There Ought To Be A Law

Fish Landings For September

OTTAWA, Nov. 7 (CP)—Landings of sea fish in Canada, excluding Newfoundland, declined during September over the corresponding period last year, but the month's catch, at 113,857,000 pounds, was 11.2 per cent below last year's September total of 128,281,000, but the landed value rose 15.6 per cent to \$8,629,000 from \$8,014,000.

In the cumulative period, landings fell to 934,628,000 pounds from 991,114,000 in 1950, while the value gained 12.8 per cent to \$58,548,000 from \$51,894,000.

On the Pacific Coast, landings of all species increased to 46,216,000 in September, 1950, and the value to \$5,983,000 from \$5,169,000. In the nine-month period, the catch advanced to 359,416,000 pounds from 358,763,000, and the value to \$32,510,000 from \$25,904,000.

Both the catch and landed value decreased on the Atlantic Coast during the month from a year earlier. The catch decreased to 67,741,000 pounds from 83,049,000, and the value to \$2,656,000 from \$2,845,000. In the January-September period, 575,212,000 pounds were caught, down from 632,351,000 a year ago, but the value increased to \$26,038,000 from \$25,900,000.

Complete New Expedition To Canadian Arctic

OTTAWA, Nov. 7 (CP)—Canada has completed another ocean-going expedition to study mysteries of her Arctic frontier.

The Defence Department announced yesterday that nine Canadian scientists, with a variety of skills, have completed a two-month, 6,000-mile Arctic tour aboard the Defence Research Board's 80-foot ship, *Cannolm II*.

Details of their work were not disclosed, other than it included studies of the western Arctic's geography, its wastes, waters and animal life.

It was understood, however, that one of the chief tasks was to study chances of the western Arctic being used by an enemy for attack by surface or submarine craft in the event of war.

The Department said the scientists collected a "considerable number" of biological specimens for the Fisheries Research Board, 300 birds and mammals for the National Museum, completed special surveys for the Resources Department and established four astronomical control points.

Led by T. H. Manning of Ottawa, the Research Board's special adviser on the Arctic, the scientists set out from Esquimaut, B. C. "Good weather and an exceptionally ice-free season helped the expedition to do considerably more work than had been expected," the Department said.

The scientists spent much time investigating the Beaufort Sea area north of the Yukon, and then eastward to Amundsen Gulf, about 1,500 miles north of Edmonton, defining the limits of the continental shelf and water characteristics.

They returned south by air, leaving the vessel to winter at the northern outpost of Tuktoyaktuk in the Mackenzie delta.

Mr. Manning was accompanied, among others, by Dr. W. M. Cameron, University of British Columbia Oceanography Institute, who took charge of the hydrographic and oceanographic program; F. G. Barber of Vancouver, hydrographer; and A. J. Dodman, University of B. C. hydrographic and oceanographic technician.

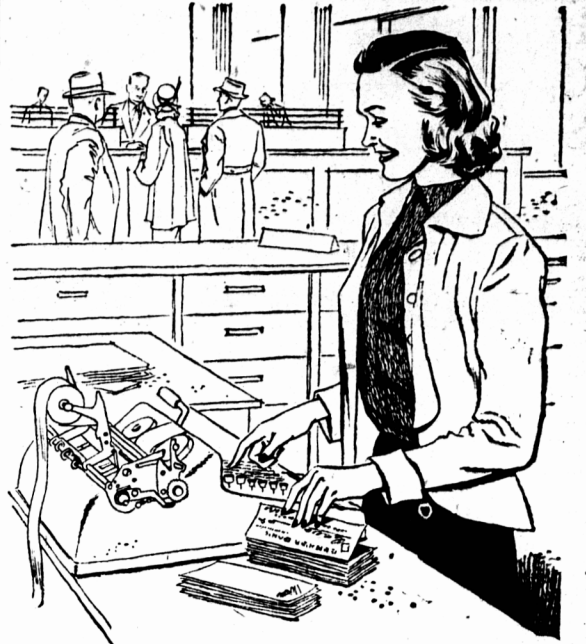
