

Intermediates Score 3-2 Win Over Junior Abbies In League Game

Righthander Charlie Ryan, who keeps rolling along like Old Man River, pitched and batted the Intermediates to their first win in the Island Baseball League yesterday evening with a 3-2 victory over the Junior Abbies on Memorial Field.

Entering the game with the bases loaded and none out in the third inning Ryan proceeded to give the best demonstration of clutch pitching seen on the local diamond this season. He struck out two batters and forced the other man at the plate. Of the three men not one hit the ball past the pitchers mound.

The Juniors were leading 1-0 when the redoubtable Charlie entered the game. On his first trip to the plate in the third inning he received a walk, was sacrificed to second and came home on an error to tie up the contest.

But Ryan's work was still far from over. On his second trip to the plate in the fourth inning he drove a double into right field to score Jackie Cairns with the Intermediates second run and put the elder players into a 2-1 lead.

Righthander Ev. Beagan started on the mound for the Intermediates and pitched hitless ball for two innings. After walking the first three men in the third frame he was relieved by Ryan. Charlie hurled hitless ball for four more innings. In the seventh he gave up two singles and in the eighth one.

Three singles and a stolen base in the last of the seventh led to the Juniors' defeat. Pitcher Maurice Williams of the Intermediates led off the seventh with a single down the first base line.

Junior MacLeod, pitching for the Juniors got the next two men, but singles by "Red" Howatt and Reg Hughes won the game for the Abbies. Williams came home from third on Hughes' infield single.

Young Johnny Squarebriggs, making his first appearance in the Island League, was the starter for the Juniors. Squarebriggs held the Intermediates in check during the three and two thirds inning that he worked. In that time he struck out three, gave up one run and one hit and walked four.

The game, played under a high, unfavorable wind, produced numerous good fielding plays the best of which was Cliff Ready's stab of Williams' drive down the first base line in the seventh.

Other outstanding plays were Charlie Kennedy's throw to catch the runner in the second inning to catch "Buck" Whitlock, Brian Lewis' play on Merlin MacKenzie's grounder in the sixth and "Duck" MacLeod's stop of Howatt's single in the seventh.

The losing pitcher was Junior MacLeod. MacLeod came into the contest with two out in the fourth inning and a man on third. He was greeted by Charlie Ryan's double but after that pitched hitless ball for two innings. He gave up four hits and one run.

The Juniors came up in the first inning with lead-off man Brian Lewis scoring. Forbie Kennedy came home in the sixth inning after he had walked and later scored on an error.

Strong Betting Support For Sugar Ray Continues

NEW YORK, June 24 (AP)—Joey Maxim and Sugar Ray Robinson sweated it out in the gym today, awaiting tomorrow's postponed light-heavyweight title bout at Yankee Stadium.

A warm sun, willing humid New Yorkers, turned up 24 hours late. The weather man promised more of the same tomorrow, but he also forecast scattered thunder-showers late in the day.

Strong Robinson support, appearing shortly after Monday's original weigh-in, changed the odds from 6 to 5 and may make Sugar Ray a 13 to 10 favorite in his bid for a third title.

The middleweight champion weighed 160 pounds to Maxim's 174 3/4 Monday, but they must weigh again tomorrow.

Wily Jack Kearns, veteran manager of Maxim, quoting a New York State Athletic Commission rule that "in the event of a postponement due to weather conditions, new weights and physical examinations will be required the next day," put his bet on the scales and weighed him in at 174 1/2 today, "the next day."

But Bob Christenberry, commission chairman, was expected to insist on a second weigh-in at noon tomorrow.

Maxim, after a four-mile road jaunt this morning, went through a brisk workout at Sullman's Gym this afternoon.

Up in Harlem where a large crowd jammed the entrance to the uptown gym awaiting his appearance, Robinson zipped through a light drill of shadow boxing, bag punching and rope skipping. He did no road work.

New York Giants Gain Full Game On Dodgers In National League Race

New York Giants swept a doubleheader Tuesday night from Cincinnati Reds to gain a full game on Brooklyn Dodgers, National League leaders, who split a twin bill with St. Louis Cardinals.

Bobby Thomson and Hank Thompson were the big guns on attack as the Giants turned back the Reds 3-1 and 7-4 to reduce the gap separating them from the Dodgers to four games. Hank cracked a home run and single in the opener and Bobby hit his 14th home run and a double in the nightcap to drive in three runs.

Jim Hearn, with the help of relief pitcher Max Lanier, registered his eighth victory against one defeat in the opener.

A four-run outburst, climaxed by Del Rice's fourth homer of the season, gave the Cards a 7-4 victory in Tuesday night's game at Brooklyn. Unbeaten Preacher Roe scattered six hits for his seventh straight win and a 6-0 Dodger triumph in the first game, played during the afternoon. The second game loss halted a Brooklyn victory

streak at six games. It was Roe's ninth straight triumph over the Red Birds. Duke Snider hit his eighth and ninth homers.

Philadelphia Phillies twice turned back Chicago Cubs, 6-0 and 2-1. Robin Roberts pitched two-hit ball in the first game while Del Ennis contributed a double, triple and homer to the Philadelphia attack.

Russ Meyer with an assist from fireman Jim Konstanty took the second. Meyer had held the Cubs to four scattered hits and no runs until the eighth when he gave up singles to Hal Jeffcoat and Gene Hermanski after walking Eddie Miksis. Konstanty took over after the Cubs scored their lone run.

Pitcher Jim Wilson scored the deciding run in the ninth inning while hurling Boston Braves to a 4-3 verdict over Pittsburgh Pirates. Gus Bell's eighth inning homer accounted for all of the Pirates' tally. Dick Groat, Pittsburgh's reputed \$50,000 bonus shortstop, started a triple play in the third inning while playing his fifth major league game.

Twin Baseball Bill At Summerside Today

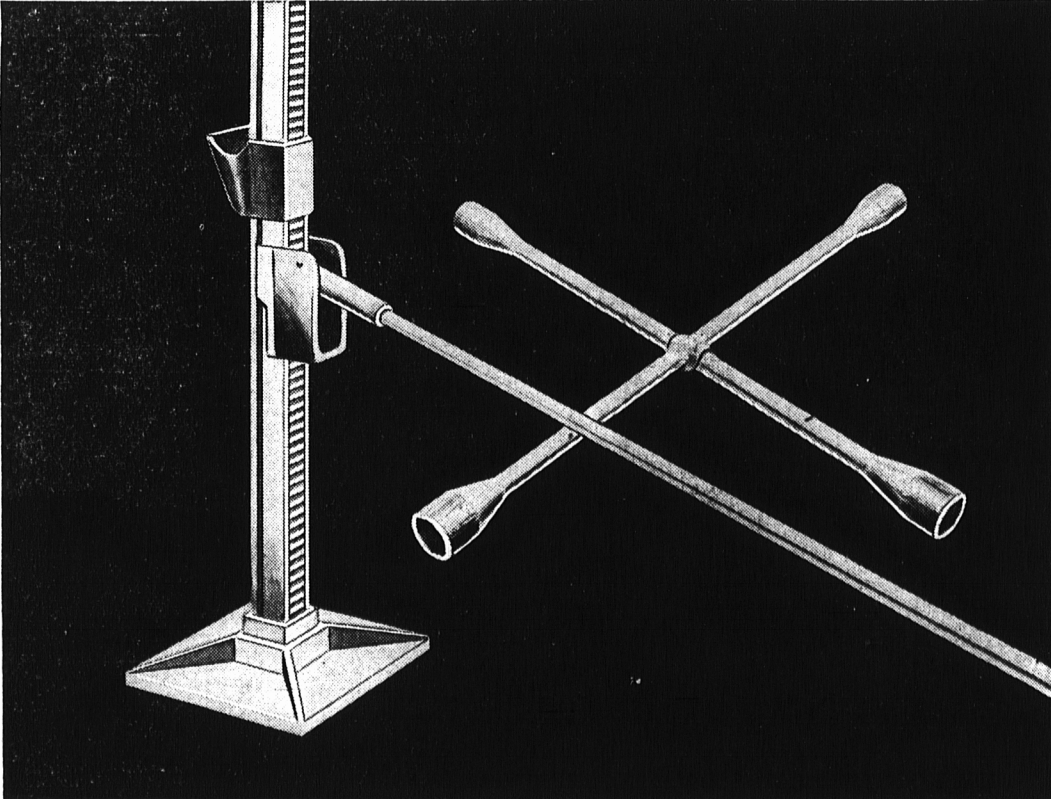
