PRINCE ACHILLE NAPOLEON MURAT is a not too fortunate stock-jockey in Paris. He is the grandson of a king. His father, Prince Lucien, is still living, his sister is the wealthy Duchess De Montchi, and his wife, Princess Salome, of Moniglia, brought him a million rubles for dowry, the gift of the late Emperor of Russia.

THE CAIR is about to present the Shah with a picture representing the late Emperor at various ages, the frame of which is in oak inlaid with gold and precious stones—cost over \$7,000. His Imperial Majesty has just bought for 6,000,000 rubles four large houses which are too near his Anichkoff Palace, from one of which a "Nihilistka" mine was once laid and in another Jelyaloff was arrested.

OLD lovers and admirers of the Empress Eugenie, and spite of the proverbial fickleness of the French people some such still remain, who were privileged to behold the august lady during her recent visit to Paris, express themselves as greatly shocked at her changed appearance. At the first glance all the change was not apparent—the old charm and grace were there still but on closer inspection you saw that beneath an overwhelming weight of sorrow the Empress' hair had become white, her cheeks hollow, that her complexion was the hue of wax.

The strangest phenomenon seen for a long time is now in view in Vienna. "Der Gummimensch," or the india-rubber man, is quite the queerest fellow imaginable. He is a pale, faccid man, with red hair and a bilious complexion. He an seize the skin of his chest with both hands, pull it way from his body about 18 inches, and raise it to the level of his head; and, when he leaves go, instead of this skin hanging in horrid folds, it goes spreading itself again, so that not a crease is to be discovered. The skin of his nose he can stretch 6 inches, the skin of his fingers 2 inches, so that his hands look sizes Nos. 20 or 30. The medical faculty are highly exercised about this man. There has not been such a case for two centuries.

Cash or Note Settlements.

We have been congratulating ourselves, says the Monetary Times, and not without good grounds, upon the pleasing fact that one great result from the severe lessons of the hard times of a few years back, is that credit is now less readily given by merchants, and that terms with respect to time are not so feebly liberal as they were. But merchants owe it to themselves to take care that the advantage thus gained is not lost with the improvement in business and the increased competition to which this gives rise. An American trade journal reminds its readers that after the panic of 1873 in the United States, jobbers were, as a rule, inflexible in their determination to sell on thirty days time only; experience having taught them the wholesome lesson that a loose credit system was an unsafe thing to build upon at any time. Hence the time was not only shortened, but applications for credit were very sharply scanned before they were accepted.

CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intituled 'An Act to Incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.'"

I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election for One Person to Serve as Common Councilman in the City Council for Ward Number Five of said City,

in place of HENRY B. SMITH, Esquire, resigned, will be held on

MONDAY,

the Fifth Day of December, A. D. 1881,

at the place following, that is to say:

In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Great George and Euston Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARD. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies North of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

Act 43 Victoria: "SEVEN days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councillors, the persons candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences, and addition of such persons together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination by such candidates."

"There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the election."

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
