## ANOTHER COLLISION BETWEEN STEAMERS Occurs Near Dartmouth, England.

ANOTHER DISASTER IS FORTUNATELY AVERTED.

Touching Scenes when the Passengers are Rescued.

DARTMOUTH, England, Sept 10.—The passenger steamers Landana and the Knarwater came into collision yesterday and the Landana was sunk.

Despite the fact that the ships carried some hundreds of passengers and crew, no life was lost.

The Knarwater struck the Landana amidship in a dense fog.

The passengers on the Landana, numbering 45 persons, were as quickly as possible ordered into the boats.

The people having been in bed when the collision occurred, many of them were nearly naked.

They were mostly negroes bound to Africa and were so terrified that they were with difficulty restrained from jumping overboard.

After safely reaching the Knarwater the people all fell on their knees on the deck of the ship in prayer.

The women were coolest among the passengers during the time of peril.

## THE AGREEMENT WITH GERMANY. Terms of the Arrangement That Britain Has Made.

AFRICAN MATTERS SETTLED.

German Recognition of English Rights in Egypt—Transvaal Shut Off.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—The terms of the Anglo-German agreement, which is the principal topic of the day here, are stated upon good authority to be in the main as follows:—

The first point is that Germany and England have come to a complete understanding on all African questions. In February, 1895, Germany made a formal claim upon Lord Kimberley, then British Foreign Secretary, for the maintenance of the status quo in South Africa, the especial object being to protect the Transvaal from British control. Germany now withdraws absolutely from the claim, and leaves Great Britain a completely free hand in South Africa.

The German and British Ministers further agree to give a joint Government guarantee of a loan to Portugal to enable her to meet the award of the Swiss arbitrators regarding the Delagoa railway. Arbitration is to decide the amount of compensation due from the Portuguese Government to the McMurdo concessionaries of the Delagoa railway. The concessionaries being largely American, the United States and British Government have long been jointly pressing for the compensation. The Transvaal thereby becomes an enclave and Kruger loses his only chance of an arbitration outlet to the sea.

The agreement further provides that all steps necessary for England's acquisition by amicable arrangement with Portugal of part or all of Mozambique shall receive the assent of Germany. Germany also agrees to recognize the permanence of British occupation of Egypt when next year England will ask Europe for a curtailment of the jurisdiction of the fixed tribunals.

As a quid pro quo, Germany secures a settlement of the frontier in Togoland. The neutral zone, called Dambaland, between Ashantiland and Togoland, is to be divided, giving Germany of the bulk of the zone. The river White Volta is, as far as possible, to become the dividing line between German and British sections. Further, the British Ministry agrees, to assent under certain conditions, to the arrangement which the German Emperor expects to make with the Sultan during his approaching visit to the Holy Land, and to facilitate German colonization in Asia Minor.

These are the important features of the agreement, some of which must be made public when the Portuguese loan is announced. But behind this understanding, of which the public soon will have official information, there is believed to be a secret agreement giving Germany more in the nature of a quid pro quo.

The statement published here to-day that England and Germany also have agreed upon the joint creation of a railway through the German sphere of Shantung in China to the British sphere of the Yangtse-valley cannot be confirmed, but co-operation has been long in the minds of the British Ministers.

## TROUBLE IN CRETE NOT YET ENDED. Another Bombardment May Take Place.

THE TOTAL NUMBER OF DEATHS IS FOUR HUNDRED.

Horrible Story of Atrocity Committed by the Turks.

ATHENS, Sept 10.—News was received here from Candia late yesterday that another bombardment was imminent.

The fires in the town still continue. Four hundred deaths are already attested, and martial law has been proclaimed.

Rome, Sept. 10.—The Italian Cruiser Lombardia, with 320 men on board, has been ordered to Candia.

LONDON, Athens, Sept 10.—The correspondents of the Daily Mail says that horrible stories of atrocity are told by refugees from Candia,

They say that the Bashi Bazouks cut open the bodies of their Christian victims on the first day of outbreak, and threw the entrails into the flames shouting "Now let the English come and help him."

### THE QUEEN OF HOLLAND.

Fired at by a Would-be Assassin.

BERLIN, Sept 10.—The Lokal Anzeiger says that at a fortnight ago, an attempt was made to assassinate Queen Wilhelmina near Amersfort, in the province of Utrecht on the road between castle Soostdyt and Saars.

A man emerged from behind a tree and fired a revolver at Her Majesty.

The bullet missed the Queen but ploughed through the cheek of the lady in attendance.

The would be assassin was arrested and is supposed to be an English anarchist.

### German Prince ill With Dyphtheria.

BERLIN, Sept 10.—Prince Augustus Wilhelm, the fourth son of the Emperor William is suffering from dyphtheria.

The younger children have been removed and the Empress alone remains at the palace with the patient.

### THE LAST BATTLE.

10,800 Dervishes Killed; 16,000 Wounded; and Between 3000 and 4000 Prisoners

LONDON, Sept 9.—The British War Office has received a despatch from General Sir Herbert Kitchener, the commander of the Anglo-Egyptian forces, dated from Omdurman, Monday, saying that over 500 Arabs, mounted on camels, were despatched after the fugitive Khalifa Abdullah this morning. The general added that the dervish leader was reported to be moving with such speed that some of his wives had been dropped along the road followed by him.

The Sirdar says:—"Officers have been counting the Dervish bodies on the field, and report the total number dead found about 10,800. From the number of wounded who crowded to the river and town it is estimated that 16,000 were wounded.

"Besides the above, between 300 and 400 Dervishes were killed in Omdurman when the town was taken. I have as prisoners between 3,000 and 4,000 fighting men."

## THE PLANTERS OF BARBADOES Demand Aid From British Government.

CANNOT SEE ANY OTHER WAY OUT OF THEIR DIFFICULTIES.

The Question of Annexation to the States Incidentally Mentioned.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Sept. 10.—The conference of West Indian representatives at the island of Barbadoes, has passed a resolution formally demanding aid from the British Home Government, as a matter of right, and as being the only available remedy for the industrial crisis, and has also demanded the adoption of measures either for the exclusion of bounty-fed sugar from the English market or the enforcement of countervailing duties.

No ultimatum looking to American annexation was adopted, although the question was incidentally discussed as a possible future contingency to offset Cuban and Porto Rican competition in the American markets, should Great Britain conclusively refuse the relief demanded.
