



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Following the example of the Hon. Dugald MacKinnon, M.L.A., Senator George Barbour has a pacing prospect in training at the Charlottetown track. It is a five-year-old dark bay mare of splendid conformation, very nice gaited and a full sister to New Look 2.1. Her sire is Simcoe Harvester 2:04 1/4 and her dam Bonnie Anworthy by Bud Anworthy 2:14 and her grandam is Miss Louanda 2:14. Everyone at the track was glad to welcome the Senator and his new addition to the speed brigade when he arrived there a few days ago.

After her win in Saint John some nights ago the pacer Miss Donna Mae 2:11 was sold by Lorne Letcher to Harry MacIntosh of Saint John. Miss Donna Mae has been a good winner all through her career and we hope the new owner will have equal success with her.

R. C. Cruikshank of Halifax, who has been one of the most consistent supporters of harness racing in the Maritimes, has added to his stable the three-year-old pacer Just Rita. This mare is by Abner T. Clegg 2:04 1/2 and her dam is Lee's Nightmare 2:09 1/2. She showed up splendidly both at Old Home Week and the Futurity Races, winning the Three Year Old Pace at both and taking a record of 2:15 3/5. Our attention was particularly directed to her in the Futurity event when she got away in sixth position, paced around the field and was leading at the quarter pole in 32 2/5 seconds. She has limited breeding and with her limited preparation looks like one of the best buys around the Maritimes. Her breeder and the man who sold her is James O'Brien, Elmisdale, P.E.I., who has for the past twenty-five years always had a good pacer or two out racing and getting the money. Mr. O'Brien received a nice figure for the Abner T. Clegg filly. A lot of credit must go to George Sobey, Summerside, who put the final touches to her training this year and drove her in both her winning races.

The noted race horse Brewer's Gallon 2:00 4/5, arrived at Truro Raceway this week from Roosevelt Raceway, New York. He has been racing in the stable of Joe O'Brien and his owner B. C. Cruikshank of Halifax, stating that he will be sending him back to the Standard Bred auction, Harrisburg, Pa., November, 1947, for \$4,500. His sire was Bill Gallon 3, 1:59 1/2, outstanding two- and three-year-old trotter and winner of the Hambletonian Stake. His dam was Betsy Brewer 2:08 by Peter the Brewer 4, 2:02 1/2, dam, Betsy Prig 3, 2:05, dam of four in 2:10. The consignor's statement was as follows: "Brewer's Gallon trotted a mile in 2:16, quarter in 31 seconds, and was turned out early in June. Being a late foal—May 25—we did not keep him staked as liberally as others. He is a perfect type and will undoubtedly make a name for himself. He is the best one I have ever owned and good looks." "That was the statement of his breeder and consignor, R. Horace Johnson, Charlotte, N. C., who passed away a couple of years ago. How well he has lived up to that will be seen from the following brief synopsis of his racing career.

In 1948 he was trained as a three-year-old trotter by Johnnie MacMillan and won eight heats, taking a record of 2:16 at Bridgewater, N. S., Sept. 5th against aged horses. In 1949 he raced through the Maritimes, winning all along the line, his driver being Neil Campbell. At Charlottetown Aug. 16th he won the 2:18 Trot with 1-1-3. Nell Kalmuck (Kelly) 2-2-1, Eva Worthy (McIntyre) 4-3-2, Lusia (Tierney) 2-4-5, Quaker's Boy (Turner) 5-5-4, Kelly's Nightmare (Shaw) 6-6-6, Time, 2:10 1/5, 2:14 4/5, 2:13 4/5. Later he won the 2:19 Trot at Truro with 1-1. Eva Worthy 3-2, Walt N'See 2-3, Quaker's Boy 5-4, Kelly's Nightmare 4-5. Time, 2:16 1/5, 2:23 1/5 for one and one-sixteenth mile. He was then sent to Joe O'Brien to campaign and Joe took him to Hollywood Park, California, where he made his first start there in the 2:18 Trot October 14th, and was second to Lloyd Hanover in 2:07 2/5. He won the 2:18 Trot, Nov. 2nd, purse \$1,000 in 2:06 1/5.

As a five-year-old in 1950 he made his first start at Del Mar, Cal., March 25th, winning in 2:13, and at Arcadia, Cal., April 21st he won the 2:19 Trot, purse \$1,000 with 1-1, time, 2:06 3/5. At

the same track he won the 2:17 Trot, purse \$1,000 in 2:04 4/5. On the 2nd of May he won the 2:17 Trot, purse \$3,500 in 2:03 and a few days later won another trot purse \$1,000, in 2:04 1/5. On May 16th he won the 2:15 Trot, purse \$7,500, in 2:02 2/5. Returning east he won at Saratoga Springs June 28th, in 2:06 1/5 and at the same track a few days later he won an \$1,800 purse in 2:10 1/5 and on July 20th the Free For All Trot in 2:05 3/5 and also won a \$2,000 purse trot there in 2:06. On August 8th he won the \$3,000 trot at Goshen, N. Y., mile track in 2:05 4/5 and 2:03 4/5.

At Roosevelt Raceway, Aug. 28th he won the Junior Free For All Trot, purse \$3,000, time, 2:08 3/5 and on September 12th won the Free For All Trot, purse \$5,000, time 2:05 2/5. At Lexington, Ky., mile track, Sept. 27th he won the \$3,000 purse stake with 1-1, time, 2:02 1/5, 2:03, and later over the same track took a time record of 2:00 4/5. His earnings for that year were \$16,345 and his all-time earnings then were \$19,787. His campaign was probably the most remarkable ever made by a Canadian-owned trotter and of course great credit must be given to his trainer-driver, Joe O'Brien.

In 1951 he suffered a slight injury but won \$7,350, making his earnings \$27,137. The past season he has not raced extensively. While training in California he was for a time turned over to the pace but did not take too kindly to that gait so was put back on the trot again. After his wonderful career in 1950 ending with his almost 2:00 mile an offer of \$20,000 was cabled from Italy but Mr. Cruikshank thought he would rather own the horse than the money and that is why Brewer's Gallon is back to his former home in the Maritimes.

Another wonderful horse has arrived in the Maritimes—Watchim 2:06—the horse with the most outstanding record of wins made in these provinces by the sea. Watchim still holds the track trotting record at Chatham—2:08 1/2, made July 1, 1944; at St. Stephen, Aug. 25th, 1944; at St. Amherst, N. S., Aug. 18, 1943—2:08 1/4; at Bridgewater, Oct. 3, 1941—2:07; at Inverness, N. S., July 21, 1943—2:12 1/2; at New Glasgow Blue Acres, June 18, 1947—2:13 1/5; at Sydney, N. S., Sept. 26, 1945—2:10; at Truro, N. S., Sept. 13, 1944—2:09; at Charlottetown, August 17, 1945—2:07 1/2; at Summerside, July 15, 1942, driven by Myron MacArthur, 2:08, (same track record also held by Squire Hanover 2:08). Watchim's racing career in the Maritimes has been a record of wins as well as trotters and woe to the pacer that he was anywhere near at the head of the stretch for he could come home like a bullet. He was one of the most perfect gaited and best mannered horses that ever stepped on a race track, and with the exception of a few starts was trained and driven by Billy Hood.

We hope that Watchim 2:06, named the "iron horse of the Maritime Provinces" winner of 42 races and 105 heats, will be afforded an opportunity in the stud in the Maritimes by owner Alderman Frank Adams. After his racing career was ended he was leased by C. T. Black of Pleasant Farm, West Virginia, and while in the stud there sired several young trotters that are racing well this season. His breeding is of the very best. His sire is the world's greatest sire, Volomite 3, 2:03 1/4, and his dam is Cita Worthy 4, 2:09 1/4. She is the dam of Eria 2, 2:04 1/4, the dam of Dick Eria 2:04 1/2 and many others. A curious thing about Watchim's breeding is that both his sire and dam are out of Cita Frisco by San Francisco.

The following telegram from Hubert Salter, St. Johns, Nfld., was received Wednesday evening: "Closing races for season held at Bella Vista track this afternoon. It was a gala day for the get of Big Gun and Harvest Melody 2:10 1/4. The trotter General Guy, owned by Edward Vincent Guy, won the Championship Trot and Pace defeating among others McDonald Grattan 4, 2:12. John D., owned and driven by your friend Willis Reid, won the Class B Trot and Pace. I question if there is a trotter in the Maritime Provinces that can defeat General Guy. Jack O'Driscoll wearing the MacKinnon colors won Class A Trot and Pace with Tiny Tim 2:10, defeating Silko Budlong by Caluett Budlong, driven by Max J. Lawlor in the most closely contested race ever to be held over Bella Vista track.

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New York Yankees Win Fourth A. L. Pennant

New York Yankees won their fourth straight American League pennant tonight with an 11th-inning rally that defeated Philadelphia Athletics 5-2. Billy Martin cracked a two-out, bases-loaded single in the top of the 11th to start the drive that gave the Yankees their 19th flag in the last 32 years.

The powerful Yankees meet Brooklyn Dodgers of the National League for 'the World Series.' The Dodgers, meanwhile, gave their second-string hurlers a good workout today and beat Boston Braves 8-4 in the bargain.

At Philadelphia, Johnny Sain, 34-year-old righthander, who pitched Boston Braves to a National League pennant in 1948 was the winning hurler. He tossed 2-13 innings of scoreless relief after sequestering a Philadelphia threat in the bottom of the ninth.

In the Brooklyn game, Carl Erskine, who may open the World Series for the Dodgers next Wednesday, was the starting pitcher. He worked five leisurely innings and then retired.

Rookie Ken Lehman relieved Erskine and received credit for his first victory. Jim Wilson was the loser. Billy Cox hit a home run for the Dodgers.

In the only other afternoon game, New York Giants shut out Philadelphia Phillies 8-0 and Boston Red Sox won from the Washington Senators 3-0.

The Giants' Sal Maglie received credit for his 18th pitching triumph of the year, although he was relieved by Hoyt Wilhelm who worked the last two innings.

Russ Meyer was the victim of the New Yorkers' attack, sparked by home runs from the bats of Al Dark, Don Meller and Whitey Lockman.

Herschel Freeman made his first major league start a winning one at Boston, beating the Senators with a four-hit performance.

Penney Park's smallest crowd of the season, 1,183, saw the Red Sox move into a fifth-place tie with Washington.

In the National League night game, Cincinnati Reds blanked Pittsburgh Pirates 5-0. Righthander Bud Poffenbarger shut out the Pirates with four singles and Ted Kluszewski slammed his 16th homer of the season for the victory margin.
