Growers Fear Frost Damage

Fears were expressed here yesterday that strawberry and tobacco plants may have been damaged by frost, which is believed to have hit some low-lying areas in the province Tuesday night. Weather observer Warren Burns said yesterday that the ground or grass level temperature plunged to 24 degrees Tuesday night, which is eight degrees of frost, although the air temperature was recorded at 35.

There was no immediate comment available from tobacco growers. A Cross Roads strawberry grower, Earl Balderston, said there was no damage to any of his plants, although he added that there might be frost damage to berries in lower locations. Mr. Balderston's land in the Tea Hill area, is fairly high.
