Potato Boat Sets New Record At Georgetown

The Panamanian freighter Oddvar II docked at Georgetown at 9:15 last night. Captain Emory Horvath is master of the 1071-ton freighter. The ship will take on 40,000 bags of seed potatoes for ports in the southern U. S. A. being loaded by Associated Shippers, Inc.

The stevedores started work last night as soon as the boat docked to clear up the ship's holds and deck, and to put the damage aboard in preparation for loading potatoes this morning. The ship was brought into port by pilot, Fordan Gotell, assisted by co-pilot, Victor Rafuse.

The C. G. S. Saurel accompanied the Oddvar for some miles from Charlottetown when the boat left yesterday morning, having to break ice in the Charlottetown harbour to make a passage for the ship. The vessel arrived in Georgetown without any difficulty since the harbor is completely free of ice, even at this late date of the season.

The writer, in conversation with veteran pilot, Temple Gotell, who for the past thirty years has taken ocean freighters to this port, was informed that the Oddvar has broken all records, and that the latest clearing date of any ship leaving Georgetown was January 17, about twenty years ago and at that time there was ice in the harbor. Today there is not the slightest sign of any ice, even on the shores.

The Oddvar unloaded a cargo of fertilizer at Charlottetown. The Georgetown, Lower Montague ferry is still running, and will undoubtedly break its former record of last crossing of January 26th made over ten years ago.
