

Car, Truck Wrecked in Two Kings Mishaps

SOURIS — Two highway accidents, both involving single automobiles, were reported to have occurred in the northern part of Kings county during the weekend.

The first took place late Saturday on a curve near Madgeville when a 1956 Ford half-ton truck

went out of control on a curve and plunged off the highway. The truck ended up wedged tightly between two trees and was almost completely destroyed.

The second mishap occurred on the highway between North Lake and East Point and involved a 1962 Ford car driven by Rufus (Buddy) Sweeney of Elmira.

Mr. Sweeney is also said to have lost control of his car while rounding a curve and in rolling off the highway it was completely wrecked. The driver escaped unharmed.

(Continued from page 1) viet missiles should be removed from Cuba under UN supervision. Some Western diplomats believed that another aim of the Soviet dispatch of missiles to Cuba was to test general American determination to reply to Soviet incursions as a preliminary to a new hotting-up of the Berlin crisis.

If President Kennedy had not reacted so sharply over the Soviet actions on Cuba, they said, Khrushchev in his message Sunday also announced that he has sent a first deputy foreign minister, Vasili Kuznetsov, to New York for talks with United Nations Acting Secretary-General U Thant designed to assist Thant's "mobile efforts aimed" at the liquidation of the present dangerous position.

In his message, a copy of which was sent to the U.S. Embassy Sunday, Khrushchev said: "I express my satisfaction and gratitude for the sense of proportion and understanding of the responsibility borne by you at present for the preservation of peace throughout the world."

Winter Hits East Quebec

QUEBEC (CP)—Wintry weather struck eastern Quebec during the weekend, resulting in at least one death and dropping up to 16 inches of snow on mountainous regions.

Imelda Roberge, unmarried 70-year-old Quebec City woman, was killed on the Trans-Canada Highway near Lewis in a two-car collision that sent three other women to hospital.

Provincial police said the highway was icy Saturday morning when the accident occurred. About three inches of snow fell on Quebec City and district Friday and more was falling Sunday night.

Snow also fell on the Beauce, Gaspé, North Shore, Lower St. Lawrence and Saguenay regions. Unofficial report said that 16 inches fell at St. Louis du Haut Haut' south of Rivière-du-Loup in the hilly Tricoucousta region.

At Roberval, 133 miles north-west of Quebec City, a fall of 12 inches was reported. At Rivière-du-Loup, La Malbaie and Forestville reported six inches while Port Cartier and Sept-Îles, far down the lower St. Lawrence, reported eight inches.
