POY KILLED.—While playing in his father's barn recently, the twelve year old son of Ephraim Mathey, of Mathey settlement, Tracadie, Antigonish, fell from the scaffold and was instantly killed.

W. & A. R.—The revenue of the Windsor & Annapolis railway company for the year ending September 30th was \$56,471, an increase of \$2,434 over the previous year. Of the increase \$2000 was from passengers and \$438 from freight.

BRAKEMAN KILLED.—An Intercolonial Railway brakeman, named John Cooper, accidentally fell between the cars in the North Street depot, Halifax, a few days ago, and was instantly killed, his body being almost cut in two. Cooper was 25 years of age, and belonged to Shubenacadie.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, William Purcell was sentenced to one month's imprisonment for common assault on Mary Jane Kinslow. The evidence was not sufficient to sustain the first charge. Purcell's defence was that he was merely playing with the child and had not the slightest intention of doing her any harm; that he was naturally fond of children.

BOSTON MARKETS.—An official circular of Jan. 1st says: The potato trade is light, owing to cold weather, with Island Chennangoes ranging from 75c to 85c, according to quality. The supplies of all kinds of eggs are running short. Strictly fresh laid are firm, but are too high to sell very freely. Held stock is closely sold up and in good demand. There is also a good demand for lined and choice marks, selling readily at 23c. The fish market is dull and unchanged.

SCOTT ACT MEETING.—The Scott Act meeting in Market Hall, last evening, was largely attended. William Heard, Esq., was chairman. The meeting was addressed by Rev. John Read, Rev. J. A. Gordon, Rev. James Carruthers, Hon. D. Laird, Mayor Haviland and Mr. Spence. Messages were read from ex-Mayor Howland, of Toronto, and Father Phelan, of Montague, expressing the great interest they took in the contest, and trusting that the Act would be sustained.

MARINE NEWS.—A Marblehead despatch dated Dec. 31st says: Capt. Martell, of the British schooner Morien, from Charlottetown, P. E. I., arrived at Lynn Dec. 27, and reports that on Dec. 21, in lat. 42.44, lon. 66 53, he passed a schooner on her beam ends, port side out of water, maintopmast broken by the cap and held on by the rigging, mastsheads painted white, hemp rigging, top edges of cabin painted blue, port anchor lashed in on deck. Appeared to be a fisherman, anchor being long stocked. Judged by her appearance that she had not been long in that condition. She appeared to be about 80 to 100 tons burden. Was unable to read her name owing to heavy sea.

CORRECTION.—In reference to the Souris notes published in THE EXAMINER on the 26th ult., we are informed that up to the 26th only three steamers loaded; there were no square riggers loaded there these two years. A number of schooners did load, however, but not 110. J. G. Sterns (not G. G. Sterns) never loaded a schooner for Knight & Morrow. He ships on his own account all he loads, and, besides, bought several cargoes loaded at other ports. In all, he has shipped over 50,000 bushels potatoes this fall. We regret exceedingly the insertion of the erroneous notes, and trust that in future correspondents will confine themselves to facts.

DR. KOCH'S LYMPH FOR CONSUMPTION.—We learn from an authoritative source that Dr. Koch is greatly agitated because the wholesale manufacture of lymph has proved a failure. Originally the lymph was prepared in small phials, but Minister Gassler ordered the speedy manufacture of large quantities. Now that the time for the process has expired, Dr. Koch finds that his lymph is totally spoiled, and his own private preparations of lymph material are destroyed. "The society of Practical Medicine," says Reuter's Paris agent, "heard a communication from Dr. Petit, who claims to have composed by synthesis a fluid precisely similar to Dr. Koch's lymph. The Doctor produced two phials, one containing his own lymph and the other Dr. Koch's. The appearance of each was the same, and Dr. Petit declared that the reactions produced by his lymph in the laboratory corresponded exactly with those obtained with the German lymph, while the experiments made upon tuberculous animals by means of this preparation gave identical results. We are pleased to announce that Dr. Gen. A. Baynes, of our city, has obtained a supply by last night's mail of the "bacillus virus," and is about to administer the same to patients suffering from tuberculosis in all its forms. He has also sent for a supply of Dr. Brown-Sequard's now celebrated Elixir, which used jointly with the "virus," sustains the failing health till the "virus" takes effect.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Irish Difficulty.

LONDON, Jan. 7.

Advices received in this city from Boulogne state that O'Brien has been empowered to ask Justin McCarthy to retire from the chairmanship of the anti-Parnell section of the Irish party in favor of John Dillon, M. P., or, it is understood, the Conference agreed, if O'Brien preferred to do so, that he (O'Brien) could serve as chairman. According to the same advices, O'Brien and McCarthy are to have an interview at Boulogne to-morrow, when a final settlement of the subject will be made. Gladstone, it is understood, has secretly approved of the plan decided upon. The Parnellites say he is pledged to abandon Parnell if he proves insincere in the pledges. Parnell and party have returned to England.

The Cattle Trade.

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.

The live stock investigation continued to-day and was, perhaps, the most interesting session of the series. Ex-Alderman Frankland and several Ontario gentlemen testified that on the whole Pimmsoll's theories were torn to pieces. In fact, it had been abundantly proved that with permanent fixings cattle can be taken over both in winter and summer without any harm to the stock. It came out, however, that the attendants aboard ships are shamefully treated, and that the food is poor and in some instances they had to eat meat from the buckets used for watering cattle.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, Jan. 7.

The West riding regiment is to be removed from Halifax to Barbadoes. Early in March it is expected the 17th regiment will relieve them here.

The lost body of Nicholas Baldwin was recovered this morning from the scene of the Cunard's wharf disaster. This makes the number of bodies recovered seven.

A Liberal Conservative convention at St. Peter's, C. B., today, nominated J. A. Gillis for the House of Commons.

The nomination was endorsed by the Nova Scotia Cabinet Ministers.

A Valuable Property.

OTTAWA, Jan. 7.

The representatives of the Carthusian Works have registered their trade mark in Canada for the Liqueurs Chateau, the value of which may be judged from the fact that the Monastery has declined three million pounds sterling for its complete assignment. This is the highest amount ever declined for any commercial signature.

Distress in Glasgow.

GLASGOW, Jan. 7.

Much distress has been caused among the poor classes of this district on account of the railway strike. The suffering increases daily and the stoppage of the many factories now idle through lack of fuel has thrown thousands out of employment who in no way are directly concerned in the struggle between the railroad companies and their employes.

Skating Championship.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 7.

Joe Donahue, amateur champion of the United States and Canada, to-day won the international mile skating race in three minutes and two-fifths seconds, and followed this up by winning the five-mile race in 16 minutes 2 1/2 seconds.

FIRE IN NEW YORK.—The fire that started at midnight on the 3rd destroyed the Fifth Avenue Theatre, on the corner of Broadway and 23rd street, leased by Harry Miner, also Hermann's Theatre adjoining, and also badly damaged the upper portion of the Strutveant House, also dwelling occupied by Mrs. Peter Gilsey. The buildings all belonged to the Gilsey estate. The Fifth Avenue was lately refurbished and decorated by Miner at a cost of \$50,000. Fanny Davenport lost a coat of \$50,000. The scenery of "Cleopatra" costing over \$40,000, about half mate places the loss at \$267,000. A careful estimate. The damage to Hermann's Theatre insured is about \$25,000. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

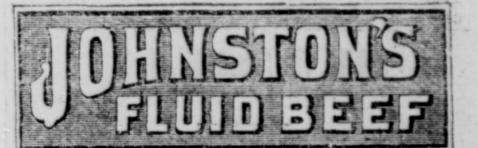
