MORE GOLD.—We have been shown a very fine bar of gold, weighing thirty-seven ounces, taken from the large lead discovered about two months ago on the British American property, Montague district. This lead is situated about seventy-five feet north, and runs parallel with the celebrated Rose lead, and it is anticipated that it will prove very rich.—Herald.

JAMES GORDON BENNETT'S new yacht, built at Newburg, will be finished in about two weeks. It is called the "Light of the Haven," and will cost in the neighborhood of \$250,000. It is the largest and most luxurious steam yacht in the world. The woodwork in Mr. Bennett's private room is cherry, the cabin is mahogany, and the main saloon English oak. Mr. Bennett's room will contain a bed, which it is said will cost over \$1,000. The frescoing is elaborate. The ceiling in one part will be frescoed to represent a pale blue body of water in which numerous species of fish can be seen. The wardroom for the officers and the quarters for the sailors will also be furnished and fitted at great expense. On the outside of the vessel the rail, hatch covering, etc., are of English teak.

A COMPLIMENTARY DINNER was, last night, tendered Mr. John H. Longworth by his fellow boarders at the "Revere," and other friends. About thirty-five gentlemen were present. James W. Richards, Esq., occupied the chair, and F. J. Conroy, Esq., acted as the efficient croupier. The usual standing toasts were given and responded to in happy terms. The feast prepared by the proprietress of the Revere on the occasion was an excellent one, and all appointments of the evening were in every respect most complete. Speeches, songs and choruses enlivened the proceedings, and after spending a most enjoyable evening, the party broke up in the "wee sma' hours." Mr. Longworth leaves the city carrying with him the good wishes of his many friends, and we join with them in cordially wishing him health and prosperity in his new sphere. LAND LEAGUE ENTERTAINMENT.—The entertainment, last night, by the Charlottetown Land League, was successful in every respect. The Hall was tastefully and neatly fitted up; at 8 o'clock it was comfortably filled. The entertainment opened with a piano duet of Irish Airs, by Miss Kichham and Miss Cox, which was rendered in good style. Mr. James W. Mullally followed with an excellent address, in which he showed some of the results that would ensue if Ireland had her own Parliament—results beneficial to both England and Ireland. Miss Cox gave a solo, "Ireland's Freedom," and received a well-merited encore. Prof. Cayon then sang "The Shamrock." It is unnecessary to say he did it justice, and was encored. "What are the Will Waves Saying," a beautiful vocal duet, by Miss Donovan and Miss Cox, was heartily applauded. Miss Rose Kichham, Miss Donovan, and Miss Purcell each gave solos, which were received with much favor, and also encored. The Misses Kichham played some fine selections on the piano. Miss Alice Patterson—daughter of the first President of the Ladies' Land League in Montreal—recited the beautiful poem of Thomas Davis—"We'll Have our own Agin'"—in a manner creditable for one of her years. Mr. James Hughes' reading was very good. Councillor Byrne delivered a brief but patriotic address, in which he pointed out the aims and objects of the Land League. The duet, "Oh! Lovel's Erin," by Miss Kichham and Miss Cox, was exceedingly well sung. The entertainment all through was very pleasant. The young ladies did well, and contributed much to make it a success.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

GLOUCESTER, MASS., April 10. The schooner "Northern," of this port, sailed for Georges on Feb. 23, and all hopes of her returning are given up. She had twelve men on board.

DUBLIN, April 10. Parnell was released at 6 o'clock this morning, and took the train for Kingston at 6.30, on the way to England.

The release of Parnell is on parole for a week, to enable him to visit his sister in Paris, whose child has just died.

CORK, April 10. Bands are playing, houses illuminated, and crowds parading the streets this evening, in honor of the release of Parnell.

In the country districts the hillsides are ablaze with bonfires.

BOSTON, April 10. A special to the Journal from New York says that the Steamer "Richard Robinson" arrived on Saturday from Hong Kong, bringing what purported to be a cargo of hemp, consigned to Boston and New York parties by Vogel & Co.

The cargo proves mostly Canton matting, worth less than five dollars per bale, though paid for as hemp, at thirty dollars. This firm has done a large business in hemp, silks, etc., with America and Europe. Very recently English and French consignees received cargoes of cheap fourth rate silks in place of first class goods paid for. The losses to consignees thus far reported amount to about \$50,000. The head of the firm of Vogel & Co. is now a fugitive, but search is being made for him.

HAVANA, April 10. Advice from Cape Haytien state that a revolution broke out there against President Solomon on March 26th. When the German Steamer "Corisia" left that harbor 48 hours later the Insurgents had the upper hand. Gonouzo responded to the movement on the 28th, and Port au Prince followed. Martial law has been proclaimed, and President Solomon is preparing to march to Cape Haytien with 3,000 men. Two war steamers have been sent to Cape Haytien and Gonaves.
