#### Cropping Progress

In this age operations move at a rapid rate. Due to unfavourable weather many farmers are still sowing grain while others are harvesting grass and clover for ensilage.

In past years a break usually occurred between cropping and haying which was used for repair jobs, painting and whitewashing. Farmers interested in trench silos and grass ensilage who arrange to visit Falconwood Farm this week will have an opportunity of seeing operations carried on without the use of expensive equipment. The possibilities of saving large additional quantities of protein are very great but caution should be exercised by the average farmer in making heavy commitments for expensive grass machinery.

#### Field Crop Specialist

For some years the necessity and value of a competent field crop specialist has been apparent to many of our farmers. The Department of Agriculture has this spring been able to secure such an expert, whose services are now available in regard to problems of production, weed and disease control affecting our field crops.

#### Weed Control

Farmers who have the problem of mustard and wild radish in their grain fields will be thinking of spraying to control these troublesome invaders. Results from the use of recommended chemicals has been good and it is not too soon to make plans for a weed control campaign.

#### Farm Forum Conference

Nine provinces were represented at last week's National Conference in Amherst where delegates from the Forum, Canadian Federation of Agriculture, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, and the Canadian Association for Adult Education met to discuss the year's work and make plans to enlarge and promote a program which is recognized as making a tremendous improvement in rural education, social progress, and the solution of community problems.

Ontario was represented in force by their provincial Forum Committee and the enthusiasm of those people for the accomplishments and possibilities of Farm Forum was a revelation. As one Forum member put it, "Farm Forum has broadened us out, extended our horizons, taught us tolerance, and developed the ability to solve problems by group action."

Over twenty delegates from the Conference who came to our province over the weekend, were

shown through the National Park by a courteous guide from the Travel Bureau and in the evening met for dinner with local Forum officials. The dinner was followed by a visit to the Confederation Chamber and the Super Market, both of which made quite an impression. The scenic beauty of the province at this season of the year called forth many delighted remarks.

#### Farmers' Meetings

Plans at present are to hold the semi-annual meeting of the Kings County Federation at Murray River probably on Thursday, June 28th. At the same time and place the Provincial Marketing Board will hold the election of a member to the Potato Marketing Board.

The semi-annual meeting provides the Federation officers with the opportunity to report on past achievements and to receive direction from the members relative to future policy. All members are welcome at these meetings and the school district Federation secretaries and chairmen are recognized as the voting delegates. Agriculture is becoming a minority group in Canada and support by the individual farmer of the Federation is necessary if agriculture hopes to maintain a fair relative position with other industries.

Criticism of the Federation are welcome and when coupled with suggestions for improvement can be valuable in strengthening the organization.

#### School Meetings

We are talking about Federation business when we say that Tuesday, June 26th should be one of the most important days in the whole year. We are referring to the annual school meetings; collectively these meetings decide whether education moves forward on a broad front or stands still, satisfied with previous accomplishments.

From the standpoint of buildings and equipment progress had been marked, progress that has been possible through the co-operation of school district rate payers, the Department of Education and in many cases local Women's Institutes.

We would suggest that a large attendance is desirable at every meeting and would look to our Federation and Farm Forum members to demonstrate their interest and public spirit by appearing at the school on the 26th.

#### Women's Institute

District Women's Institutes have been holding their annual Conventions and the attendance demonstrates the interest and enthusiasm of Institute members for their organization.

Institute officials and officers are to be congratulated on the strength and efficiency of their organization. The accomplishments of Women's Institutes in the field of education, nutrition, social services, are countless and the whole province is definitely a better place to live in since the coming of this organization.

#### Livestock Prices

We haven't heard much complaint concerning hog prices which hit the \$40.00 mark this week at Moncton. That price should be satisfactory but when the inevitable drop comes it is going to make figures like \$36 or \$30 look pretty small. Choice steers delivered to plant at Charlottetown are \$32, good \$31, medium \$30. Heifers being 50 cents lower for corresponding grades. Good bulls over 1,500 pounds are \$27 per hundred; medium \$25; common \$22 to \$23. Good veal calves are \$29 and grassers \$22 to \$24.

#### I. F. A. P. Conference

Pierre Martin, President of France's Farm Organization has now become President of the World Farm Organization and succeeds H. E. Hannam who held the office for the past two years. The delegates to Mexico were treated with every courtesy and entertained by President Aleman at his official residence. At a further ceremony in the city hall the Governor honored Dr. Hannam and the executive of I. F. A. P. and leaders of the various delegations with the certificate and medal of "Vistante Distinguido" meaning "Distinguished Guests". These ceremonies which assume much the nature of an opening of parliament were unparalleled in I. F. A. P. history.

One of the most important matters discussed at the Conference was the necessity of land reform in many countries of the world. Problems exist where large amounts of land are owned by individuals who permit tenants a mere existence.

The necessity of improved land holding conditions and better tenure relationships are necessary to solve good production problems in many countries.

Members of the co-operatives will be interested in the following resolution introduced by the Co-operative Committee and endorsed by the Conference.

"All Agricultural Co-operatives founded and operated on a completely voluntary and democratic basis, constituted an efficient bulwark against spreading subversive doctrines and are in effect an antithesis to all totalitarian systems regardless of their political identity."

#### Potatoes

It is evident that there still remain some quantities of potatoes in the province and while the starch program is just about terminated there is evidence of strengthening prices for table-stock.

Potatoes that are still in condition to grade and market will quite likely move. No one is satisfied with the returns from this
