

## Farmer Seen Certain For Attorney General

Mr. Alberton Farmer, J.C. appeared Wednesday to be a certain choice for Attorney-General in the new cabinet Premier Walter Sharp will name after he returns to his office following a post-campaign rest.

Mr. Farmer, first elected to the legislature in 1959, is the only lawyer in the legislature on the PC side.

Also recalled today was the fact that Thane A. Campbell, when a young Summerside lawyer, sat in the Walter Lea cabinet after having been defeated in a Second Prince by-election in 1950.

Mr. Lea took over as premier of the province on May 20, 1950, after A. C. Saunders had gone to the Supreme Court bench. Mr. Campbell was defeated in a by-election in Second Prince on October 21 of the same year, but served as Attorney-General there was no Liberal lawyer in the legislature — until the Lea government was defeated on August 29, 1951.

Mr. Campbell won easily in First Prince in 1951, although the Conservatives won 18 to 12, was campaign leader in 1955, when the Liberals took every seat — Walter Lea was ill — and became premier when Mr. Lea died in January 1958.

The prominent Summerside lawyer resigned in 1943 when he became Chief Justice of the province.

Incidentally, the man who won that October by-election in 1951 was G. Shelton Sharp, whose son Foster Sharp is now listed among the probable party Senate appointments that a number of Prince County party leaders have been expecting for several months.

The former Georgie Weeks, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Weeks of South Kildare, was 85 years of age. When a young woman she went to the United States and was employed as a draper in the dressmaking department of L. P. Hollander in Boston for a number of years.

Forty-six years ago she was married to Mr. Pratt and they made their home in Boston. The past 23 years of retirement have been spent in Elmsdale.

Mrs. Pratt is survived by her husband; one brother, John Weeks of Summerside who is at present in Western Canada; and three sisters, Mrs. Eliza Gammell of Summerside, Mrs. Jean Murphy of Sea View and Mrs. Hazel Cameron of Elmsdale.

The funeral will be held Friday at 2:30 p.m. in the United Church. Interment will be in Woodlawn cemetery, Alberton.
