THE MAILS.

A HALF MILLION SURPLUS

What British Rule is Doing for the Land of the Pharaohs.

CAIRO, March 7.—The financial statement for the year 1898 shows Egypt to be steadily advancing in prosperity. In the budget for 1898 the receipts and the expenditure were estimated at the same figure, namely £E10,449,000.

The year's surplus, namely £E484,042, is credited to the special reserve, reducing the deficit of this fund, consequent on the Sudan expedition, to £E92,439.

The Caisse has agreed to an advance of £E2,615,862 from this fund for public purposes.

The economic conversion fund, which cannot be touched without the consent of the powers, amounts to £E3,219,898, £E265,037 having been added during the year.

The government has reduced its indebtedness by purchasing Egyptian stock to the value of £E91,760 sterling.

During the year a reduction was made in the land tax of £E216,000.

The Egyptian pound (£E1) is equal to £1 0s 6d.

MARRIAGE IN MANXLAND.

Deceased Wife's Sister Bill Receives a Check.

LONDON, March 9.—The bill introduced in the Manx Legislature for legalizing marriage with a deceased wife's sister received a check at its second reading.

Deemster Gill moved an amendment: "That it is not advisable that the Legislature of this island should proceed with any measure for the legalization of marriage between a widower and the sister of the deceased wife before there has been legislation by the Imperial Parliament."

The amendment was seconded by Archdeacon Gill.

The Attorney General dissented. If the bill were restricted to domiciled residents, he said, he could not see that it would cause difficulties with England, and it had been found to work extremely well in Jersey. Only the Attorney-General voted against the amendment, which was carried.

INFORMATION WANTED.

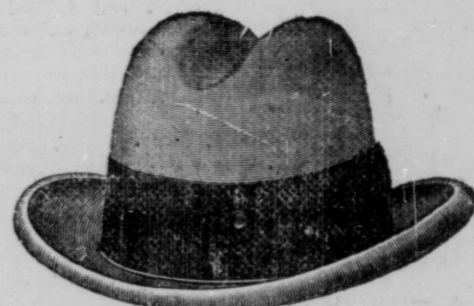

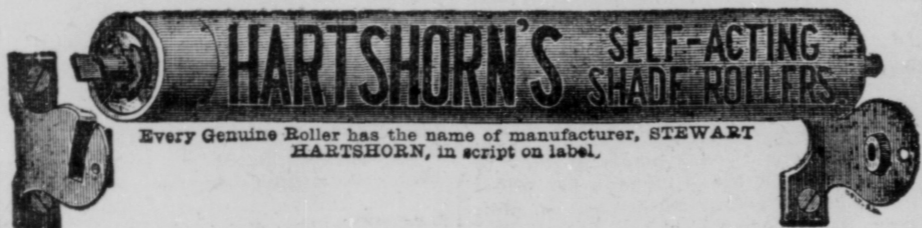
