

Local and Other Items.

FOR HALIFAX.—The steamer Princess Beatrice left for Halifax yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock with a general cargo. She is due here next Thursday.

LARGE WHEAT YIELD.—Messrs. J. J. and N. Campbell, of Cardigan Bridge, had 998 stooks of wheat in one field this autumn, all of which was splendidly filled, and will thresh well.

BUSINESS AT CARDIGAN.—Considerable property is changing hands near Cardigan Bridge, and several new buildings are being erected. The prospects for a prosperous fall trade in that vicinity are excellent.

A VALUABLE CARGO.—Messrs. Morson & Morgan, Cardigan Bridge, have commenced loading the schooner Cora Morrison for St. John's, Newfoundland. Her cargo will include cattle, sheep, oats, potatoes, etc.

DROP IN FLOUR.—The Halifax Chronicle says: During the past week there has been an appreciable reduction in family patent, superior extra and choice extra flour, averaging about 25 cents per barrel, while standard Canadian oatmeal and rolled oats have gone up about 5 cents per barrel.

The scur, Harriet Torrey arrived at Cardigan from St. Pierre, on the 11th inst., in ballast, and will load immediately for the same port.

LAUNCHED.—There was launched from the shipyard of James E. McDonald, Esq., Cardigan Bridge, on Thursday, Sept. 12th inst., the handsomely modelled schooner Carmena. This latest addition to the mercantile fleet is about 100 tons burthen, and is intended for trading between this island and Newfoundland, a business her enterprising owner is largely interested in, and one which is of great advantage to the farmers of Cardigan River and adjacent settlements.

The Great London Strike.

LONDON, Sept. 12.

At the conference between Cardinal Manning and the Directors of the Dock Companies to-day, the Cardinal found the directors not willing to agree to the compromise proposed by him, and that the terms the dock companies already conceded go into effect on November 1st, provided the men resume work. The Cardinal persuaded the directors to again consider the proposal and postpone their decision for the present. The *Pall Mall Gazette* suggests that an organization be formed for the purpose of raising the £100,000 necessary to pay the dock laborers six pence per hour from Nov. 1st to Jan. 1st. This is the amount the dock companies claim they would lose by advancing wages on November 1st instead of Jan. 1st.

Prison Treatment in Ireland.

LONDON, Sept. 12.

Balfour has written a letter in reply to Gladstone's remarks on prison treatment in Ireland, in which Gladstone comments upon the case of Conybeare as showing the absence of right judgment and human feeling. Balfour denies that the prisoner is suffering from a disease that justifies his release. He says the general treatment of Irish prisoners is more lenient than the treatment of English prisoners, and that of all classes of Irish prisoners these convicted under the crimes act obtain the largest share of prison relaxations.

The Storm Continues.

LEWES, Del., Sept. 12.

No language can picture the terrible scene along the coast. The wind is driving the rain with a force that cuts like hail. Half a mile's reach of sand between the town and the coast is tossing like a billow ocean, and bearing wreckage everywhere. Through the mist of spray and storm tattered sails and naked masts of scores of abandoned and dismantled vessels are dimly seen. Since Monday night the storm has raged without abatement.

Base Ball News.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 12.

In a game to-day with the Shamrocks the Bangors won, 8 to 7. Sullivan pitched for the home team and Priest for the visitors. It was a very exciting game, and the Shamrocks had it well in hand until the seventh inning, when costly errors and reckless base running lost them the match.

Another Big Fire.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 12.

Shoal Lake was almost destroyed by fire yesterday. A street of solid build blocks of buildings 500 yards long was totally wiped out in such a short time that the citizens practically had no time to save anything. The total loss is about \$45,000—insurance \$15,000. The cause of the fire is a mystery. There were no fatalities.

LONDON, Sept. 12.

Searle, who defeated O'Connor on Monday for the sculling championship of the world, has challenged O'Connor to meet him again and has also issued a challenge to Gaudaur.

Stanley Expected.

BRUSSELS, Sept. 12.

A cable despatch from Zanzibar to the Government of the Congo State says that Henry M. Stanley is expected to reach the Eastern Sea Coast about the end of October.

—A prominent railway director, of Quebec, on being interviewed as to the future of the Quebec, Montmorency & Charlevoix Railway, said that "the railway was the first link of the Intercolonial Continental Short Line, which, in a few years, will attain the borders of Labrador, and from there, three days navigation will reach the coast of Great Britain. The distance from Quebec to Labrador is 740 miles. Some years ago, English capitalists offered me the necessary funds to construct the Labrador line if, by any possibility, such a scheme could be proved. To-day, the plans of the scheme are so modified that its practicability can be easily demonstrated."
