The Pictou Races.

BLACK PILOT WINS.

PICTOU, N. S., Oct. 8. The free for all race here this afternoon brought out Black Pilot, Whistler and Minnie Grey. Pilot won in three straight heats. He trotted in 2:35, 2:34 and 2:32. The time for the last heat, on a heavy track, has seldom been equalled in this Province.

The Wilmington Horror.

WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 8. A corrected list shows ten men and one woman killed, and seventeen men and three women injured by the Dupont powder mill explosion yesterday. All but three of the men killed were blown to pieces. The theory of the men is that the explosions were started by the soldering iron that is used in soldering tin covers on cans of powder. The work is extremely dangerous, and a man named Green was the only man trusted to perform it. It is supposed that the iron became too hot, and its heat fired the powder. The buildings destroyed comprise two magazines, packing house, press mill, canister house, mixing house, dust mill, grinding mill, small storing room, with soda house and charcoal house damaged. Of thirty or forty houses comprising the village of Upper Banks, but little except the stone walls escaped.

Shooting Affray.

DOVER, N. H., Oct. 8. This evening a young man, who gave the name of Hoitt, called at Edward M. Carr's second-hand furniture store and on pretence of wishing to sell furniture enticed Carr to Pass Street, where, after asking him for money, Hoitt pulled a revolver and fired five shots at Carr, four of which took effect. It is thought Carr cannot recover. His assailant was identified as Harry Holland, a notorious young fellow with a very bad record, and recently out of Alford jail. The police are hunting for Holland.

Unanimously Elected.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 8. The local opposition have unanimously selected George J. Colter, ex-M. P. P., of Douglas, George F. Gregory, Walter McFarlane, of St. Mary's and W. K. Allen, son of the Chief Justice, as their candidates for the coming election in York. They will enter upon the canvass of the county at once. The ticket is an exceedingly strong one.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 8. Cartwright and Laurier are announced to speak at Pembroke on the 21st inst. Plans are being prepared for the extension of the Supreme Court building here. The last Canadian sealing schooner of the season has returned from the Behring Sea to Victoria with \$18,000 worth of skins. The Minister of Finance is expected to return here to-morrow.

Collier's Strike.

WELLINGTON, Oct. 8. The strike of the colliers in Nanaimo has collapsed. The Union Company has now 34 steamers running and giving employment to 2000 non-union men.

MONCTON, Oct. 8. Gordon and Burrell, the tramps arrested on suspicion of having been concerned in wrecking an L. C. R. train near Ansgang on the 29th Sept., have been released, nothing being proved against them.

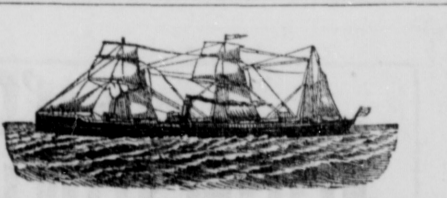
One of the Causes!

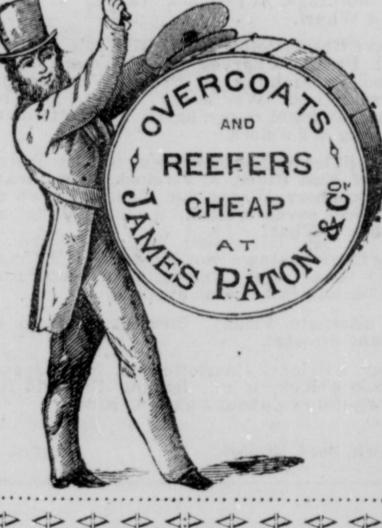
