Closing ceremonies of the eighth Eucharistic Congress of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Charlottetown began at Indian River last night and will be concluded at evening with the procession of the Blessed Sacrament. The service at Indian River Church opened at 7 o'clock last night with the solemn entry of His Excellency Right Rev. J. A. O'Sullivan, Bishop of Charlottetown. His Excellency Right Rev. Leo Nelligan, Bishop of Pembroke, Ontario, and a native of Digby, this Province, was also present at the service. Following the solemn entry an address of welcome was given by Rev. F. McDonald, parish priest at Indian River, to which His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan made reply.

YACHT IN PORT—The yacht So Fong, an auxiliary schooner owned by Mr. C. F. Fairley of Terre Haute, Indiana, in port here since Saturday would probably sail today if weather conditions were favorable. It was in port last night with Mr. Fairley as skipper and Miss M. L. Freeman, also of Terre Haute. The party sailed from New York and cruised leisurely up the coast. They were expected to be in Bras D'Or Lakes in Cape Breton before crossing Northumberland Strait to this Province. It was their first visit here and they expressed delight with the scenic beauty of the Island. The hot weather didn't trouble them. It was cool compared with Indiana. While in Charlottetown the party has been guests at the C.N.R. Hotel Charlottetown. The yacht, it might be noted, was built in Hong Kong two years ago, hence the Chinese name, So Fong.

HUNTING DOGS BLAMED—Marauding hunting dogs were killing large numbers of rabbits as well as Hungarian partridges and young black ducks, according to complaints reaching Mounted Police in the Province. Owners of dogs were reminded the Game Act carries a minimum penalty of \$10 and a maximum of \$100 for a dog hunting deer or "run at large" during the spring and summer months while the Deer Act prohibits such dogs to be "shot on sight." One farmer in the province reported he had found six half-grown rabbits this spring, which had been killed apparently by a hunting dog and piled at the edge of his woods. One which will easily kill 150 rabbits in a summer. It was said, and when many dogs are permitted to roam at large is enormous.

Austrian Bishop Resigns Office

VIENNA, Aug. 8—(OP-Havas) — Monsignor Adam Hefter tonight resigned as Catholic Bishop of Gurk (Klagenfurt) reportedly because of differences with his clergy over his conciliatory policy toward the Nazis. No official reasons were given for the resignation, which ecclesiastical circles ascribed to poor health. It was reported, however, that Mgr. Hefter had agonized for weeks over the resignation to conciliate Nazi leaders. The Bishop was raised to the Gurk See in 1915. The episcopal residence is at Klagenfurt.
