CHILDREN'S ENTERTAINMENT.

Who does not love little children, pretty little children, and who could help being pleased with all that is done for their benefit in which were almost all boys and girls—the children of Charlottetown's militia officers—ranging in age from about four to twelve years, carefully trained and tastefully costumed? Somehow or other the people of Charlottetown could not have known what a treat had been prepared at the cost of a great deal of labor—a labor of love—on the part of the promoters; for if they had known St. Peter's Hall would, last night, have undoubtedly been filled to overflowing.

The principal numbers on the programme were two little plays entitled "The Crowning of the May Queen" and "The Fairy's Revenge." The various parts were capably taken and the tableaux at the end of each were very pretty. The Cavalry Sword Exercise by four girls dressed in khaki was so much appreciated that it had to be gone through with a second time. Recitations were nicely given by Helen Warburton, Ethel Longworth, Mary Jenkins, Hattie Hodgson and John Mellish. Arthur Warburton's horripilation, The Making of the Far, by a little Englishman, a little Scotchman and a little Irishman, and a violin solo by Parker Hooper, were all pleasing and interesting. But the singing of "Soldiers of the Queen" by Hammond Johnson; and "A Speech" by Ernest Weeks, both of them very little tots, were the two numbers which brought down the house. The former has a wonderful pair of lungs, and dressed in uniform he sang with all the bearing and vigor of a veteran. The latter—well he's a born orator. When his speech, in which he promised another as long as his arm when his father comes home from the war, was over, he was recalled and bowed three or four times. But the clapping did not cease until he told the audience "that he had said quite enough for one evening." The singing in a pleasing manner of "Up With the Flag," by Miss Edith Stewart and "God Save the Queen" brought to an end a pleasant evening's enjoyment. The promoters of the entertainment are to be greatly congratulated on the success which attended the realization of the programme—but they certainly deserve a better audience.

MILLINERY OPENING.

The millinery opening of F.
