TENNYSON'S SON, LIONEL, changed his name and takes his uncle's property.

CHARLES F. SMITHERS has been appointed General Manager of the Bank of Montreal.

We regret to learn that Capt. Hedge, of the Worcester, is confined to his bed by a severe cold and slight touch of fever.

The death of Mr. Charles Robin, of the great fishing house of Robin & Co., is reported in the Quebec press.

THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH is going to superintend the English naval reserves for £1,000 a year and perquisites.

COUNT VON MOLTKE knows something of English literature, thinks highly of Shakespeare, but more highly of Miss Braddon.

SIR FRANCIS HINCKS has resigned the office of President of the Consolidated Bank of Montreal, and Mr. John Rankin has been appointed President in his place. The Directors of the Bank has also been changed.

THE Bishop of Newfoundland has decided to accept of Bishop of the Church of England, in Bermuda, in compliance with the request of the Synod at its meeting on July 26th last.

EARL BEACONSFIELD is reported by a Paris paper to have had a long interview with his physicians, as his fretfulness causes much alarm.

DIFFICULTIES between the natives in the Indian territory of the United States will, it is said, soon be settled. The Indians are organizing vigilance committees.

It is stated that M. Say, a wealthy French gentleman, and father of the French Minister of Finance, is about acquiring the Douglass property, on the Beauport road, Quebec, with the intention of coming to live in Canada.

At one o'clock on Tuesday the score in the six days' walking match for the Astley belt stood:—Rowell, 215 miles; Guyon, 200; Merrett, 197; Hart, 193; Hazael, 186; Ennis, 180; Weston, 173.

THE VICEROY OF INDIA confirms the report that the Russian advance column of the expedition in Central Asia was defeated by the Turcomans at Geoktepe, with a loss of 70 killed.

TWO BELLIGERENT LADIES (?) had a wordy quarrel on Grafton street a few days ago which terminated in the aggressor being fined five cents and costs at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning.

MONUMENT TO CHAMPLAIN.—The *Journal de Quebec* announces that it is opening, at its office, a subscription to perpetuate, by a monument, the memory of Champlain, and the first martyrs of the faith in Canada, the Jesuits, Brebeuf, Lallemand and Logues.

DR. TALMAGE and family are on their way home, his preaching and lecturing tour having been completed at Dublin. The Doctor is in excellent health. He has lectured and preached ninety six times during three months in Great Britain.

A REPORT was circulated throughout the city to-day to the effect that the steamer *Carroll* had been wrecked on her recent passage from this city. The report is wholly unfounded, as nothing to that or any other effect has been received by the telegraph authorities or the steamer's agents up to the present time.

THE Steamship "Prince Edward," Capt Robert Fraser, to Peake Bros. & Co., with a cargo of merchandise from London and Liverpool, arrived last night, making the passage from Liverpool in 11½ days. Steamer passed, in 50 N., 51 W., brigantine "Erema," from this port for Liverpool.

SMALL POX NEAR ANAGANCE.—There is some anxiety felt at Anagance about the proximity of small pox to that station. The case of Miss Harper is that referred to. She was employed at the Sussex Shoe Factory, and was a boarder at Mrs. Jenner's. By leaving the place, however, she did not escape the disease, and some fear is entertained that it may spread. The authorities will, it is hoped, do everything possible to prevent that result.—*St. John Telegraph*.

SOME English journals have been making calculations of the loss in money which will be sustained by the present bad harvest in Great Britain. In one estimate it is stated that the deficiency in the corn crops alone will be £25,000,000 and £28,000,000 if beans, peas and rye are added. Potatoes show a loss according to the same computations, of £15,250,000, and hay of £15,000,000.

SILVER MINE.—D. B. Woodsworth, of Nova Scotia who has just been up in the North-West has lately returned to Ottawa, after a fortunate find of a silver mine said to rival Silver Islet, at Thunder Bay, in richness. He has been offered a large sum of money for it since his return, but refuses, and proposes to await further developments.—*Montreal Star*.

By means of the "Heather Belle" and the Railway, a large number of citizens went to Mount Stewart yesterday. The tea in aid of the Roman Catholic Church was a great success—a very large number being present and the "spread" first-class. Games of various kinds were played and the enjoyment of the day was unmarred. The rain did not fall until the outdoor entertainments were all over.

THE Halifax Herald says: The very satisfactory increase of sugar importations afford ample evidence that new life has been given to the trade of Halifax under recent fiscal changes. Every effort should be made to afford facilities for further improvement. In view of this we are glad to learn that the Managers of the Pictou Collieries are desirous of extending their market for coal to the West Indies and elsewhere, and are prepared to make liberal arrangements with merchants requiring coal, as return cargoes for vessels carrying sugar. It is to be hoped that the railway authorities will assist in this movement, and by reducing freight charges on coal exported, enable Halifax to contend with Baltimore and Great Britain in the supply of these markets.

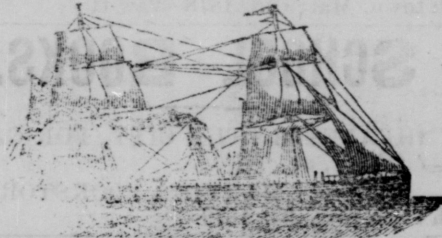

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the Secretary of Public Works, and endorsed "Tender for Canal and Lock at St. Anne," will be received at this office until the arrival of the Eastern and Western mails on FRIDAY, the 10th DAY OF OCTOBER next for the construction of a Lock and the formation of approaches to it on the landward side of the present lock at St. Anne.

A map of the locality, together with plans and specification of the works to be done, can be seen at this office and at the Resident Engineer's office, at St. Anne, on and after SATURDAY, the 27th DAY OF SEPTEMBER next, at either of which places printed forms of tender can be obtained.

Contractors are requested to bear in mind that tenders will not be considered unless made strictly in accordance with the printed forms, and, in the case of firms, except there are attached the actual signatures, the nature of the occupation and residence of each member of the same, and further, an accepted bank cheque for the sum of \$2,000 must accompany the tender, which sum shall be forfeited if the party tendering declines entering into contract for the works at the rates and on the terms stated in the offer submitted.

The cheque thus sent in will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted.

For the due fulfilment of the contract satisfactory security will be required by the deposit of money to the amount of five per cent. on the bulk sum of the contract; of which the sum sent in with tender will be considered a part.

Ninety per cent. only of the progress estimates will be paid until the completion of the work.

To each tender must be attached the actual signatures of two responsible and solvent persons, residents of the Dominion, willing to become sureties for the carrying out of these conditions, as well as the due performance of the works embraced in the contract.
