the Wings last season after a spell with Indianapolis Capitals.

Irish-born McFadden was named "Outstanding rookie of the year" and was awarded the Calder Trophy in his first season in 1946-47, while Gee, from Stratford, Ont., is a veteran centre who will return to the Hawks after two seasons with the Red Wings. He's a high scorer with 37 points notched last season.

McNab, 26, a centre from Watson, Sask., has suffered frequent injuries since joining the Wings four seasons ago, and may be ready to show his best for the Hawks.

The Winsloe-Harrington area is expected to be the chosen site again this year and it is hoped that the ladies of those districts will cater for the competitors and officials each day at dinner, a feature that proved so highly successful in previous trials held here.

In addition to visiting judges who have not been named yet, Dr. G. G.
