## Drama Critic Makes Appeal

The following appeal was made over CBC radio yesterday morning by Nathan Cohen, drama critic for Toronto Daily Star, and a daily broadcaster on the CBC:

"When I heard a few days ago that Centre might close down I assumed it was a garbled press report I am shocked and appalled to learn that the story is correct. Unless the Federal government takes over a large portion of costs and guarantees continued support the Centre will close on November 5 just a little over a week away.

I find it unthinkable, I am absolutely appalled that the situation will be allowed to happen, that the art gallery, the library, the theatre in this fine complex, the building of which was jointly financed by the provinces and

the Federal government, and which was conceived as a national monument that they will cease to exist.

**OTTAWA DILATORY**

"Yes ever since July, when it became obvious to directors that they were exhausting their funds the Federal government has been absolutely dilatory in their attitude.

"Indeed it was only last week that Judy LaMarsh paid any attention to the urgent warnings which had been issuing from Charlottetown since July.

"She requested the directors to hold off any action until the cabinet considered the matter. She had been given one previous deadline, November 5 is the final and absolute one. After that there is no money to pay any salaries, to operate the departments, to continue the eight week and justly popular and meritorious festival of music and laughter.

**IT'S PREPOSTEROUS**

"The whole thing is so preposterous that I just cannot credit it. Of course there was never any question from the start that the centre would be dependent on its own sources of income. P.E.I. is the tiniest province in Canada. The Centre was conceived as something located in P.E.I. but designed to express the national character of the country; to be of particular benefit to the people of P.E.I. but to serve the whole land as indeed and particularly through its summer festival it has been doing.

"It is intolerable that it should be closed. And what makes the whole thing more grotesque is the piddling sum involved.

"I estimate between \$320,000 and \$350,000 per year. It seems to me there is an urgent obligation on the part of the Federal government to accept its responsibility urgently and gladly and if you should share my feelings let Miss LaMarsh know at once.

**NEVER REOPEN**

"The way these things are, if the Centre should close, it will never be reopened but will sit there dark and unused in Charlottetown, a blot on the face of Canada, an object of shame and disgraceful irresponsibility. It must not happen, you must not allow it to happen.

"Miss LaMarsh and rest of cabinet must be told immediately that it cannot close. There is precious little time left. Only until Nov. 5."

Canadian production of its Hamilton plant before it went out of business.

The company could not import American Studebakers because the U.S. parent company had folded. It therefore asked to import Volkswagens.

Mr. Benson and Industry Minister Drury have said the revenue department is investigating the transaction.

Mr. Diefenbaker said the investigation began only a few days ago.

Mr. Benson said he had already stated in the Commons—and to Mr. Diefenbaker privately—that the inquiry had begun several months ago.

Mr. Diefenbaker said he recalled that Mr. Benson had stated the investigation started "before yesterday." The minister was "very touchy" about the whole matter.

NDF Leader Douglas said he has been told that Studebaker still has a production credit that would allow it to import another 75,000 Volkswagens free of import duty.

He demanded that Mr. Benson advise the Commons whether this was going to be allowed. Would this "loophole" in the auto agreement be closed?

**QUESTIONS DEAL**

The deal involving 10,000 cars had been "a questionable transaction," depriving the Canadian treasury of the import tax that Studebaker had collected from Volkswagens of Canada, paying Volkswagens "a small fee."

Mr. Douglas compared it to an ordinary person selling goods to someone with diplomatic immunity, having the diplomat bring them into the country duty-free and then buying them back.

He said the House should be given a lot more information about the semi-judicial investigation Mr. Benson had mentioned. Was it a general or specific one? When did it begin looking into this specific case?

Also, he said, the eventual report of the investigation should be tabled in the House.

Creditiste Leader Caouette accused Mr. Benson of making a contradictory statement. He called the import deal a "shameful" ploy by Studebaker to pocket \$2,000,000 that should have gone into the federal treasury as import duties.

He urged the government to make sure that Studebaker does not make similar transactions in future.

H. A. Olson (SC — Medicine Hat) said the government should take "a long, hard look" at the auto pact and plug loopholes.

**HALIFAX (CP)** — The appointment of well-known Canadian business writer Forbes Rhude as a senior information officer on the staff of the Nova Scotia Information Service was announced Thursday by W.S.K. Jones, provincial trade and industry minister.

A native of Montague, P.E.I., Mr. Rhude entered newspaper work with the old Halifax Herald and later joined the Canadian Press, the news gathering and distributing agency for Canada's daily newspapers.

Mr. Rhude was business editor of CP from 1947 until his retirement in 1964. He has been engaged in business writing on a free-lance basis since 1964.

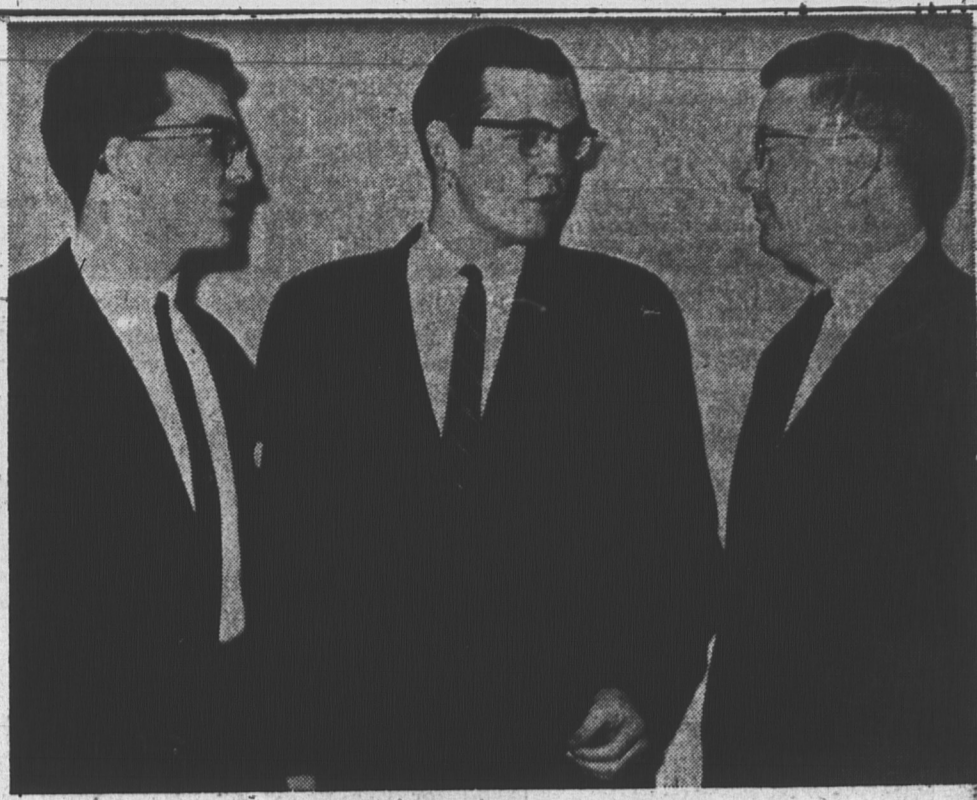

## Maloney Aims At Camp's Job

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Arthur Maloney, a Toronto lawyer, emerged from the political shadows Thursday to fight for the Conservative party presidency in a pro-Diefenbaker role against incumbent Dalton Camp.

Announcing his decision, Mr. Maloney told a news conference he did not think Mr. Camp's campaign for a leadership review should go unchallenged.

The former MP for Toronto Parkdale accused Mr. Camp of sowing party disunity.

Mr. Maloney's candidacy means delegates at the Nov. 13-16 Conservative annual meeting will have a choice of two views on the leadership question when voting for president of the national association.

On the one hand, Mr. Maloney made it clear in several references he wishes no review of John Diefenbaker's leadership mandate.

Mr. Camp's campaign has been interpreted as a move to oust Mr. Diefenbaker, who won the job in 1958 and held it for a decade against periodic internal revolts.
