A tragic train-car crash left sadness in the homes of Messrs. Jeremiah and Urban Doiron of Rustico when it claimed the lives of Mrs. Jeremiah, nee Sarah Doiron, 65, Mrs. Urban, nee Helene Gallant, age 25 and her son Marcel, age 4 1/2. The accident occurred December 12th, at Traveler's Rest crossing in the middle of the afternoon as Mr. Urban Doiron was driving to Summerside accompanied by his wife and two children and his younger son, Rene, escaped with minor injuries.

Marcel, older son of Mr. and Mrs. U. Doiron, died upon arrival at the Summerside hospital and Mrs. J. Doiron about two and one half hours after the accident while Mrs. Urban Doiron, for whom there seemed to be a chance of recovery, died three days later. Besides her husband, Mrs. J. Doiron leaves to mourn two daughters, Sr. St. Yvonne de Jesus, C. N. D., Miscouche Convent and Mrs. Cyril Buote; two sons Urban and Jean; three sisters, Sr. Jean d'Edesse, Mrs. Rosalie Gaudet and Mrs. Theresa McEwen; two brothers, Firmin and Ignace; also nine grand children. Two children, Sr. St. Jerome Martyr, C. N. D., Montreal and Joseph died several years ago.

Besides her husband Mrs. Urban Doiron leaves to mourn her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph G. Gallant, her grandfather Mr. Jack Gallant, three sisters Mrs. Leo Gallant, Mrs. Paul Gallant and Lilia; three brothers, Rev. F. Denis, Gilas and Dolph, her little son Rene and many nieces and nephews.

However great is the sorrow caused by the departure of these loved ones, a great consolation is derived from the fact that they were all blessed with the opportunity of preparing themselves to meet their Creator. Rev. Father J. C. Pitre, pastor of Rustico and Rev. F. Denis Gallant, were on their way to the same educational meeting in Summerside when they sighted the ruins of Mr. Doiron's truck and proceeded immediately to the hospital. As both the Mrs. Doirons were fully conscious, they were able to receive all the Holy Sacraments of the Catholic Church for the dying. From the time of the accident both were continually praying, sometimes very loud. Also present were Rev. Father Joseph LeClair, Rev. Sisters St. Yvonne and St. Jean and Ignace Doiron, all close relatives of the injured.

A largely attended funeral was held on December 15th, for Mrs. J. Doiron and her grandson, Marcel, in St. Augustine Church, Rev. Father J. C. Pitre, Pastor, sang Mass assisted by the Rev. R. F. Denis Gallant and Rev. E. Dalton as Deacon and Sub-Deacon. Present in the sanctuary were Rev. F. Joseph LeClair, The pallbearers for Mrs. J. Doiron were Messrs. Alban Gallant, Amos Gallant, Louis Pineau, Rodolphe Doucette, Peter Doiron and Edward Gallant and for Marcel were Messrs Vincent, Ivan and Lionel Doiron and Alfred Doucette.

Another large funeral was held Tuesday, December 18th for Mrs. Urban Doiron in St. Augustine Church, Rustico, solemn Requiem High Mass was sung by her brother Rev. F. D. Gallant with Rev. Father J. C. Pitre and Rev. E. Dalton acting as Deacon and sub-deacon. The pallbearers were Messrs. Arthur and Andrew Gallant, John Leo Doiron, Edouard Doiron, Francis Doucette and Art Peters.
