A GENTLEMEN stopping at the Ottawa Hotel, Montreal, was the other night robbed of his watch and chain. He immediately opened telephonic communication with the Central Police Station, nearly a mile distant, and in three minutes and a half, detective Fahey, of the city detective force, was at the hotel. FRANCIS BEGAN was arrested on Thursday night, and on Friday morning tried for committing two assaults, one on Thomas Flagar and the other on Philip Colvill.
