A VERY SUDDEN DEATH
 At a Meeting of the Reform Association

Called to Discuss the Matter of Party Patronage.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—Mr. E. Leblanc, one of the city license commissioners, dropped dead at a meeting of the Ottawa Reform Association last night. The meeting was called to consider the question of party patronage. A resolution was presented to condemn the city members for their action on certain patronage matters which created great excitement, and it is thought it affected Leblanc, who, after speaking strongly against the motion, sat down and immediately collapsed.

 LONDON, Oct. 1.—A despatch from Madrid says that a rumor prevails there to the effect that an important communication has been received by the Spanish Government from the leaders of the Cuban insurgents suggesting the basis of a possible settlement of Cuban difficulties.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

QUEBEC, Sept. 29.—The Marchand Cabinet has decided to have a session of the new Legislature early in November. The heads of departments are now busy preparing the ministerial programme to be laid before the people's representative.

QUEBEC, Sept. 29.—It is stated that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company have offered to construct a bridge at Quebec to connect their system with the Intercolonial Railway, provided that the government gives them a lease of the I. C. R.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 29.—Today was a record breaker in the number of cases of yellow fever reported, while the deaths equal in number those of any day since yellow fever was first discovered in the city. The increased number of cases has caused no general alarm, because the increase of deaths has not been in proportion, four only being reported. The death rate is a trifle under 12 per cent, when five or six days ago it was shown to be above 15.

MADRID, Sept. 29.—The Spanish Cabinet has resigned. The Queen has accepted the resignation, but has asked Gen. Azearra to continue in office till a solution of the crisis is found. Her Majesty will summon the leaders of the various parties and presidents of the chambers tomorrow to consult as to the situation. Senor Sagasta has been telegraphed for and it is believed that the liberal leader will be asked to form a cabinet. It is said he is in favor of superceding Captain General Weyler and of granting autonomy to Cuba immediately.

HAMILTON, Sept. 29.—Marion Hammel, the six-year-old daughter of a hotel-keeper at Ryckman's Corner, just south of the city, was playing yesterday with a bean in her mouth when it slipped into her throat and lodged there. A lady who was near by apparently relieved the trouble but at tea time the child began choking and died in fifteen minutes.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 27.—John Duck, an old Indian, objected to a bicycle on the historic Cariboo stage road across the mountains, mistaking it for a devilish contrivance. As the rider was fitting down the graded mountain side he shot at him with a rifle, bringing him down, but not killing him outright. Duck has been sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary for his criminal ignorance.
