

# Centenring Defered on Separate Counts

After pleading guilty to 11 separate charges, Raymond Francis Griffin, 61, of October Street, Charlottetown, was given an adjournment until Jan. 23 for sentencing by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday afternoon.

Of the series of charges, Griffin faced one of failing to stop at the scene of an accident, one of damaging a motor vehicle, one of tampering with a highway traffic sign and one of damage to garage doors.

Each of the other seven counts were for causing damage to rural mail boxes.

In all of the damage counts, damage to the boxes occurred in less than \$50.

With the exception of the charges which occurred in the Hazelbrook district, all incidents took place in the Bunsbury Mt. Herriot, Johnston's River area. The accused was not represented by counsel.

Following charges under the Excise Act, Harold Murdoch, Esq., Eidon, and Sterling MacKinnon, Esq., Eidon, were each fined \$100 and costs for three months in jail.

Accs was charged with illegal possession of a still, still, and possession of unlawfully manufactured spirits, and Gamble with having possession of approximately 100 lbs. of unlawfully manufactured spirits.

Assault Case  
Crown testimony was completed in the case of Mrs. Sheela Johnston, New London, charged with assaulting Mrs. Bessie Perry, New London, by striking her on the face with a stick of wood, and then the case was adjourned to Jan. 23.

Defence counsel is John J. Holmes, while the prosecution is being conducted by Alan K. Scales.

On charges of overtaking and passing another vehicle while travelling in the same direction and on a solid white line, Charles Maxwell Stewart, West Raptoc, had his case adjourned until Jan. 25, and Heston Hiram Herlihy, Cornwall, to Feb. 6.

Fleeing not guilty to speeding, Myron Ivan Turner, Wansley, was given an adjournment until Feb. 1, while Earl William Koughan, Johnston's River, charged with driving in a manner dangerous to the public, had his case adjourned until Jan. 25.

Having intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence an accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days, and for being intoxicated in a public place another was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Failed to Report  
William Theodore Giddings, Charlottetown, charged with failing to report an accident in which he was involved to the RCMP, had his case adjourned for five days.

A similar fine was levied on Robert Dorton, North Argyle Shore, for passing another vehicle over a solid white line.

Charged with permitting an unlicensed person to drive his vehicle, Joseph Matthew Gallant, Charlottetown, received a reprimand. The accused said he had not been aware that the person who drove his vehicle did not have a license.

Charged with driving on a highway, Waterville was fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving a motor vehicle with faulty equipment.

Charged with driving on the left side of the highway, Joseph Warrence Dorton, North Rustico, received a similar fine.
