The Anglo-Russian Dispute.

AN UNSATISFACTORY ARRANGEMENT.

Queen Victoria and the Zar.

LONDON, March 17. The newspapers of the city, without exception, comment on the arrangement with Russia in regard to Afghanistan as vague and unsatisfactory. It cannot affect our demand for the withdrawal of Russian outposts.

It is now said that Sir Peter Lumsden is not at Herat, but that he is still encamped at Gubran.

There are rumors here that letters have passed direct between Queen Victoria and the Zar.

It is stated that a division of the garrison in Tartary has been ordered to Turkistan.

LONDON, March 17.

In the Commons this afternoon, in reply to a question by Hon. Edward Stanhope, as to the truth of the report that the Russians in December last declined to withdraw from the positions they occupied beyond Sarakhs, despite England's request, Gladstone said that as a matter of fact this request had lapsed.

A New Russian Loan.

VIENNA, March 17. Von Blumroeder was negotiating with other capitalists with the view of placing a new Russian loan. He is not only one of the most eminent bankers in Berlin, but he is also confidential adviser of Prince Bismarck in financial affairs.

Ammunition for El Mahdi

SUAKIN, March 17. A slave show, loaded with ammunition, landed yesterday at a point ten miles down the coast. The ammunition was carried into the country to the rebels.

New Brunswick's New Judge.

OTTAWA, March 17. Dr. Tuck has received the appointment of Judge vice Weldon, deceased.

[This disposal of the slander telegraphed a few weeks ago that the Government intended to withhold the appointment until after the coming election in St. John, so that all who desired the vacant Judgeship would be "stimulated" to exert themselves in the contest.]

A Polar Expedition Snowbound.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 17. A despatch from Irkowsk states that the Polar Expedition under Baron Tull and Mr. Bange is snowbound near Tundren. It is feared most of the members of the expedition have perished.

A Fatal Skate.

NEW YORK, March 17. Joseph Cohen, aged 26, one of the contestants in the recent six days roller skating tournament, died yesterday from exhaustion.

Irish Conservatives Kicking.

LONDON, March 17. The Irish Conservatives in the Commons repudiate the leadership of Sir Stafford Northcote, and are forming a separate party wing.

Kassala Fallen.

SUAKIN, March 17. Native spies just in report that messengers have arrived in Osman Digna's camp with news that Kassala has fallen.

The Prince of Wales' Visit to Germany.

BERLIN, March 17. The whole press is jubilant over the proposed visit of the Prince of Wales to Germany.

The Parnell Manifesto.

LONDON, March 17. It is denied that the Parnell manifesto has been submitted to Crown solicitors.
