The Markets.

OATS.

The British grain market during the past
month has been steadily declining. Sam-
ples of our oats have not yet arrived there,
but, judging from the quotations of Irish
oats, ours would not bring more than 18s.
3d. per qr. of 304 lbs. But this price we
believe, has still fallen. A cable advice
received, reports that the oat market has
collapsed, and the best samples are quoted
at 16s. per qr. and St. Petersburg kiln
dried oats are quoted at from 15s. 6d. to
16s. in England.

POTATOES.

Latest advices from Boston state that the
market is considerably demoralized owing
to recent large arrivals, and bad conditions
of the stock. The highest quotation for
the best Eastern and Northern is from 65
to 70 cents per bushel, and some lots have
been forced off at 30 and 40 cents.

EGGS.

There has been a firm market for eggs in
Boston, and strictly fresh Eastern stock
command more than the quotations—25
and 26 cents. Island stock are moving off
at 24 and 25 cents per dozen, wholesale.

FLOUR.

The Montreal Gazette of the 16th, in its
market report states that flour retains the
dullness noted for some days previous, but
prices show no material change. The receipts
are liberal, and stocks during the
week have increased 11,856 bbls. A
similar increase occurred a year ago. Anton
Kufke, of Liverpool, writes on Septem-
ber 27th as follows:—"The slightly im-
proved tendency reported in my last cir-
cular has not been maintained and the flour
trade has once more fallen into dullness,
with prices of all flours declining about
1s. per 280 lbs. We have, however, now
reached a pretty safe basis, and a better
demand ought to spring up." The prices

FISH.

A Boston circular of the 11th says:—Not-
withstanding the large schools of Mackerel
on the coast, receipts are not heavy enough
to cause any decline in prices, and sales
continue to be made at last week's rates.
Inspected fare lots sold on Monday and
Tuesday at \$8 to \$8.50 for 3's, \$11 for 2's,
and \$13.50 to \$14 per bbl. for 1's; sales
from pickle at \$11 per bbl. The steamer
"Carroll" from Prince Edward Island on
Monday night had 900 bbls Mackerel, but
she arrived late, and no sales were
made at last accounts. Buyers are
not so eager to get supplies as last week; but
receivers are not disposed to force business
and hold for previous prices which we
quote at \$8.50 for 3's, \$10.50 for 2's, and
\$12.50 for 1's. Codfish are selling moder-
ately at steady prices, though, with a con-
tinuance of the fine weather, a little lower
rates are expected. We quote large Bank
at \$5.75 to \$6 for pickle-cured, and \$6 to
\$6.25 for dry. Medium size were about
\$1 per qtl. lower than large. A cargo of
770 qtls. codfish from Nova Scotia and 500
qtls. from Newfoundland arrived the past
two days.

PORK AND LARD.

The price of pork in Chicago has advan-
ced \$4.50 per bbl. within the past month.
October delivery closing on Saturday last at
\$24.20. There has also been a rise during
the past few weeks of \$1.70 per 100 lbs. in
the price of October lard, which closed firm
on Saturday at \$13. It is thought by
parties in the trade in Montreal that prices
will be carried still higher by the manipu-
lators of this deal in Chicago. Several
Montreal speculators have already realized
some good round sums, having sold out and
taken their profits during the past few days.
—Gazette.

A Cremation in England.

A correspondent sends to the papers an
account of two cremations, the first
which have taken place in England.
The bodies were those of Lady Hanham
and Mrs. Hanham, who died in Dorset-
shire in 1877 and 1876 respectively.
They both expressed a wish that their
bodies should be cremated. The re-
mains were kept in a mortuary until the
preparations for the process were com-
plete. Last Sunday the remains, en-
closed in substantial coffins, were placed
in a furnace on plates of iron and fire-
brick, and were reduced to fine, silvery-
looking ashes in about an hour, without
any unpleasant incident.

The Democratic Victory.

The Chicago Inter-Ocean thinks the
Republican defeat in Ohio is due to the
apathy of Republicans rather than to any
increase in the positive strength of the
Democracy. That judgment is probably
correct. The fact is the people have lost
confidence in both parties, and look for
little but rascality from either of them.
Hence the hopeless apathy which is
everywhere apparent. What is to be the
outcome of it? no one appears to be able
to foresee. One thing is pretty certain,
that before confidence in either the Re-
publican or Democratic party, whichever
one it is, is restored, that party will have
to make it pretty evident that it has
emancipated itself from "machine" con-
trol, and that, for a time at least, it is to
be run in the interests of the country,
rather than that of the politicians. The
Augean stables will have to be cleaned,
and that will be a pretty arduous under-
taking.

The Irish Convention.

Telegraphic news dated Dublin Oct.
17th, give following additional particu-
lars:—

Letters were also received from several
Catholic Bishops apologizing for their
absence, and expressing confidence in
the leaders of the movement. Parnell
then submitted the programme of the Col-
ference and reviewed its proposals. He
said that until he attained for the people of
Ireland the right to make their own laws
they would never be in accordance with
their wishes; and that no solution of the
land question could be final that did not
secure to the farmers the right of becoming
owners of their holdings by pur-
chase. He said the Irish party required
eighty-five to ninety members in Parliam-
ent, but they could not hope for this
until the franchise was placed on a basis
of household suffrage. Davitt then
addressed the convention. He spoke in
somewhat more pronounced terms than
Parnell. He declared that until the
land which was stolen from the people
was restored to the whole people as
national property there could be no final
and satisfactory settlement of the land
question. At the same time he wished
it distinctly understood that his declara-
tion did not separate him from Parnell
on the land question.

All the speakers declared the Land
Act an utter failure. Davitt said he was
unable to go with Parnell in his scheme
of Land reform, but would co-operate
with him for abolition of landlordism.
Davitt moved an amendment to the
proposed constitution of the Central
Council of the new League that the
council consist of thirty-two members,
one from each county, the parliamentary
party to have no nomination, but its
members to be eligible. It was finally
decided that the Council consist of 48
members—32 for the counties and 16
for the Parliamentary party. The Con-
vention adjourned with a vote of thanks
to Parnell.

American Genius on the Move.

The Christian Union gives an account
of two boy prodigies of American birth
who bid fair one day to take rank with
the great geniuses of other lands. One
of them, Neal by name, is a musical
wonder. He is now in Munich. At
nine years of age his compositions were
played by the band of the famous Prince
Royal Regiment, and the child author
was lifted above the heads of the people
and musicians to receive applause as a
composer. He is called in Munich "the
Young Mozart." He is now 11 years of
age, and is all the time composing.
Some of his published compositions are
pronounced exquisite. Strauss is said
to have taken him in his arms and shed
tears over him. Having been given at
Christmas, at his own request, a volume
of the most learned and difficult essays
on composition attainable, he was for
days after up at five o'clock in the morn-
ing devouring its pages. He is being
carefully and sensibly trained, and is
laying the foundation of the best musical
education procurable. The other boy is
a little fellow in New York whose talent
with the brush is almost miraculous.
His name is De Witt Lockman. He
lately painted the portrait of a horse
which was shown to Beard, who said
there were not three men in America
who could grasp the character and
salient points of a horse and transfer
them to canvas with an equal surety and
force. The boy goes to school every
day, and yet finds time not only to com-
plete innumerable extraordinarily clever
sketches, but also to study anatomy.
He dissects fowls, fishes, mice, even
butterflies, with the greatest ease and
sang froid. He gives every indication
of genius.
