The Markets.

SIR.—For the past week, we have had
very hot weather, which has had a bad
effect on the fish trade, especially in dry
fish, dealers being afraid to handle at all
heavily.

In pickled fish stocks are accumulating,
and prices are barely maintained.

Receipts of mackerel from our shore fleet
are still very heavy, and as there is no im-
provement in size, the trade have taken on
about all they care to carry in stock, prices
have given way and sales have been made
as low as \$3 to \$3.50. There is a brisk de-
mand for large mackerel and they are
worth from \$10 to \$12, as to size and
quality.

Nova Scotia mackerel in light supply,
and late arrivals do not run much better in
size than our shore fish. Sales have been
made at \$3.50 to \$4.50 for mediums; \$9 to
\$12 for large.

The boat just in from the Island brings
some 700 barrels mackerel, which, if of as
good quality and size as last week's re-
ceipts, should bring \$11 to \$12 per barrel.
In dry fish we note a quiet market; de-
alers taking small lots; would quote large
pickled cured codfish \$4 25; mediums, \$3
per cwt.; large dry shore (4ench cured)
\$4.50; large dry Bank, \$3.50; mediums,
\$3; large pickle Bank, \$3.50; mediums,
\$2.75 to \$3; hake, \$2.25; haddock, \$2;
cusk, \$2.25; cod oil, 40 to 42 cents; her-
ring oil, 30 cents per small gallon.

Receipts of barrel herrings have been
quite large, and as demand is light, prices
are weak; large Nova Scotia shore splits,
\$4 75; round, \$2; gibbed, \$2 25; Bay Shore
gibbed, \$2 25; Bay Shore splits, \$2.50; Bay
of Islands splits, \$2.50; alewives, \$3.35;
salmon are in large supply and exceedingly
dull, sales at \$14 per barrel.

Eggs, dull at 19 cents per doz. for best
marks of Island and Nova Scotia; canned
lobsters, 1 lb. labelled, \$1.55 to \$1 60 per
doz.; mackerel, 1 lb. cans, dull at 75 cents
per doz.; blueberries, 1 1/2 lb. cans, in good
demand at \$1.30 per doz.

The Iron Duke's Heir.

A great sensation was caused in London,
by the announcement of the sudden death
of the Duke of Wellington, who dropped
dead of heart disease, while in the act of
stepping into a train at Brighton, to return
to London. His Grace, who was Knight of
the Garter, and Lieutenant General in the
army, was the eldest son of the Iron Duke,
and second holder of the title. His father
died in 1851. He was also Earl of Morn-
ington, the original title of the Wellesley
family, having succeeded to that peerage on
the death of his cousin in 1863. His heir,
who now becomes third duke, is Lieutenant-
Colonel Henry Wellesley, son of the late
Lord Charles Wellesley, and nephew of the
late peer. Colonel Wellesley was formerly
in Parliament.

It was erroneously stated that the peer
who died lately left children. He was
married, however, but had no issue. The
Duchess, who survives him, was a daughter
of the late Marquis of Tweeddale, Lady
Elizabeth Hay, a lady who was noted for
her great personal beauty. She is one of
the few English women who can claim the
intimate friendship of the Queen, and for
several years she was Mistress of the Robes
to Her Majesty, one of the highest posi-
tions a woman can hold near the throne.

The present heir presumptive, the new
duke having no children, is the latter's
younger brother, Lieutenant Colonel Arthur
Charles Wellesley, of the Grenadier
Guards, whose domestic life has been mar-
red by an unpleasant scandal. He was
married twelve years ago, to Miss Kathleen
Williams, by whom he had three children,
now aged, respectively, 11, 8 and 5 years.
After a few years of marital propriety,
the guardsman became enamored of
Kate Vaughan, a pretty and popular
dancer at the Gaiety Theatre.

Last summer he accompanied her upon her
provincial tour, and the scandal became so
notorious, that Mrs. Wellesley had no
difficulty in obtaining a divorce. The cli-
max of Colonel Wellesley's infatuation for
the pretty dancer was reached a few days
ago, when he took her to Paris and made
her his wife. As there is now but one life-
between Colonel Wellesley and the duke-
dem, it is not at all impossible that the
whim queen of the ballet may yet wear
the strawberry leaves of a duchess.

A good deal of amusement was recently
afforded London society, because Miss
Vaughan or Mrs. Arthur Charles Wellesley
declined to dance on a certain evening at
the theatre, for the reason of the death of
"a relative." The relative was the late
Lord Cowley. In explanation to those who
have not got Dubret's peerage at their
finger's ends, it may be mentioned
that the first Duke of Wellington
was a younger son of the Earl of Morn-
ington. Three of that nobleman's younger
sons earned their own peerages. One
became Marquis of Wellesley, another
Baron Cowley, a title subsequently raised
to an earldom, and the third, Duke of Wel-
lington, who was the father of the now
deceased nobleman. At the death of the
old Earl, the strange spectacle was pre-
sented of four brothers sitting in the upper
House as hereditary legislators, an earl, a
baron, a marquis and a duke.

It is now rumoured that Queen Victoria
is again worried by the behaviour of her
son-in-law, the Grand Duke Louis of Hesse-
Darmstadt. According to the latest reports
this festive widower is seeking still another
matrimonial venture, notwithstanding the
troubles brought about by his morganatic
marriage with Mme. Kalamier. His latest
fancy, it is said, is toward a lady who is
connected with the ducal court at Darm-
stadt, but who is much his inferior in rank.
She is also very much younger than the
Grand Duke, and is said to be very
beautiful.
