Hunters Corner

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tion. With geese and ducks it often means rising before daybreak and sallying forth muffled to the ears in woollens, wearing hip rubber boots and loaded down with decoys. It's a thrill to watch day break on a marsh or lake, once one gets there and I never minded the wait. Night mists hang low on the water and overhead the whisper of wings causes one to involuntarily crouch low in the blind. The moment when the last tendrils of vapour rise from the water and the sky reddens in the east, when one breaks the double and slips twin shells into the breach, is the most thrilling of all.

With Hungarian partridge the setting is altogether different. One may wear sneakers and a light hunting jacket, or dispense with the jacket and don a suitable shirt. There is no squish of marsh mud under foot or chin high cat-tails to worm your way through. Typical of upland game bird hunting is the crisp feel of stubble under foot or the soft caress of frost bleached grass against one's insteps... alder swales softened by October sunlight or knee high dune grass with sparkling blue water as a background.

Not the least of the sport is watching a brace of graceful pointers, staunch and true, quartering a stubble or uncultivated hayfield. One moment they are a picture of fluid motion, the next frozen immobile like marble statues. One never loses the thrill of a covey rise over a beautiful point. The only sign of life as one moves up is maybe the flick of an eyeball and a slight quiver of the lower jaw. One moves past the dogs maybe 10-15-20 yards and nothing happens. A cautious circle and as one stands hesitant beginning to wonder if a covey is really there it happens... the grass explodes and the air seems full of squealing, climbing Huns. Sometimes the pointers have birds to find and retrieve and often they haven't... there's a lot of space around a climbing Hun.

A covey rise of Huns even when I'm covered by a gun gives me a thrill. This week I was driving along a quiet dirt road bordering the shore when I spotted a covey of 20, maybe 21, Huns, on the road. They fanned out on the road ahead of the creeping car—a combination of red clay, brown birds and golden shafts of sunlight. When they exploded into life—wheeled in ragged formation over a hedge and waded down amid a cluster of grain stalks. I had my birds picked out and could almost feel the slight impact of the Winchester butt against my shoulder and see the soft, brown feathers from a double kill falling slowly earthward. We don't have long to wait fellow sportsmen. I still enjoy a duck or goose hunt, they have their own special thrills, but the swift, eager Huns are the best standby.

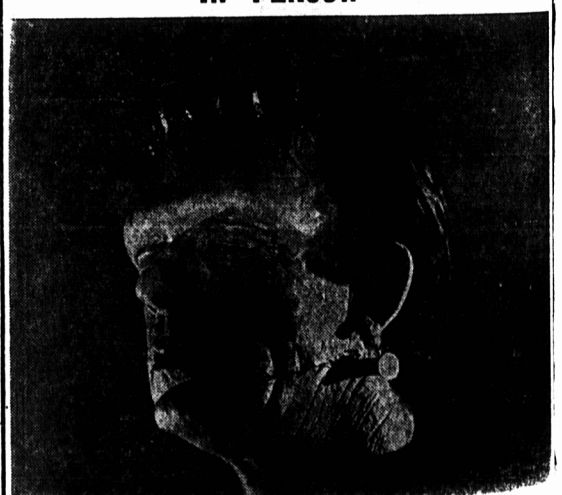
