YESTERDAY was the anniversary of the great fire in St. John, N. B.

THE City Council meets to-night to receive the report of the Assessors.

THE examinations of the City schools commenced at Queen Square School on Thursday.

EXAMINATIONS.—The King's College local examinations of Matriculants will commence in Charlottetown to-day.

COL. LAURIE'S Tannery at Oakfield, N. S., was burned to the ground on Friday last. Loss, \$20,000; insurance, \$9,000.

THE terminal examinations of the St. Peters Boys' School commences to-day, and will be continued daily till June 29th.

ST. DUNSTON'S COLLEGE.—The closing exercises of the examination and distribution of prizes will take place on Friday, the 25th inst, commencing at 2 o'clock p. m.

THE young men, McDonald and Whitlock, summoned for breaking Mrs. Campbell's windows and door on Saturday night, the 12th inst., produced evidence in Court to-day which proved they were not the persons who committed the act, and they were discharged.

THE Nova Scotia Methodist Conference is in session at Truro. On Friday last it was reported that no ministers connected with the conference had died during the year, whereupon the members of the conference rose to their feet and sang "Praise good from Whom all blessings flow."

THE Rev. Mr. Lockwood, who died after being rescued from the Narragansett disaster, had been reading Paine's Treatise on Reason before the disaster. On the fly-leaf he wrote: "If I go down with this boat to-night, I would be ashamed to have this book found with me, were it not that I read it to refute its doctrines."

CRICKET.—A cricket match between the "rights" and "lefts" of the Phoenix club, was played on Victoria Park grounds on Saturday afternoon. The ground was thoroughly watered in the morning, which made the pitch in fine condition. The "lefts" went to the wickets first and scored quickly, the second wicket being down for 65 runs, two or three wickets fell suddenly and then another stand was made, the whole side being disposed of for 122 runs. Of these Mr. John H. Yeo contributed 34, J. A. Longworth 23, R. Higgs 19 and B. Davies, jr., 13. The "rights" then had their turn, and were quickly put out for 21 runs, the highest score made being 5.

PEDESTRIANISM.—Quite an interest is already manifested by the sporting fraternity, acent the walking tournament which takes place next Thursday in the Skating Rink. There will likely be a large entry list as the prizes offer big inducements. Mr. Fransham has entered for the contest, wishing to make amends for his failure at Halifax. Mr. Jos. R. Leggett, the great New Brunswick champion, arrived on Saturday night, and is staying at the Osborn House. He intends entering for the walk and will no doubt give a good account of himself. He has a splendid record, having won several matches in the United States and taking third place in a 72 hours tramp recently in Boston.

BODY RECOVERED.—On Saturday afternoon, at three o'clock, the body of Captain Smith was discovered floating in the water at Conolly's wharf. The police were notified and the Marshall had it towed to Pownal wharf. Dr. Beer was summoned and held an inquest on the body. Two witnesses, Messrs. Wm. Brandage and John McLean, were examined, and a verdict of "found drowned" was returned. The body was in a good state of preservation but the face was totally decomposed. It will be remembered that Captain Alfred Smith mysteriously disappeared from the schooner "Maria Emma" which was lying in the street off Conolly's breastwork, on Sunday the 16th of May last. The crew were absent from the schooner at the time and whether he accidentally fell overboard or committed suicide by jumping over is unknown.

A boy named John Brogan, and a man named Philip Smith, were examined at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, charged with breaking into Kensington Brewery. The evidences of Mr. John Harley, brewer; Samuel Gregory, and Charles Cameron, policeman, were heard, and showed that at five o'clock on Sunday morning a shutter was discovered broken off a small window and the cellar door was open. The door was shut and the shutter replaced. Mr. Harley went to breakfast, and on returning found the shutter again displaced and the cellar door open. Perceiving that something was wrong, he closed the door a second time, again replaced the shutter, and remained in company with Gregory in the brewery. At noon, the prisoners came up, carrying with them a can. Smith took off the shutter, Brogan then went into the cellar and opened the cellar door for Smith. Gregory, on seeing them enter, went into the cellar. On his appearance Brogan escaped through the window, and Smith made a speedy exit through the door. Both ran off to the woods where they were shortly afterwards arrested by the police. They were remanded for eight days.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

MONTREAL, June 18.

There is a proposition to take the 65th Regt. to France and England, the expenses to be made up by concerts when they get there. The band will be recruited by the addition of the best talent in New York and Boston. It is the intention to take over 400 men, and the total cost of the trip is estimated at \$60,000 or \$150 per man.

OTTAWA, June 18.

Several influential Ontario papers advocating the abolition of the Kingston Military College.

Fortin, the man with many wives, was sentenced to-day to two years and a half in the Penitentiary at Kingston.

The Grand Jury this morning found a true bill against Bennet for the murder of Hon. Geo. Brown.

The Frenchmen of Montreal will celebrate as a National Day the 14th of July, which is the anniversary of the Demolition of the Bastille.

A deputation of the friends of Mr. McNamee waited on that gentleman yesterday to signify their continued confidence and sympathy for him, as an honest, fearless, independent citizen; and to request him to accept a public demonstration on his exit from prison. The invitation was declined.

The "Doutre" claims will not be argued till September next.

One Mary Murray, a church thief, has been arrested. When Detective Cullen entered her house, he saw a strange spectacle. There stood a woman in an inner room attired in priestly robes; not content to wear one purple and gold robe, she had on four, while prayer beads without number hung about her neck. She was surrounded with prayer books, surplices and church ornaments in rich abundance, the whole presenting a scene as sadly ridiculous as could well be imagined. The detective's spoils amounted to twenty prayer books, fifteen sets of beads, four stoles, one gold chain, two gilt hearts and crosses and several surplices.

This morning and afternoon were taken up by the Presbyterian Assembly in the discussion of a divorce case, otherwise Mrs. Philips' marriage. She was married to her first husband in 1870, with whom she lived two years. After this time she separated from her husband on the ground of his committing adultery, which was abundantly proved. Owing to the difficulty and expense of obtaining a divorce in Canada, which is said to cost \$1,500, on account of the unwillingness of certain Roman Catholic members of the Senate to grant a divorce on any consideration, she applied to one of the courts of the United States and obtained a divorce and afterwards married Mr. Philips. The question was conceded that she had a right to a divorce, but that the divorce obtained in a foreign country is not acknowledged by British law and inasmuch as she had evaded the law of the land and was legally bound by her first marriage, that she should not continue to remain in full communion with the church. It was finally decided that she could not remain in full communion of the church until she gets a divorce in Canada.

The question of marriage with the sister of a deceased wife was discussed at some length, and it was finally resolved to appoint a committee to watch over and take such steps to avert such legislation as has been proposed by the Parliament of Canada.

The General Assembly will continue its session through the night until all work is finished.

NEW YORK, June 18.

All that remains of the "Narragansett" at high tide above water is part of the walking beam, and the gallows frame is burned as far as can be seen. Divers report the cargo all out forward and everything is gone above the cargo deck, the main stairway covered with debris, some of the balusters burned and smoke pipes lying on the starboard side on top of the freight. They will have to move them before they get the freight out. She is gradually settling down in the sand. No more bodies were found yesterday; sixteen bodies have been recovered by wreckers and taken into Stonington, where fifteen have been identified. The body yet at Stonington unidentified is that of a little boy. The last of the baggage was delivered yesterday, wet through; the express packages were also wet.

BERLIN, June 18.

In the supplementary Conference of the diplomatists, to-day, during a discussion of the question of boundary lines between Bulgaria and Roumania, which is one of the unsettled issues connected with the Treaty of Berlin, Austria suggested that Arababia should belong to Roumania, Bulgaria only receiving sufficient land for the erection of a bridge across the Danube to Silistria, which is situated on the right bank of the Danube about 37 miles north-east of Shumla. The prospects of an amicable understanding between the central and Northern Albanians is said to be increasing.

LONDON, June 18.

A despatch from Sydney, New South Wales, says the parliament of that province has decided to raise the existing export duty on wool, cattle and hoops, in order to raise the money needed to pay for the internal improvements now in progress. The alternative to create a loan, and the proposed method of meeting expenses was proffered by leaving men, both of parliament and by the press.
