Upon the case being tried she alleged that her sworn information was untrue. To save her partner she sacrificed herself."

FROM JAPAN. - Under date of 10th Sept. Rev. Benjamin Chappell writes from Etsu Giakko, Aoyama, Tokyo, Japan. He says "I am at present enjoying Rev. Mr. Wadman's hospitalities. I have got to work and am enjoying it immensely. I fully believe that I have found my life work. Let me introduce you to some of my classes. I have a 'conversation class,' which means teaching English to those who know nothing of it. Then I have a class of reading in II Grade preparatory, and that too is both easy and enjoyed. In the college classes I have one class in each year, Freshmen, Rhetoric, Sophomore, Logic, Senior, English Literature. I have also four mornings of each week a class in Bible study. I have and will have in all, nineteen hours of teaching a week, so that I do not anticipate over-work. There is no trouble in the matter of discipline here at all. They are all so respectful. When we go to the Gakko at a quarter to eight, all leave their boots in the entry, both pupils and teachers, as the floor is so finished that the grit of the earth carried in would injure it. The students are generally in their bare feet. When the bell rings for opening, the teachers seated on the platform and the students in the body of hall, rise and bow to each other. Then devotional exercises are conducted, and the work of the day proceeds. I am already fond of the students, and expect to grow to like them very much. I have been at two parties. At such gatherings you would not think that you were in a foreign land. The country itself is full of interest, that will imagine, continue novel for a good while to come. I presented my first sermon in Japan last Sunday."

Investigation Begun

NO LIGHT YET.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 7. - The inquiry into the death of Mrs. McRae was commenced before coroner Berryman in the police court this evening. The attendance of spectators was very large - all eager to learn by what means the crown became possessed of the evidence which caused the arrest of Wm. McDonald. But they were disappointed. Although thirteen witnesses were examined not one furnished the desired testimony. The public are still in the dark as to the nature of the evidence in the possession of the Solicitor-General. All the witnesses tonight simply testified to the death of Mrs. McRae, and to the receiving of the candy. The investigation was adjourned until tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock; but it is not expected that the important part of the testimony will be reached before Wednesday at the earliest. All efforts to find out who the woman is that gave the information have proved fruitless, but that it was a woman is believed to be beyond the question of a doubt.

News from Halifax.

HALIFAX, Oct. 7. - Wallace Graham was sworn in Judge of the Supreme Court before Chief Justice McDonald to-day.

Rev. Mr. Wadman, a graduate of Mount Allison, has been appointed on the staff of the Anglo-Japan College at Aoyama, Japan. An Englishman named Hatch, aged 30 years, who outraged a six-year-old child at Economy, Colchester Co., has been sentenced to one year in jail and to fifty lashes on the bare back.

There will be an elaborate submarine display in the harbor on Wednesday afternoon.

Heavy Gales.

LONDON, Oct. 7. - Terrific gales prevail to-day throughout Great Britain and Ireland, and are particularly severe along the River Mersey. Much damage was done at Blackpool. At Lancashire it is blowing with tremendous force. In the Irish Channel a large number of shipwrecks are reported. The storm destroyed 100 yards of the Holyhead breakwater and isolated the light-house. The coast is strewn with wreckage. A large steamer is ashore off Aberffraw, Wales. In the Northern portions of England and Ireland numerous buildings were demolished, and several persons injured.

Marine Disasters.

DALHOUSIE, N. B., Oct. 7. - The barque Petricoudic, of Moncton, arrived here yesterday with the mast and eleven men of the ship Minnie Swift, of Me., together with nine men belonging to the barque Zeullette, of North Shields, and six cattle-men of the steamer Geograph. Four of the men, the stewardess, and Miss Masters, a passenger of the Minnie Swift, were drowned, and one man missing. The captain, two boys and two men of the Zeullette were drowned, and one man is missing.

Another Combine.

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 7. - Owing to annoyances caused by the Scott Act being enforced in Amherst, the proprietors of the Terrace, Lamby and Amherst Hotels have combined, under a cash penalty, for breach of agreement to close against all comers, from this date until they see fit to re-open their respective houses.

Cattle Seizure.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7. - A herd of cattle, comprising 325 head, belonging to Conrad & Co., of Maple Creek, N. W. T., were seized by the customs officials a few days ago. It is alleged that the cattle have been brought in without paying duty from Montana.

SHERBROOKE, Que., Oct. 7. - This was a most exciting day in the Morrison trial. Counsel delivered eloquent addresses, and the jury were looked up for the night. A verdict is expected to-morrow morning.
