

City, N.S. Firms Given Contracts

OTTAWA — (Special) — Contracts of \$43,721 and \$46,849 have been let by the public works department for wharf repairs at Georgetown and Beach Point, P. E. I.

The announcements were made by John A. Macdonald, member for Kings County.

The \$43,721 contract was awarded to County Construction Company Limited of Charlottetown for repairs to Queen's wharf at Georgetown.

Specified completion date is April 7, 1960.

Work will consist of repairs to the outer block of the wharf which is seriously deteriorated through age. Steel sheet pile walls will enclose the existing untreated timber crib which will be removed to two feet above low water.

The space within the wall will be refilled with stone ballast. The walls will be tied back with steel tie rods and the existing treated timber span connecting the headblock to the remainder of the wharf will be replaced with a creosoted timber span.

The \$46,849 contract was awarded to R. A. Douglas Ltd., of New Glasgow, N. S., for repairs at Beach Point. Specified completion date is April 30, 1960.

Work will consist of repairs to the outer blocks and spans of the wharf. Steel sheet piles tied with steel tie rods will be driven to enclose the existing area of untreated timber crib blocks and outer span.

The existing untreated timber span connecting the wharf approach to the blocks will be replaced with a concrete deck on creosoted timber beams.

The work is designed to provide an improved wharf and landing facilities for fishermen of the area.

Plans and specifications for both construction projects were prepared by the Charlottetown office of the harbors and engineering branch of the work department.
