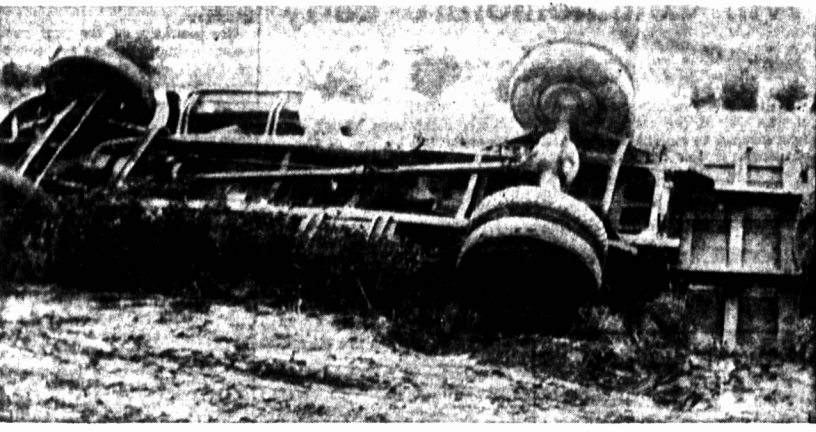

**Very Encouraging Reports In Local Cancer Campaign**

At the first turn-in meeting of the general Charlottetown Cancer Campaign last evening all divisions went over the top, exceeding their quotas by good margins. So far it has been one of the most successful general city cancer drives ever held.

Division 1, commanded by Mrs. F. Winston Smith, had 113.1 per cent despite the fact that there was one team yet to report. Even this Division 1 had the second highest total percentage of quota last evening.

The second highest team of the evening, the Daughters of England, was also in Division 1 and made an auspicious entry among Cancer Campaign teams with 206.5 per cent of its quota. Captain of this team was Mrs. Fred Smith.

Division 2, commanded by Mrs. Frank Walker, was the top division last night and also had the leading team. This division had 129.1 per cent of its quota and the leading team on the division had 216.6 per cent. This top team was the Basilica C.W.L. Team A. Captained by Mrs. Leo Murray.

Division 3, commanded by Mrs. Ronald Parker, came through above its quota with 108.8 per cent. The third highest team was in this division with 177.2 per cent. This team was the Senior Ladies Aid of the P.E.I. Hospital with Mrs. Eldon Campbell as captain.

Division 4, commanded by Mrs. Rorvet MacKinnon had 112 per cent of its quota and its leading team was Parkdale with Mrs. Arthur Seaman as captain and 153.1 per cent.

General Campaign chairman Mr. W.H. Beaton, and his co-chairman, Mrs. J.G. Dennis, are very enthusiastic over the 1956 City Cancer Campaign and state that when all cards are in the returns will be as good as, if not better than, previous years. The next cancer turn-in is next Wednesday night at 7 o'clock at the Clover Club, Grafton Street.

**HALIFAX (CP)** — The public weather office says cooler air moving into the northwestern corner of the district is causing showers along its leading edge. Associated with the cool air is a high pressure area which extends from Hudson Bay to Lake Michigan. This high is expected to push across the Maritimes today, bringing clear, cool weather with it.

The Litany was sung and the Vespers of the Dead recited. Solemn Requiem Mass will be said this morning at 7.30 and the body will lie there in state until 7.30 this evening. A guard of Honor of 4th Degree Knights of Columbus, commanded by Pilot Percy MacDonald, was posted and a similar Guard will be posted at the Basilica tonight when the remains are moved there to lie in state prior to the funeral tomorrow morning.
