He is by Abner T. Clegg, so evidently Henry likes the Cleggs.

Harness horsemen in the New England States have in schedule 23 weeks racing. There will be 26 straight nights for Foxboro, the starting date being June 21st. The first start of the campaign will be at Portland, Maine, on the Pine Tree Circuit May 29th, and racing will be held weekly over the half-mile ovals through early November. The longest and most important of the Maine meetings will be at Gorham race track. Dates for four weeks have been granted to Gorham and they are June 21st through July 17th.

There is going to be big time racing at Santa Anita, California commencing March 12th there will be twenty afternoons with meets held over the mile track. Eighteen stakes which were advertised have closed with good entries. The Western Harness Racing Association which sponsored California meetings is following a new plan this year. Formerly the meetings were given as one extended affair either in the fall or spring. Now the officials are going to split the meetings, half the dates in the spring and half in the fall. Readers of this column will remember the great racing held at Hollywood Park last November into December, in which Joe O'Brien was the star money-winning driver.

Glancing over the list of Maine tracks brings to mind the great seasons of the 1920's when New Brunswick and Maine tracks cooperated. Here are some of the top tracks that will hold meets:—Presque Isle, Skowhegan, Union, Windsor, Lewiston, Norway, South Paris, Farmington, Cumberland, Fryburg, Topsham and New Gloucester.

While the racing situation in New York State is not cleared up yet everyone is expecting that Yorkville will open up April 15th and race through to November 15th and Walter Gibbons' Roosevelt Raceway, hopes to publish his stake features soon. There was nothing wrong whatever in the conduct of the race tracks or their officials in New York State, the trouble was with the unions who were collecting from parties hired to police the grounds, etc.

In Edwin T. Keller's racing column is—"Dannie Steele, dean of Massachusetts reinmen, is at his old stamping grounds at the Metropolitan Speedway and is busy with some ten head that will be ready for the Foxboro opening. It has been nearly 65 years since

he first sat behind a trotter—a record to be proud of." Dannie Steele, as most Maritimers will remember, is a son of the late John Steele, Summerside, who was a good horseman, trainer and driver and prepared Parkside 221's for his races. Parkside was brought from California by the late W. R. Brennan, Summerside, and was an outstanding sire of speed. The brothers, Dannie and Mac, early learned to take care of horses and Dannie drove his first race when less than sixteen years of age. He set up a track record of 217's with Ada Mac at Charlottetown in September, 1907.

Now we hear from Rannie MacDonald, Dufferin Track, Toronto:—"We are having very good weather here and the track is in nice condition most of the time. I have raced 49 heats and have won 10, was second eight times and six times third. There is a splendid lot of horses and horsemen here, the driving is good and clean at all times, which is certainly the right way to have it. Your friend Honorat Larochelle of Quebec is here with 16 head—L.E.M. 205 1/5, owned by Miss J. Corbell, Montreal; Buster 207; Bitty Sue 210; Winterett 212 2/5, owned by H. Larochelle, Sorel; Mary G. Herbert 209, owned by A. Dumas, Sherbrooke; Buck Up 208, owned by U. Lalime, St. Hyacinthe; Eva Riggs 206; Burnell Hanover 202 2/5; Widower Harvester 208 2/5; Josedale Scotland 208, owned by G. E. Gerry, Waterloo; Mighty Stepper 206 and Gratton Vonian (2) owned by J. K. Mahoney, Malone; True Spencer 202 1/5 and Osborn Hanover 214, owned by George McCaffrey, Russell; Professor Allan 208 2/5 and General Will 210, owned by Jos. Brosseau, Montreal.

"Mr. Larochelle is one of the best horsemen here, an expert trainer and driver. He liked your review of Maritime racing which appeared in The Guardian very much. Joe Hodgins is top driver at present with 50 wins and there is also the young driver Bud Gilmore, that made quite a name for himself the past season and will be at the top of the list in the years to come. After the racing here is finished, around the first week in March I expect we will be going back to Blue Bonnets where racing starts early in April.

"I am glad to be able to report that Harry Hirsch's tree-feller, Super Hal 201 2/5 by Hal Dale 201, is going perfectly sound now. He only raced for a short time the past season. If he continues sound he should be able to put up a great battle with any of the tree-fellers. I have been interested in following big time hockey in the Maritimes and would certainly like to see some of the games. Please give my kindest regards to all friends and horsemen." ... This week's column will be devoted to subjects of general interest. The series on hunting dogs will be continued later. Black ducks and wildgeese are wintering in numbers far in excess of former winters. On Monday evening of this week a companion and I were returning from Souris. The evening shadows were lengthening and the haze of night was beginning to fall as we reached Rollo Bay and stopped to watch the geese that have made this sector their headquarters. Each of us took turns watching a flock of over 200 geese feeding in a stubble field. Powerful field glasses brought them into close focus.

They were maybe three gunshots from the highway but paid no attention to us. Not a neck was raised to full length. An old gander on the flock's edge, heck in a comfortable half-bow, turned his head to give us the once over but remained relaxed. He didn't assume that tense, alert stance that betokens suspicion. It was amusing to watch the geese push their bills along the ground under the snow feeling for kernels of grain. A quarter mile farther west another flock of approximately 100 birds were resting in close formation on a bare potato field. Like the other flock they paid us no particular attention. It was easy to tell they hadn't been shot at — not in this section at any rate. I didn't have to be told that the Rollo Bay farmers are a good bunch and watch those geese "like a cat watches a mouse." Later I learned they have been feeding the geese

M.M.H.L. Head Issues Statement On New Players

GLACE BAY, (CP)—President C. Roy MacDonald said Friday the method by which new players were acquired by Maritime Major League Hockey clubs after Feb. 1 will "be scrutinized very carefully."

MacDonald said in a prepared statement "When the deadline for the acquiring of new players was extended to Feb. 1 it was my understanding that clubs would complete the league with players registered on that date."

MacDonald's statement admitted that Canadian Amateur Hockey Association regulations provided "in certain cases" for the replacement of players recalled by professional clubs.

"In my opinion a club can only take advantage of this rule if the player recalled was actually on the roster of the Major League club and had taken part in one or more league games," MacDonald's statement said.

He said the rules did not provide for the replacement of any player out because of injuries.

"Therefore," the statement said, "a replacement will not be permitted for a recalled player who is unable to play because of an injury."

SACKVILLE, (Special) — St. Dunstan's University of Charlottetown, paced by the 23-point performance of Gus Dorais, defeated Mount Allison University 69-47 in the second game of their round robin series in play for the New Brunswick — Prince Edward Island Intercollegiate Basketball championship last night.

St. Dunstan's previously captured the first game 55-49 at home, and now will meet the University of New Brunswick in the next round. Despite the loss, the Mounties remained in race for the Intercollegiate Basketball honors.

In Friday night's encounter, played before a large crowd at the University gym, the teams matched point for point in the first half. The visitors lead 10-8 at the end of the first quarter, but the Mounties edged in front 24-23 at the end of the first half.
