

Teacher Jpheld For Slapping Boy

SUMMERSIDE — Actions of a Summerside teacher in slapping an 11-year-old, grade three student who directed foul and obscene language at the teacher when she verbally chastised him for misbehaving during a school skating session at the Stadium, Feb. 27, was upheld by Magistrate H.S. Hinton, Q.C., in Summerside police court Saturday morning.

Magistrate Hinton said he felt that under the circumstances the teacher was justified in slapping the youngster who defied the authority invested in the teacher for maintaining order and discipline among school children.

The magistrate said the court would not be satisfied until the youngster apologized to the teacher for his unmanly conduct.

The remarks by the magistrate preceded convictions of Mrs. Kathleen Arsenault, on charges of assaulting two school teachers, Miss Marina Deignan and Miss Myra Murphy.

The charges resulted from an assault made against the two teachers by Mrs. Arsenault and her husband who had arrived home and reported that the teacher had slapped him.

Mrs. Arsenault, with the boy and a 13-year-old sister, returned to the stadium and a scuffle resulted which was broken up by two young men. No one was injured. Following the incident the two teachers laid assault charges against Mrs. Arsenault.

After the accused was found guilty counsel for the defence, G. Bruce MacDonald, made a strong plea for a suspended sentence because of the age and pregnancy of the accused. Magistrate Hinton deferred sentence until March 24, pointing out that the young brother has been the instigator of the whole incident, and should be made aware of his responsibility in the matter.

Chief of Police Peter R. White informed the court that the young lad, would in all likelihood be appearing before Judge Walter E. Darby in juvenile court prior to March 24.

Construction Contracts Show Increase This Year

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian construction awards for the first two months of the year totalled \$432,377,100, up \$90,979,800 from the corresponding period in 1961 says Southern MacLean building reports.

February contracts totalled \$202,263,800, up \$53,284,300 from February last year.

Two month figures by regions are: Residential \$1,223,600, down 15-307,800; Quebec \$117,798,200, up \$43,288,900; Ontario \$205,577,400, up \$44,144,600; Western \$87,900,900, up \$13,744,100.

February figures by categories: Residential \$62,522,500, up \$23,841,700; business \$73,135,300, up \$14,328,800; industrial \$21,795,500, up \$8,809,200; engineering \$38,600,100, up \$6,484,600.

February figures by regions: Atlantic \$600,000 down 57.1 per cent with only residential recording a gain; Quebec \$62,900,000, 72.4 per cent higher with gains in all categories; Ontario \$91,700,000, up 40.2 per cent with gains in all categories; Western \$28,500,000, up 38.7 per cent with gains in residential, business and engineering.

The figures represent about 90 per cent of total new and repair construction and more than 80 per cent of new construction.

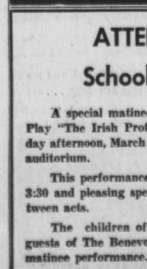
