**IMPERIAL FEDERATION.**

**Sir Charles Tupper's Views.**

**Laurier's Scheme of Imperial Representation Absurd.**

LONDON, July 30.—In an interview yesterday Sir Charles Tupper said that the French Canadians' loyalty to Great Britain was as largely due to the knowledge that the annexation of Canada to the States would result in the abolition of their privileges, as to laws, language and religion.

Sir Charles said that he regarded Sir Wilfrid Laurier's plan for the formation of a Great Imperial Parliament as hopelessly behind the times and impossible of success, because such a body must include in its powers the right of taxation for Imperial purposes; therefore its membership must be framed somewhat upon a population basis, which would mean that in a few years the populous colonies would utterly swamp the voice of England, who would never submit thereto. Secondly, the colonies will never submit to the surrender of their autonomy, nor would they hand over a large part of their powers to a body thousands of miles away.

Sir Charles said that his idea was a scheme of preferential trade within the Empire. Under a ten per cent. duty on corn and meal, Canada would supply England with all she needs. He believed that England would ere long restore the duty on corn. He regarded Sir Wilfrid Laurier's trade scheme as absurd, and altogether and entirely misunderstood by the English people. In conclusion, Sir Charles Tupper declared that under a low tariff Canada nearly went into bankruptcy.

**A NEW DEPARTURE.**

OTTAWA, July 30.—A new departure has been made in the headquarters staff of the militia of Canada by the adoption of the policy of substituting a purely professional staff for a mixed staff of military men and civilians.

Edward W. Miller has been appointed appraiser at Toronto, with Jas. Sinclair as his assistant.

WINNIPEG, July 27.—The Calgary Herald states that from all parts of Alberta reports come that this is the best crop year ever known.

SINGOR, Ont., July 27.—The wheat crop of Norfolk county is the greatest the present generation of the farmers has seen. It is estimated the yield will average fully thirty-five bushels to the acre with many returns of forty and forty five bushels. The recent rains have not done any damages as yet.

NORTH SYDNEY, July 28.—Donald McKay a boatswain of the steamer Elliott, fell down the hold of the steamer tonight at the G. M. A. pier and had both arms broken, besides injuries to the spine and back. The Elliott leaves tomorrow for the wrecked steamer Baltimore City.

WINNIPEG, July 27.—Mr. Harry O'Connor, of the C. P. K., who has returned from a Western trip as far as Moose Jaw, and south to Estevan, speaking of the crop prospects in districts through which he passed, stated that in some places there will be a light crop, but on the whole there should be a 25 or 30 bushel per acre yield.

RIMOUSKI, July 28.—The axe of the political executioner has chopped off the heads of the collector, assistant collector, postmaster, health officer and inspector of government works at Rimouski, all of whom have been replaced by friends of the new regime. One characteristic appointment is that of Amable St. Laurent, assistant collector, the one man in all Canada who hoisted a flag when the news reached here that Sir John Macdonald was dead.
