THE TRANSVAAL CRISIS

It is greatly to the credit of Lord Salisbury that he has, throughout an exceedingly stormy period, been able to avoid war with the United States, Germany, Russia and other great powers by which the peace of the British Empire was successively threatened.

"I have received a petition from a considerable number of my subjects residing in the South African Republic praying for my assistance to obtain the removal of grievances and disabilities of which they complain. The position of my subjects in the South African Republic is inconsistent with the promises of equal treatment on which my grant of internal independence to that Republic was founded and the unrest caused thereby is a constant source of danger to the peace and prosperity of my dominions in South Africa.

This paragraph contains the pith of the whole matter. Bound by treaty to extend equality of treatment to British subjects resident in the Transvaal, the Government of which Mr Kruger is the head, has while taxing them heavily, treated British subjects as men without political rights of any kind.

But that law is held by the British in the Transvaal, - the Uitlanders - to be illusory "inasmuch as it gives no appreciable representation for many years to come, and is so qualified by restrictions and conditions of an arbitrary character as to make its ultimate effect exceedingly doubtful."

DREDGE WANTED AT NEW LONDON.

A correspondent at French River sets forth the importance and necessity of having the use of the steam dredge Prince Edward at French River. He says that "the people of this place, of both political parties have petitioned time and again for use of her services at New London," and that Sir Louis Davies was induced to promise that she should be sent there. Our correspondent remarks:

"The work we want done here (dredging the mouth of French River) will not take very long and is of vital importance to a large section of country, - saving farmers a long haul to ship their produce, besides affording good shelter and safe anchorage for boats and schooners."

In these circumstances, we presume that the dredge will, when she is on the north side, go to New London as well as to Malpeque. If this were the intention of the authorities the case against them in this regard is not so bad as it seemed to be; and it is only a pity that they are sending her at this late season.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

-It is significant, after all the bluster and talk of the Joe Martin wing of the British Columbia Liberals, that Hon. Alexander Henderson, the new Attorney-General, has been elected by acclamation in New Westminster.

-The discreet Guardian must of course condemn the Liberal party's affinity for such men as Scrimgeour. But it ought to go further and denounce the relationship of Tarte, Pacaud, et al. They are all unprincipled "birds of a feather" - though they are not all in the liquor business and have not all government bonded warehouses at command. The better way is to vote them all down.

-Discussing the work of the late session the Canadian Grocer says, "If the business transacted during the session of the Dominion Parliament just closed, was in proportion to the length of the session, the country would scarcely suffer if the House did not meet again for two or three years. But, unfortunately, there was no such proportion. The House was in session five months, and the solid business transacted during that time could easily be crowded into five weeks."

Whisky permits were some time ago, issued, said to be worth something like \$300,000 to the Government in revenue money, that was to be spent in building roads; but the Government, instead of carrying this out, cancelled these permits and gave permits to party friends.
